

Where Do You Want To Go Today?

Do you know how to get there? What route will you take? Even with a map, are you still one of those people who will be helplessly lost anyway?

If this is the case, then perhaps you should consider investing in a Global Positioning System (GPS). Although the technology-which is used to determine latitude, longitude, and altitude—has been around for decades, its availability for the civilian population has brought it into the limelight. But exactly what is it, and how does it work?

Beginning with the launch of the Russian Sputnik satellite in 1957, scientists determined that it would be possible to use its "Doppler shift"—the varying frequency of its radio signal as it moved-



for navigational purposes. Sixteen years later, the U.S. Department of Defense announced plans for a GPS array of 24 orbital satellites, the first of which was launched in 1978. Finally, in 1993, the last 1.900-pound, car-sized satellite was set in orbit, and the system was fully functional.

The underlying principles that give GPS its accuracy come from one amazing, almost mind-boggling device—the atomic clock. Using lasers to measure the natural oscillation of a cesium atom (in English, how many times it vibrates in a particular moment), the device is temporally accurate to 9,162,631,770 times a secondand is guaranteed to neither lose nor gain a second for over 20 million years!

OK, so as you're sitting there bored to tears wondering what that has to do with anything, yet another technical lesson as to how GPS functions. All of the satellites in orbit constantly transmit their location and the exact time (this is where the atomic clocks come in). When a person uses a GPS device, a few things happen: four (of the 24) satellites in closest proximity receive the signals. Using a process called "triangulation," in which the length of time it takes for various signals to reach a specified target determines its position, the receiver can determine location with an accuracy of nearly 60 feet or better.

While the GPS is still owned and maintained by the U.S. military, efforts to increase its use within the civilian population have been incredibly successful. Right now, GPS devices are widely used in areas ranging from airplane navigation to hiking, to even providing cars with "smart maps" that can give perfect directions to any desti-

As the technology continues to improve and propagate, "getting lost" will almost certainly become a thing of the past.



101 Prints, But No Dalmatians Gallery r Holds RIT Fundraiser

RIT's School of Art is planning a "gala evening" fundraiser next month to raise money and awareness for two of the school's current activities. One hundred and one prints will be sold, at \$101 each, to help promote non-toxic printmaking tecniques and support the school's downtown Gallery r, a student-run art gallery that opened last summer.

The event will be held on February 25 at Gallery r, 775 Park Ave, and will feature live music, hors d'oeuvres, and of course, artwork. The names of all 101 ticketholders will be entered into a lottery, and each guest will select a piece to take home when his or her name is drawn. The school plans to have more than enough art pieces at the event, so that the last person drawn will not leave disappointed.

The prints were produced by faculty, students, and visiting artists of the school. The artwork represents a variety of tech-



niques, including etching, lithograph, and silk-screening. Zerbe Sodervick, coordinator of *Gallery r*, said the event is "a chance to support two really outstanding aspects of the School of Art."

The school's focus on non-toxic printmaking techniques is thanks in part to Keith Howard, a visiting artist from Alberta, Canada. Howard is an internationally recognized artist and expert in this subject; he encourages artist and environment-friendly printmaking through the use of less toxic chemicals and quicker processing times.•

World News

SAN FRANCISCO, CA—Elvis Preslev and former President Jimmy Carter-is there a link? Two weeks ago, a genealogical web site, in honor of Presley's 65th birthday, reprinted research showing that the King and Carter both shared a German ancestor, making them sixth cousins. However, Carter is still better known for a toothy grin than a swinging pelvis. (Reuters)

NEW YORK CITY—A short-order cook from the Bronx has given up grilling food once and for all; On January 7, he became the sole winner of the New York "Millennium Millions" lottery jackpot. 66-year-old Johnnie Ely opted to receive a lump-sum cash payment of \$44,371,562- the largest single prize ever for the New York State Lottery. Ely and his wife Rosemary promptly quit their jobs. (Reuters)

MEXICO CITY—On January 7, a Mexico City daily paper reported that a house owned by the Attorney General's Office was being rented out by a suspected Mexican drug lord. Luis Valencia, leader of a Guadalajara-based drug cartel, has been living in the house since 1993, escaping both Mexican and U.S. law enforcement efforts. (Reuters)

NORWALK, CT—Teenage smoking has always been a problem, but two-year olds? Two weeks ago, Andrew Mason, 36, was arrested and charged with presenting a risk of injury to a minor when he allowed his son to smoke a cigarette in a restaurant. A patron there, who happened to be an employee of the Connecticut Department of Families and Children, reported the incident to police. Customers noted that the child had already appeared to be quite experienced with the act. (Reuters)

BUENOS AIRES, ARGENTINA-January 6, Argentine human rights groups demanded that a Hawaiian Tropic sun-tan lotion magazine ad be withdrawn, because it is offensive to blacks. The ad portrays white-robed and hooded members of the white supremacist Ku Klux Klan hauling away a dark-skinned white man from the side of a private swimming pool—with a bottle of Hawaiian Tropic sun-tan oil in the foreground. (Reuters)

EDINBURGH, ENGLAND—Two weeks ago, a British nuclear energy agency defended itself from enraged parents and anti-nuclear groups because it built a Santa's grotto from containers that had once held nuclear waste. Hundreds of children had already visited the site; however. the UK Atomic Energy Authority, which operates the plant, stated that the containers had been decontaminated and were completely safe. (Reuters)


FLORIDA—Inmate Timothy Marshall. 39, petitioned a Florida Court of Appeals judge recently to release him early in 2000, as per the terms of his 1985 15-year cocaine-trafficking sentence. The only problem, noted the judge, was that Marshall had escaped in 1987 and was recaptured only two years ago, and now accuses the state of "wrongfully refusing to give him credit" for time served while on the run. PROVIDENCE, RHODE ISLAND—A former Brown University student was sentenced to probation for poisoning his exgirlfriend with radioactive iodine. 26-yearold Cheng Gu did it in order to make his girlfriend ugly so no one else would want her. Luckily, the girlfriend was uninjured due to the low dose. Gu wants to be deported since he has been humiliated. He will likely get his wish. (AP)

With potentially huge payoffs, game show popularity on the rise By Jason Pacchiarotti

Ponder, if you would. Think of last year at this time and ask yourself, what were the most popular game shows? And the correct answer is...Jeopardy!, The Price is Right, and Wheel of Fortune—the perennial classics. Overall, though, game shows have been in a long-running, slow decline in American culture. While some may believe this statement is debatable, there is no question that game shows are back—with a vengeance.

Since ABC's Who Wants to Be a Millionaire exploded onto the scene during the summer of 1999, the three remaining major networks have shifted into gear developing, adapting, or reviving their own high-stakes, winner-take-all, bigmoney game shows. This month two new game shows have hit the airwaves: CBS's Winning Lines and NBC's revival of Twenty-One. At the same time, FOX continues its multimillion-dollar hit Greed. and Who Wants to Be a Millionaire, the originator of the new game show craze. returns on ABC.

Millionaire was originally a British TV game show; ported to the states and hosted by Regis Philbin, the show became an instant U.S. hit. The show received incredible ratings during its initial summer run and during November sweeps, and now it is back as part of the regular ABC schedule. It completed an eight consecutive day marathon from January 9 to 16 and will now be airing three days a week for the length of the TV season. Surprisingly, the January 9 episode earned higher ratings than the People's Choice Awards! Prior to its return in January, Who Wants to Be a Millionaire had awarded \$3,740,000.

Greed, hosted by Chuck Woolery and produced by Dick Clark, takes five people and forces them to either work together or attack each other for the grand prize of two million dollars. Players must answer a total of eight questions to receive the top prize. During the game, the players may challenge each other to try and steal another player's share of the money. Therefore, anywhere from one to five people could share the two million dollars, if the questions are answered correctly. Greed is currently scheduled to run through February 25.

Winning Lines, another UK original, is one of the two new network game shows to enter the prime-time arena. Hosted by Dick

Clark (yes, the same Dick Clark who is producing Greed) debuted on Saturday, January 8. It has been scheduled for at least six shows-additional segments to come, pending popularity. The rules are as follows: 49 contestants are challenged to answer general knowledge questions that have numerical answers. The game culminates in the "Wonderwall," with one finalist in a three-minute race against the clock to answer 20 questions with answers displayed across three giant projection screens. Players can win up to \$1 million.

The last of the four new network game shows is called Twenty-One. Two players are pitted against each other in a race to get to twenty-one points by answering questions correctly. This is the show that caused the end of the late '50s game show craze when it was discovered that some contestants knew the answers before the show (go rent Quiz Show). The revived version is hosted by Maury Povich and is scheduled to air on NBC for at least four times: January 9, 16, and 19, with the final scheduled show airing Wednesday, January 26, at 8 p.m.

The new game show craze that began when Who Wants to Be A Millionaire soared in the ratings is only gearing up. Currently, four of the major networks are preparing even more game shows, including CBS's debut due out in the fall titled Survivor, and FOX's Who Wants to Marry a Millionaire.

Are these new shows a symptom of a problem in American society? People watch and play along. They get the benefits of the exhilaration and excitement, but do not readily share in the disappointment of losing. Also, game shows like Greed and Millionaire promise big payoffs for little work. These shows, like the lottery and other gambling, contribute to the erosion of the American tradition of hard work. On the other hand,

perhaps they are just good fun; a breath

of fresh air in a once-stagnant area of

American culture.

Surprisingly, the January 9, 2000 episode of Who Wants to Be a Millionaire earned higher rating points than the People's Choice Awards!

BONE CRUNCHING FUN

Antonio Banderas and Woody Harrelson star in boxing thriller

Play It To The Bone, written by Ron Shelton and produced by Stephen Chin, is a very good movie. The beginning is rather monotonous and lackluster, but the acting and plot gain intensity as the film progresses. A half-hour into the film, the viewer is hooked into a journey of self-discovery, as seen through the eyes of life-long friends who thought their careers were over.

Play It To The Bone chronicles the journey of two best friends and boxing rivals. Caesar Dominguez (Antonio Banderas) and Vince Bondreau (Woody Harrelson) have just been given one last shot at greatness; however, they are faced with two big problems along the way. First, in order to get their shot at greatness, Caesar and Vince must be in Las Vegas...NOW. Secondly, the two best friends must fight each other. 

Whether you are straight, bisexual, or gay-or especially if you are unsure of your sexual orientation—you are not alone.

There is a group on campus whose sole purpose is to help with this issue. As one of RIT's Gay Alliance co-presidents, Sal Zimmerman stated, "Our focus is to foster a social environment where new students at RIT who might be unsure of their sexuality can be open [with others who feel the same.1"

This organization was developed under two previous names. In the early 1990's, the group was known as BIGALA (Bisexual, Gay, and Lesbian), then as the Alternative Student Fellowship, and finally, for the first year, it is now called RITGA (RIT Gay Alliance). It also has one of the largest memberships amongst student groups on campus, with approximately 150 members. Though run via a traditional Eboard setup, rather than using several different titles, there are three co-presidents: Sal Zimmerman, Carly Smith, and Anna Costalas. Zimmerman deals with the Student Government responsibilities, meetings, and the political sides of the group, while Costalas deals more with the social atmosphere and Smith handles event scheduling.

The purpose of the group is to provide support and advocacy for all gays, lesbians, bisexuals, and gay-friendly heterosexuals

within RIT and the Rochester area, RITGA attempts to accomplish this by hosting speakers, fundraisers, and participating in festivities such as Coming Out Week (October 10-15), and their extremely successful annual drag show, the Miss RIT Pageant. All of these activities are done with the hopes of increasing positive awareness of the gay community, providing educational information about it, and hopefully eventually helping to curtail the overwhelming levels of homophobia in society today.

As you may remember from Coming Out Week, anti-gay statements were being posted around campus, while flyers promoting various RITGA events were being defaced or torn down. Zimmerman believes this occurred because the group was very much in the spotlight then; not only was it National Coming Out Week, but there was a vigil being held for the anniversary of Matthew Shepard's murder. At that time, there was also a proposal sent into Congress to adopt a sexual orientation ratification into the hate-crime bill, but it was unfortunately voted down for the twelfth year-which leaves the gay community with no protection against hate crimes in New York State. Zimmerman explains that

they tend to take a little more heat when political activism is pushing the issue of homophobia on college campuses. However, "There's a strong sense of community and interaction when dealing with problems," Zimmerman stated.

There are fewer events in the spring, but activities are still in the works. A fundraiser for Aids Rochester held at a gay nightclub, which in the past was held in conjunction with the University of Rochester, and a speaker are yet to be announced.

The Alliance ties into other groups in the area as well as gay organizations at other local colleges such as the University of Rochester, Nazareth, and St. John Fisher. Support in the Rochester area is also provided by groups including Parents for Lesbians and Gays and the Rochester Gay Alliance of Genesee Valley. One sign of community participation is the Annual Gay Pride Parade, which was held downtown in July and had around 10,000 participants last year. 15 to 20 members also attend major three-day conferences—held at the University of Albany and the University of Buffalo each year-which focus on different issues such as sexuality, coming out, homophobia, and last year's topic: marriage.

If anyone is interested in learning more about RITGA, meetings are held in the Student Alumni Union, Room 1829, every Wednesday at 10 p.m. Anyone is welcome to attend, and information can also be obtained at their newly updated web site at www.rit.edu/~asfwww...



"Let's talk about sex, ba-by! / Let's talk about you and me. / Let's talk about all the good things and the bad things that can be..." Nearly a decade after hip-hop group Salt-N-Pepa penned this song, it seems talking about sex is an issue that still needs to be dealt with. Let's talk about sex...safe sex.

Today there are many risks that accompany the pleasure of intimacy between lovers. The most common are unwanted pregnancies and diseases. Amongst college students nationwide, chlamydia, genital warts, and herpes are the most common STDs transmitted between partners. Many students out there are thinking to themselves, "No problem! Latex is my friend," but according to Dr. Brooke Durland, Medical Director of the Student Health Center, this may not be the case. When speaking about condoms, Dr. Durland made it clear, "There are many sexually transmitted diseases that condoms cannot stop. The effectiveness of condoms depends on the time they are put on, and if skin to skin contact occurs." The Health Education Coordinator, Mani Eghbali, added, "Diseases such as syphilis, genital warts, or herpes can be transmitted through bodily contact with lesions."



tant question stands out. How could safe sex improve your sex life? Eghbali feels that "knowing that you take care of yourself gives a boost of self esteem and confidence. It provides peace of mind, and helps you be more responsible and confident lovers." Durland added, "I think knowing you're taking caution to one's ongoing health should be satisfaction." However, this brings up a very interesting point. If you truly love someone, you would not want to endanger his or her health. Eghbali wanted to stress that individuals should try to "think of responsible and sensible sex. One in which both parties take responsibility for what happens, and take precautions to reduce the risk. The only safe sex is no sex." If any doubts still arise, Durland feels that one should consider the effects of unprotected intercourse. "Having STDs or unwanted pregnancies can be devastating. Preserve one's well being, and exercise interest in your sexual health too."

Knowing that condoms cannot totally protect you against STDs, is there any point in even using them? The fact is that using some protection is better then none at all. Eghbali encouraged, "Use condoms always and engage in 'outer course,' which doesn't include penetration. Explore other ways to experience intimacy [(i.e. partner masturbation, hugging, kissing, and caressing)]." Both Durland and Eghbali agreed that the safest way to avoid contracting an STD is abstinence. Both of these medical professionals realize that for many students abstinence is not the most popular choice, so as a result they have an endless supply of information and support concerning safe sex.

There are many myths that accompany the topic of safe sex. But one impor-

But what can the typical RIT student do when having doubts about his or her sex life? According to Durland, the RIT Student Health Center has "many health educators, we do programming, and we have peer educators here who work with students. All providers are familiar with the topic and are able to do counseling. There's a sexual health clinic were students have access to health care and clinical care." In addition to the facilities and programs offered, Eghbali stressed "our specialists are able to create close relationships with students. We keep everything confidential. Information regarding your sexual health will not be released to anyone, even your parents without your prior permission."

The Student Health Center provides

one-on-one counseling and also creates group learning programs, such as "Sex and Sensibility," which will be put on during the week of Valentines' Day. These programs are given throughout the campus, in areas such as the SAU and in the residence halls. Personal counseling can be arranged simply by walking in or calling the Student Health Center and requesting an appointment. Eghbali finished by noting, "Students should feel comfortable coming here. We care about your health and safety." •

If you have any questions or concerns, the Student Health Center is open from 8:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday thru Thursday and from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Friday.

"Hey you want to get a pizza and f***? What, you don't like pizza?"


"Nice shoes, let's make out."







MAKING LOVE To A Computer Screen

What are RIT students' rights regarding pornography on their computers?

a time where a personal computer is as common as a telephone in an American household, the Internet is relied upon heavily—not only does it serve as an information superhighway, but it is also a source for entertainment...adult entertainment.

Since 1998—when the Supreme Court ruled that the Communications Decency Act (CDA) of 1996, intending to keep pornography off the Internet, violated the First Amendment-many special interest groups have been rallying to put restrictions on Internet pornography. The CDA sought to make it a crime to put "indecent" or "patently offensive" words or pictures on-line where children could find them. The problem that many Internet subscribers and entrepreneurs have with this is that it limits the freedoms of users to make decisions as to what they feel is appropriate.

With all of the recent moves toward regulating pornography on the Internet, many fear that such regulations will start to put a stranglehold on the freedoms and civil rights people enjoy in this country. Certain cities across the nation have already instated "codes of decency," eliminating strip bars and regulating the sale of pornography in specific areas. Libraries across the country have prohibited access to pornography on their premises and businesses are starting to monitor the material that employees are accessing.

What does this mean for college students? Here at RIT, any student, staff, or faculty member using the Information

The presently stated codes of conduct give users quite a bit of freedom as far as material content, although there are rules that address the use of copyrighted material and the use of other programs as it pertains to U.S. patent laws. The sole rule that specifically addresses inappropriate content states that "you must not harass others or send obscene, defamatory, or threatening messages."

To some, this is the best type of policy to have on a college campus; to others, it is not enough. What about those who find it offensive to have pornography displayed on a computer openly in the library or in one of the computer labs? Even though the material is not being sent directly through a person's e-mail account, it may offend some. Some may even argue that it sets up an environment that is hostile towards women.

One student, who wishes to remain anonymous, said: "I personally don't think there should be any laws against looking at pornography on the Internet, but it does make me uncomfortable when the guys are looking at it and I am around. It's kind of insulting to women."

While many argue that the derogatory images of women in pornography could be motivation for violence against women, others argue the contrary. Allowing men the opportunity to have access to pornography on the Internet provides an outlet for some that can release their sexual tensions sitting at a computer screen, instead of sexually assaulting a woman.


"With the lack of girls on campus, not being able to access pornography through the Internet only adds to the motivation for guys to act out on women. So, pornography serves as an outlet," says another student.

Then, there are those who believe that there should be some regulation on material as far as child pornography is concerned. The Justice Department has appealed a ruling barring a 1998 law, which required commercial Web sites to collect a credit card number or access code as proof of age before allowing Internet users to view on-line material deemed "harmful to minors."\


and Computing Systems are subject to RIT's "computing code of conduct." It states that any computer accounts and any files stored within are the property of RIT. This means that any programs, web pages, or e-mails sent through RIT accounts are required to meet any standards that RIT currently applies to its system or wishes to apply in the future.



"The problem I see with pornography is child pornography, so I don't think that type of material should be allowed. But there are no children on campus, so students shouldn't be stopped from looking at pornography," says Corrin Matthews, a 4th year GPSY major.

Presently there has not been any steps taken in support or against pornography at RIT, but the strong campus sentiment among students is that it should not be regulated.

"I personally don't look at pornography because it does nothing for me. But I don't think there should be any restrictions placed on those who do look at it." says Clinton Hazel, a third-year Management Information Systems major. "We are adults...in an Institution of higher education, so there shouldn't be any type of restrictions on the material we can see." •



McCain vs. Bush: A Story of Taxing and Social Security



On January 10, the Republican presidential candidates met at Calvin College in Grand Rapids, Michigan to argue about what direction they believe the United States should be headed in. Among the issues discussed, there was one topic on the agenda that stood out as the most important of the night—what to do with the national surplus.

McCain and Bush both have different views on the subject. Bush is calling for a \$483 billion dollar tax cut spanning five years, at all income levels. Bush wants to establish more private investment accounts within the retirement system instead of just having one conglomerate that is the social security account. He also wishes to dedicate social security to a "lock box," so that the money in the account cannot be accessed for any reason other than its intended purpose. Overall Bush is calling for tax cuts across the board.

This is where McCain disagrees with Bush. The day prior to the debate, McCain laid out his plan in great detail. At the debate, McCain criticized Bush's plan as not being conservative enough in its scope in dealing with the surplus. McCain's plan calls for a tax cut half the size of Bush's, while allocating the rest of the money to the national debt and social security. McCain's tax cut plan would benefit lower and middle-income families the most, whereas Bush's plan significantly benefits upper-income families. McCain wants to expand the 15 percent income tax bracket, which is the lowest in the nation, so that it will benefit middle-income families more. The plan further indicates that the 15 percent bracket will be expanded from \$43,050 to \$70,000 for families and from \$25,750 to \$35,000 for singles. Like Bush, McCain wants to move social security more towards individual investment accounts. McCain says that he will call for Congress to vote on a bill to support the restructuring of our social security system.

When all was said and done, there was a noticeable lack of mudslinging between the two candidates. This cannot be said about the other Republicans, who repeatedly attacked Bush on many issues. In the end both McCain and Bush shook hands and promised each other they would continue to restrain from running negative campaigns against one another. •



McKee shines with hard work and dedication

Chris McKee, RIT's swimming captain, is a man made of pure dedication. This junior has overcome back problems and the temptations of college life to become the athlete he is today. McKee lived in South Africa as a child, where there was a heavy focus on athletics. With his own personal drive, and motivation from his parents, he made it onto the equivalent of a state swimming team here in the United States.

McKee then moved to Buffalo and took up swimming in middle school. In high school, he excelled. He made the B Cut for nationals and was just shy of qualifying for the United States Team. On three different occasions he missed making the national team by a tenth of a second, "Which is like one kick," says McKee.

Rather than going to a division one program, McKee choose RIT, a Division III school, for academic reasons. After his arrival, his talent became immediately apparent. "Winning the state championship in my freshman year in the 100-meter butterfly was one of my proudest moments in the pool," says McKee. He also broke a few RIT records in the 100-meter butterfly that still stand.

McKee missed most of last season because he suffered a terrible back injury that developed over time, but the individual medley and butterfly swimmer is back in the pool after some physiotherapy. He swims with the team during normal practices every evening, five times a week, and also trains with a dedicated group of three swimmers every morning, and on Saturdays when the team does not have a meet.

How does a student athlete balance time between swimming and class work? KcKee says it's not that difficult; "I don't waste my time by sitting around and doing nothing. It actually helps me manage my time properly. It gets hard at times to avoid the temptation, but I remain focused and stick to my plans."

McKee has had a good year while the team has struggled with a few injuries. They are proud to have beaten the University of Rochester earlier in the year. The team hosts LeMoyne Saturday, February 25, so come out and cheer them on.•

"We're a little wet and stinky, but we still play good." That's how the intramural soccer team, Team Grundle, describes themselves to others. Since their inception they've been through a number of identity changes, but their high spirits remain the same. Clip Class, Brian Serafin, Tim "Ironlung" Smith, and Nino "Bleachaz" Serixay first appeared on the soccer circuit in the

fall of 1996 as the "Jis Monkeys." After the spring of 1999, the team lost three key players: Hillman, Smith, and Hess. With this loss, the team decided they would retire Team Box and start the 1999 season as Team Grundle, Again playing Division 3, three new players were added: Jeff Schultis, Brian Mihalko, and Matt Herman. Schultis replaced Smith in the goal, and as a firsttime goal tender, he "stepped up and played huge," according to teammate Class, stopping all five shots during a shootout in a regular season game. Mihalko, a freshman, proved to be a huge addition to the team with his all-around ability and offensive skill. Herman contributed to the team's offensive tactics, along with veterans Serixay, Whitmore, Corso, and Serafin (whose shots on goal often looked more like field goal attempts). Weiler and Class teamed up as Grundle's stifling defense. Since Team Chotch, the team has advanced to the finals every quarter they have played but one. They have won three Division 3 titles, including this fall when Team Grundle swept through the Division 3 field of 36 teams, one of the largest ever in RIT intramural soccer, to win the semi-finals 8-3 and the championship game 7-2.

As with any sport, rivalries develop between teams, and RIT intramural soccer is no different. For the past two years, Team Grundle has had a fierce, but friendly, rivalry with the Muff Divers. 

Bournazakis Brothers Skating Circles Around Competition

Family ties are abundant in the world of athletics. It is common for second, and even third-generation players to be found carrying on the family tradition in a particular sport. The RIT Men's Hockey team has its own family connection—only this one is not separated by generations.

Peter and Mike Bournazakis are two of the top players on the Tigers this year. Though separated by two years, both have made similar contributions to this year's team-quest for the national championship. Both brothers are right wings on two of the top lines in the country, and both possess hard shots and exhibit extraordinary playmaking abilities. Perhaps what is most impressive is that the Bournazakis brothers are number three and number four in scoring in the ECAC West division. Peter, a junior, has tallied 12 goals and ten

assists for 22 points on the season. Mike, a freshman, has accumulated seven goals and 12 assists thus far for 19 points. Coach Wayne Wilson says that the playing styles of the brothers are "very, very similar." Elaborating, "They're both excellent puckhandling forwards. They both can generate a lot of offense."

So far, of the two brothers, Peter has proven to be more of a goal scorer. "That might be caused by Peter being a little bit older and more aggressive around the net," says Wilson. Peter's 12 goals this season is tops for both RIT and the ECAC West on the season. According to Mike, "Scoring goals, handling the puck, and just creating chances offensively [are Peter's strongest assets]."

Overall, both Peter and Mike have similar hockey backgrounds. They both played Junior A hockey for top-notch programs before coming to RIT. Last season, Mike was the leading scorer of the Thornhill Rattlers, scoring 76 points (32 points came with Shelburne before a midseason trade to Thornhill). He was expected to provide a scoring punch for the Tigers, and he has done just that—he

currently leads all rookies in the ECAC West division in scoring. Even though he is a goal scoring threat, the strongest aspect of his game so far has been his playmaking ability. Skating with such talented line-mates—Pat Staerker, a twotime All-American and ECAC West Player of the Year, and Derek Hahn, who led the team in scoring in the NCAA Tournament last year—gives Mike ample opportunity to make plays and to showcase his own emerging talent. "His strongest asset would be that he has great playmaking skills and he can put the puck in the net when he has a good opportunity," comments Peter. "He brings a lot of scoring to the team."

As mentioned before, Peter and Mike both play the same style of hockey. Although certain chemistry does exist between the two, it is not likely that the brothers will have many regular shifts together-both have a left-handed shot and both prefer to play right wing. They did, however, get to spend a little time on the same line this year. "Playing against Trinity when we were a little bit short manned...I tried putting one of them on the right side, but they both ended up being on the same side," jokes Wilson. Even though they may not be on the same forward line, they are on the same powerplay line and have combined for 13 points so far this season. The brothers may not get to skate together regularly, but it is evident that Peter and Mike will continue to benefit the team.

While one might expect somewhat of a sibling rivalry to exist between a pair of brothers playing on the same team, that does not appear to be the case with these Toronto natives. "Pete's always given his brother room to grow," says Wilson. "There's a good competitiveness between the two...a positive one, not where it gets detrimental," states Wilson. "I think it's been healthy for both of them."

Mike jokes, "Maybe if I have a better game than him, then I'll rub it in to get him going...he does it to me too." Despite these normal brotherly quarrels, it is clear that the Bournazakis brothers do not mind sharing the spotlight on the ice.•
