

# REPROFILE

Good job Off Campus Student Association! Because of the very vocal opposition by Mike Krivanek and Kristen Kaiser from OCSA, as well as over 200 students at two housing forums, the obscene 16 percent rent increase has been averted. It is to be replaced by a less obscene 11 percent increase. Not to belittle the achievement, a 5 percent reduction is great. But with inflation at 3 percent, an 8 percent tuition increase, and a likely reduction in the New York State Tuition Assistance Program, I wonder if RIT is pricing students right out of its own housing.

The administration justifies the increases by saying it needs to finance capital improvements and to bring the apartment budget out of the red. It has been operating in deficit for the last six years. This significant increase will be paid by students who live in RIT

apartments between September and May. Students who live in the apartments during the summer months will be paying significantly less rent. This is meant to increase summer occupancy. But the students who go home for the summer won't be enticed to stay by reduced rates, because living at home is usually free. This will probably result in the same number of students in the apartments as there are every summer and less money coming into the institute. How can the administration believe it can compete with free room and board at home?

The last thing any of us wants to hear about, especially with the warmth of spring, is that RIT is demanding more money from people who simply can't afford it. When will the price become too much to bear? There have to be alternatives to simply raising the prices whenever the need dictates.

Students should be allowed to work on their own housing communities in supervised groups and have the equivalent pay deducted from their rents. With an entire college of electrical engineers and another college of design students, why should RIT even consider going outside of its boundaries for professional improvements and maintenance? If there are other options to increasing rents, these need to be explored thoroughly before the administration makes an across the board decision to raise rent by 11 percent. This most recent blunder into our wallets was a mistake; money is a very sensitive sore spot with all students and now it has festered into a gaping wound, with our money pouring out.

The areas of programming which are CAB's focus include TALISMAN-FILMS, Cultural, Social, RITV, Music and Entertainment, and Recreation. Some of the events tht

have been sponsored by CAB this year to date include: P.O.E.T.S. Hours, Kinks Concert, Buffalo Bill Games, RAYTEL Laser Show, After School Specials, Theme Parties, Red Rose Semi-Formal, the Cultural Fair, Day and Weekend trips to Toronto, and four nights of films per week. This list of events is not complete and does not include events which we co-sponsor with other student organizations. (i.e. Student Directorate, OCSA, RHA, BACC, NSC, etc.)

I would like to commend Susan Boyd on her letter concerning the opportunity for involvement at RIT and forward an open invitation to students who would like to be involved in providing entertainment to the RIT community to stop by th CAB office on the CU lower level, (near the RITz). If you would like to become involved in some of the events listed or have new ideas for programming, then we need you.

Concerning the letter about S.U.N. by Edward F. Oswalt, if Mr. Oswalt feels that CAB is throwing away money by offering a variety of programming at discount rates I suggest Mr. Oswalt provide suggestions to our organization on possible improvements in programming. I realize that Mr. Oswalt's letter was not meant to specifically attack CAB but rather S.U.N. Some people may be misinformed into believing that CAB, as an organiztion, is a sponsor of S.U.N. The fact of the matter is that CAB and S.U.N. are two separate and independent organizations. It is true that several members of CAB are part of the leadership of S.U.N., but this is being done independently by those individuals.

I am not a member of S.U.N. but I feel that the students from CAB involved in the organization are genuinely concerned about the present state of student life and are at least making an effort to change it for the better. It is true that murals should not be our primary concern but it is a start. The door needs to be opened before we can walk through it. #### Rent Increase Decreased

Out of all the confusion surrounding the proposed 16 percent rental increase in RIT owned apartments, some good news has finally surfaced. Thanks largely to the efforts of Michael Krivanek and Kristen Kaiser and the Off Campus Student Association (OCSA) in general, the rental increase has been lowered to 11 percent. After a series of two debates, attended by over three hundred irate students, the administration, led by Dr. Rose, was able to reduce the increases by five percent. Michael Krivanek, president of OCSA, had this to say about the reduced rates: "As we said from the beginning, it wasn't a question of figures, it was a question of attitudes. And it seems to us that Dr. Rose is holding firm with his commitment to change the attitudes on campus." Because of the organizational efforts of Krivanek, Kaiser and the rest of OCSA, RIT students can actually measure a significant change in Institute red tape. Krivanek was extremely pleased with the reductions, but was critical of the students reaction to OCSA's efforts. "When we were distributing information concerning the original sixteen percent increase, many

students doubted that any change would be brought about. I feel that this recent success will serve as a precedent reflecting our commitment to changing attitudes on campus.''  $\hfill\Box$

## Vessel Exhibit Shown

On Monday, March 17, an invitational exhibition called 'Architecture of the Vessel' opened in the Bevier Gallery at RIT's College of Fine and Applied Arts. Michael Taylor, head of the glass blowing department at RIT, says, "The contemporary vessel maker often deals with the concept of the pot and the architecture

of containment rather than issues of utility and function." In this sense, the artist is trying to present his craft as a culmination of artistic skills expressed in a medium that most people take for granted. The significance of the work is that the artist is no longer solely concerned with making a piece that is to be used only as a functional object. Instead, the vessels being created are works of art in themselves. Taylor adds, "It is our intent to exhibit works by major artists who are concerned with this focus. Never before has work involved with this theme been brought together, and many of the artists in the exhibition are considered masters in their field." The exhibition is open to the public and will continue through April 6.

## Medical Grant Given

Dr. John Neenan, an RIT assistant professor of chemistry, has been awarded a \$242,000 contract for medical research. The grant, given by the U.S. Army, will be used by Dr. Neeenan to research drugs which may be used against cancer, viral infections, and tropical diseases such as malaria. Says Neenan, "The compounds

I'm working on are potential candidates for the treatment of disease and are similar to those that have an excellent track record of getting FDA approval and being useful in humans."

In 1973, Neenan and his partner, Dr. William Prusoff, did patented work on an antiviral drug at Yale Medical School. Neenan's present research is directed toward the chemotherapy of tropical

disease caused by RNA viruses. RNA viruses are the agents responsible for the common cold, influenza, rabies, and AIDS. They also have been implicated as causative agents of other diseases including cancer.

Neenan stresses that, "My research poses no biohazard to myself or my students. No work with viruses or other biohazardous material is done at RIT."

# **Bowling Team Shines**

The RIT bowling team took second place in a sectionals tournament on March 21 and 22. The tournament was held in Latham, near Albany, and included such schools as MIT, St. John's, the University of Buffalo, Buffalo State College, and Eric Community College (ECC). After the first day of the tournament, RIT was down by 100 pins, but midway through the second day, the team had advanced to a 100 pin

lead. The last six games, which were played Baker style, were the deciding factor. Baker style involves alternating bowlers every frame, and the RIT team could not maintain their lead through these games. If RIT had held out, the team would have gone on to the national tournament in Houston, but ECC took over the lead and won the tournament and the place in the nationals. "We thought we had the tournament won," said RIT bowler Rocky Cerretto, "but they (ECC) bowled very

well, and we fell apart at the end." Team member Scott Gerken stressed the fact that all the bowlers competed as a team, with all of the members contributing to an impressive showcase of RIT talent.

The team wishes to thank their coach, Helen Smith, who led them through a very successful season. The college bowling season is now over, but the team will continue to compete in local tournaments until next year.

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
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## Worship Icon

With proposed rental increases for the next academic year, there is a heated debate over remaining in RIT owned apartments or moving elsewhere. Springtime is usually the time to seek out housing for next fall, so in addition to discussing all of the ruckus about a sixteen percent rental increase, we present a complete breakdown of the RIT housing situation. This includes alternative housing options and some practical advice on apartment life.

Part 1: Selecting roomates.

Are you someone who prefers the volume dial on your stereo on maximum output, or do you prefer the vacuum like silence of a mortuary?

Do you have live-in bed mates who live at your apartment but do not pay rent. Or are you a loner who can remain locked in your room studying for weekends at a time?


Both of these questions are realistic considerations to be taken into account when searching out apartment mates. So how do you pick your roomies?

The general trend in college apartments is that men live with men and women live with women. This has the effect of removing a significant portion of possibilities from the overall population. Next, it is more than likely that you will desire to live with someone of your own major, or at least in an associated field. This way you stand a much better chance of being in the same classes. Or even better, take your classes the quarter after your roomate did, thereby making available their books, materials and most importantly; their tests and quizzes.

The most important quality of a prospective roommate is ability to pay rent

and bills. The rule of thumb here is if you let them slide on one months rent, they're probably going to do it again. The next most important quality is compatability. If you end up living with someone who you barely know and then grow to dislike them, it will have a profound effect on your life at school. At the other end of the spectrum, living with your friends is not the same as hanging out with your friends. No matter how often you see them.

Keep your mind open to living with people different from yourself. Deaf students and hearing students can be very compatible. Be sure to thoroughly interview your future roomates. Get a sense for the kind of person they are, and try to decide if you can live with them for extended periods of time. Be honest about yourself to them. If you hate people who put the toilet paper roll on upside down be sure you tell them first



Part 2: Choosing a place to live.

By looking at the chart in the centerspread it might seem like a breeze to pick out just the right place to settle down for thirty weeks of hard studying. But are you really planning to be in Rochester for three consecutive quarters? Are you willing to suffer the loss of hundreds of dollars spent on a damage deposit over a broken lease? Because of the increased number of students breaking leases, some apartment complexes not owned by RIT are demanding twelve month leases and increased security deposits. There are also application fees required by some landlords. These fees pay for a review of your credit history by a paid professional and are unrefundable, even if you are refused.

Another serious consideration for off campus housing is transportation. Are you willing to have to depend on the RIT shuttles and the Rochester Transit Authority to take you from place to place? Remember the last time you stood in sub-freezing weather for the bus that never came? If you have a car, find out about parking stickers and provisions for working on your own car if you're a do-it-yourself type. Be very conservative in your estimates of what you can afford to pay for monthly rent costs. It is far better to live in a place you can afford and

be a little cramped than to live in a townhouse which you can't afford. Also, make sure that you can keep your pet ferret, spider or ocelot in your new apartment. Some places allow pets, most do not. Those who do allow pets will invariably charge for it, so beware of these and other hidden charges in your rental agreement.

Part 3: Signing the lease.

Unless you've been living under a rock for the larger part of your life, you know that a lease is a *legally binding agreement* between the occupants and the landlord. Both parties have rights, but usually one party is much more informed than the other. This party is almost always the landlord. You, the tenant, have specific rights outlined by New York State and in some cases, by the city you are living in. It is your responsibility to know these.

- a. Read your lease. This cannot be stressed enough. Your lease tells you exactly what terms you are bound to abide by. If you have any doubts about legal terminology, bring it to the free lawyer provided by Student Directorate. His name is Paul Vick and he is extremely helpful.
- b. Make numerous copies of your lease, and distribute them to your roomates. If nothing else, they will make great paper airplanes.
- c. Inspect the apartment ruthlessly. Be

absolutely sure the landlord knows of any existing damages or problems. Get recognition of these problems in writing with a signature and impartial witness.

d. Sign the lease, look your landlord in the eye, shake their hand and make sure they know who you are. If you are on current and friendly terms with your landlord it will make life much easier.

Part 4: RIT apartments.

The new rental agreements for RIT owned apartments are the main controversy surrounding the housing issue this year. After talking with many irate students, a couple of perplexing questions come to mind. The letter issued to all tenants concerning the rental increases clearly states that you are extended the flexibility of breaking your lease for co-op or for summer. So who wants to take a nine month lease when a twelve month lease is cheaper and you can still break it for free? When faulty design causes the roofs at Riverknoll to collapse, why should the students have to pay for the cost of placing a protective membrane over an already unsafe roof? The answers will eventually come to light (lighting?, I guess that's another issue) but who will pay the cost in the mean time? You already know the answer.

# It Was Not Meant To Be

"... AND MAY THE best man win." If the best man always did win, this phrase would not take on any meaning at all. But we continue to use it. Clearly, then, the best team does not always win. Last year, the Kansas City Royals won the World Series. They were not the best team in baseball. The Miami Dolphins beat the Chicago Bears in a football game last year. Miami was not the better team. Chicago was the best team in football, and they won the Super Bowl. One can think of many more such examples.

So it goes with Division III college hockey. The RIT men's hockey team was the best team in the nation this year, but it did not win the National Collegiate Athletic Association championship. The championship belongs to Bemidji State University of Minnesota, which defeated Plattsburgh State 8-5 last Saturday in Bemidji. Plattsburgh advanced to the title game by besting Mankato State University of Minnesota 7-5. Bemidji's 4-3 overtime win over the Tigers in the other semi-final game was the story of the tournament. It was truly championship caliber hockey.

The Tigers' team defense, led by freshmen Stephen Grande and Dale Rivington, put on a show that left the Bemidji fans talking to themselves. After the Beavers got on the board seven minutes into the game, they were held in check for over 48 minutes. Meanwhile, the Tiger offense began to pound away on goaltender Jim Martin. Martin came up big all game, but he couldn't handle them all. At 11:17 of the first period, James Cotie picked up a rebound over a prone Martin for an unassisted goal to even the score. In the second period, the Tigers scored goals 41 seconds apart for a 3-1 lead. Scott Brown


blocked a Bemidji drive from the point, Gord Rivington took the loose puck all alone, put a good move on Martin, and put it home for a breakaway score. Next, Jim Regan won a faceoff, moved to the net, got the puck back, and popped a backhander over Martin's shoulder.

Unfortunately, that was all the Tigers would get. Halfway through the third period, Bemidji picked up the pace, and with 3:41 left in the game, Tim Guyer picked off a pass and fed Jeff Strandell. The two broke down the ice together and Strandell beat Tiger goaltender Chet Hallice up high on the stick side. Bemidji almost tied the game 24 seconds later, but Hallice came up big on Tim Lescarbeau to keep the Tigers in front. With :45 left in the game, Bemidji pulled Martin for an extra attacker. As the clock ticked the last seconds of the game, RIT tried to carry the

puck away from the net. However, Bemidji came up with the puck and tied the game with 0:04 on the clock to send the game into overtime.

After killing a penalty early in overtime, the Tigers mounted a charge, but the Beavers hung on. Almost halfway through the overtime, RIT broke up a Bemidji three-on-two break at the blue line, but Mike Alexander slipped through, grabbed the puck, and found Todd Lescarbeau moving to the net. Lescarbeau put the puck past Hallice to end the game at 4:51 of overtime.

The loss left a lot of RIT people stunned. The Tigers clearly outplayed the Beavers, outshooting them 44-29, and controlled the flow of the game for all but a few of the 60 minutes. The second period was total domination by the Tigers. The defense was all over Bemidji, giving up only seven shots. Most of the period saw RIT controlling the puck in the Bemidji zone. RIT's domination was almost as strong throughout the rest of the game. RIT outmuscled the smaller Bemidji squad, without giving away a speed advantage. Typical of RIT hockey this year, the Tigers kept pounding the puck at the opponent's net until it went in. Unfortunately, the puck got through only

three times, and in the last few minutes when Bemidji controlled some of the play, two errors by the Tigers made a difference.

However, one cannot take any credit away from Bemidji. The Beavers played well and made a courageous comeback. Martin played a great game in goal, keeping the Beavers close when RIT could have blown them out. Martin also played well the next night against Plattsburgh and earned All-Tournament honors. Bemidji's first line of Alexander and the Lescarbeaus gained all three All-Tournament forward positions, with Alexander being voted MVP. The line tallied three goals and two assists against RIT and accounted for the first four Bemidji goals in the championship game. Against RIT, the line logged almost 40 minutes of ice time. The Bemidji seniors, including Alexander and Todd Lescarbeau, had a lot to be motivated for-as freshmen and juniors, they lost championship games to the Tigers.

"Missing the title game by four seconds doesn't take anything away from our year," said Tiger coach Bruce Delventhal. "We have a great hockey tradition here, and this year we maintained it and built upon it." This is not the first time the best team has not won. In 1984, RIT was clearly recognized as the best team in the nation, even though the team lost in the semi-finals. One thing is certain: This team will be back for another crack at the title.

# **Pete: Aloof and Alone**



Pete Townshend, a very unusual and talented musician, puts out his first solo effort since The Who's break up. The album titled White City also has a long-form video and film which accompany it. The album reflects Pete's views on growing up in impoverished England. It is a hard-edged guitar lovers album accompanied by some hoppin' licks and lyrics.

The intro song, also the commercial hit of the album, contains a powerful message by Pete to give "blood," but only between "brothers." There is definitely a

strong sense of symbolism here. Pete seems to tell us only to sacrifice to the people we hold in the highest regard and trust. If we do favors for others they are frequently forgotten. "They will cry and say they're in your debt/But then they'll sigh and they will soon forget" Could this be a reference to being slighted, at least in his mind, in his relationship with The Who? "Brilliant Blues" the next tune has a be-boppin' rythmn to it that is rare for Pete. "Face the Face" resembles the typical Townshend song in the strong vocals combined with the hard-edged guitar. The only disappointing point about the song is the shouting out of city names towards the end of the song. This cannot help, but make you think that he copied this from the Bowie/Jagger song "Dancing in the Streets," a ghastly thought is it not?! "Hiding Out" is a delightful little ditty which uses the lead vocals of Pete and an unidentifiable lower voice to make the song bounce and reverberate with glee. "Secondhand Love," the closing song, involves a refrain of "Give Blood" to comment on the uselessness of a girl splitting her love between more than one man.

The second side is much mellower. It opens with "Crashing by Design," a song that reminds us of The Who album "Face Dances." "White City Fighting" is next and presents us with the violent street fighting life that Pete

grew up in. He states he could not wait to get out, but that he missed it once he finally did. The song is soft and reflective of Townshend's different moods. It does, however, state some startling truths. "Blood was an addiction/Now it is analyzed/As though it were fiction." The point he wants to leave us with is to remember, make sure it is not all in vain. This also references the South African situation. On the back of the album, there is a comparison to his early street fighting (evidently race related) and the futileness and stupidity in the fighting. The closing song of the album "Come to Mama" is largely instrumental, but the lyrics make a meaningful statement. It makes the basic comment that pride can be a very damaging weapon.

Pete's venture into the solo world is much different than Daltrey's. While neither album reminds us of The Who, Pete's gives us the impression that he is in control and has a message to state. One interesting usage on this album was the method of overdubbing his voice onto an already sung line of his. He changes his tone, though, to give a pleasant contrast in sound. After listening to both albums it seems that Pete was definitely the driving, leading and controlling talent in the Who. Daltrey has a good voice, but talent- wise he is left in the dust by - JIM WINIARSKI Pete.

# After The Fire Who?



After the fire. Or is it after The Who like the title states? Roger Daltrey's newest solo album, the first since The Who broke up, is quite a surprise for those looking for Who-like songs. The voice sounds the same but the comparisons end there. Under a Raging Moon as the album is named consists of a ten song collection of similar sounding songs.

The album opens up with the hit single "After the Fire" which has been beaten up lately on commercial radio stations with its overly frequent playing. It is definitely an upbeat song and gives one the impression that this album will reflect past Who albums but, hey, it should since Pete Townshend wrote it. (The fact that Pete wrote one of the best songs on the album, judging quality by commercial airplay of course, should say something.) The songs that follow

on side one are disappointing in that they are difficult to distinguish from each other unless you are following the words on the record sleeve. "Don't talk to Strangers" the second song seems to be a mournful statement regretting the the fact that he dumped an ex-girlfriend. In contrast, "The Pride you Hide" gives the sense that Roger is glad to be rid of some wench-like woman that occasioned into his life.

Side two opens with the most upbeat song on the album "Let Me Down Easy," a remake of Bryan Adams' version. The song regales us with visions of a very unfaithful girlfriend and leaves one with the impression that if his lover is going to be sleazy, she should not rub it in his face. Have some class and do not be a lying sneak about it. The songs following this sound

similar to one of Daltrey's other solo works, the soundtrack to McVicar. (For those having a problem placing the album, "Free Me" should ring a bell.) "Fallen Angel" the next tune shows some impressive variance in Daltrey's vocal ability. He sings in a bass-like tone with clarity and authority. "It Doesn't Satisfy Me" has a catchy rythmn to it that makes it a type of song that is appreciated more with repeated

listening. The final song "Under a Raging Moon," the title track, has some very interesting drumming in it and one other mysterious attribute. If you listen closely to the backing vocals on the song it sounds very much like Townshend's voice eminating from the background. The album does not list this in the credits but, Who knows?

The most noticeable thing coming from this album was the fact that

Daltrey did not write a single song alone, he did write a few jointly with others, but none alone. His most popular songs do not even involve his own writing at all. This tells us about his songwriting talents at the very least. To compare it to The Who is not fair, but how can we help it? The album is good to fill out one's collection with, but not a classic by any means.

# **Woody Allen: An American Icon**

Take the idea of one woman, her two sisters, her adulterous husband, her neurotic ex-husband, and her squabbling parents. Combine that with the cerebral humor and filmic talents of Woody Allen. The results are *Hannah* and Her Sisters. The film has emerged from the typical shroud of secrecy surrounding Allen's productions to be cloaked with the critics' praise.

The epicenter of this heavily textured film is Hannah (Mia Farrow). Hannah is a giving, unselfish female, possessing matriarchal qualitities as she is the stronghold of her immediate family, and those associated with it. such as her husband Eliot (Michael Caine). Eliot lusts after one of his wife's sisters, Lee (Barbara Hersey), to whom he eventually reveals his obsession and comences an affair, leaving him a paranoid guilt ridden wreck. Meanwhile, Lee has to contend with her own problems, namely her companion and mentor, a cynical artist (Max Von Sydow) who despises the modern world and its inhabitants.

Hannnah's other sister, Holly (Diane Wiest), is an unsuccessful stage actress in search of herself. Discouraged about her career and the lack of a steady man in her life, she keeps abandoning acting for other professions i.e. catering with her friend April (Carrie Fisher), and writing. Failure to achieve instant success results in a brooding manic depressive.

Allen has not forgotten his most prevelant and recurring topics: death, religion, and sex. He has reserved these motifs for Mickey Sachs (undoubtedly Woody Allen), Hannah's former spouse. Mickey is a hypochondriac who suddenly comes face to face with the possibility of death in the form of a brain tumor. His brush with extinction begins a quest for the meaning of life and the force controlling his destiny. He turns to religion, caught in the confusion



between Judaism, Catholicism, and Hare Krishna. Beware of Mickey's soliloquies. What appears on the surface to be nonsense and absurdity, slowly creeps into provacative and pensive statements.

This stunning and exceptional ensemble of actors and actresses includes supporting roles by the late Lloyd Nolan and Maureen O'Sullivan (Mia Farrow's natural mother) as Hannah's parents and veteran theatre performers.

Allen's writing and directional control are at a pinnacle. He interweaves a complex plot, which unfolds like chapters in a well structured book, moving back and forth between the three sisters and the people in their lives. Although the film follows the chronological experiences of a couple of years, it nevers feels episodic, but it flows as Allen presents just enough information to precede

toward revelation.

Unlike Bananas and Take the Money and Run, Allen does not employ humor as a vehicle for the film, but to accent his poignant subjects. Allen has come along way from his roots in Brooklyn. After flunking out of New York University and the City College of New York, he entered into a prestigious circle of young gag writers, including Carl Reiner, Mel Brooks, and Mike Nichols. His task was to create material for the likes of Sid Caeser among others during the Golden Age of Television. Charles H. Joffe and Jack Rollins ultimately persuaded Allen to perform his own jokes, from which he rose to the top of the nightclub circuit. Casino Royale proved to be his intial motion picture venture, never to look back. Woody Allen has become an American icon.

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
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# Lacrosse Ready For Another Big Year

The RIT men's lacrosse team opens its home season next Tuesday, April 1, hosting Buffalo State at 3:00 pm. Despite some key losses, the Tigers are looking to equal last season's impressive 14-2 record. "Our goals are to repeat as Independent College Athletic Conference champion and shoot for another National Collegiate Athletic Association appearance," states coach Bill Glennon.

In his first season last year, Glennon guided the Tiger stickmen to a second straight ICAC title and a third consecutive trip to the NCAA playoffs. RIT handled Roanoke 12-4 in the opening round, then lost to eventual NCAA champion Hobart 16-8. RIT's other loss came against the Statesmen earlier in the season.

The key to the Tigers' success is the performance of the new talent. "We have a good nucleus of veterans and a group of young players who must be able to step in and fill the gaps quickly," says Glennon. "It's important that we enjoy early success which will help our newcomers gain some confidence.

That's a tall order. The Tigers must replace three All-Americans, attackman Bruce Remus and defenders Tom Sill and Shawn McAvoy. Other key losses include midfielders Don Balch and Chris Zello and goaltender Andy Demetres. Remus, the Tigers' leading scorer last year, ranked fourth in NCAA Division III in scoring and was named ICAC Player of the Year.

Scoring should be no problem for RIT again this season. The attackmen include four veterans led by second team All-American Bill Bjorness. Despite missing five games with a broken foot, Bjorness scored 53 points and was All-ICAC last vear. He is one of four Tiger captains. Senior John Harrington and juniors Ted Diehl and Dan Stehn add experience and scoring potential to the Tiger attack. Top freshman prospects include Steve Schmidt and Jim Regan. In the season opener two weeks ago, Schmidt tallied three goals.

If the team has a weak spot, it's in the midfield. Captains Tim Turner and Chuck Cincebox lead the unit, which also includes veterans Kevin O'Reilly and Andre Schmid. Turner recorded 27 points last season and was first team All-ICAC. Former attack veteran Scott Olive and seven newcomers round out the group. The freshmen are led by Chris Guild, an All-County midfielder from Syracuse. Face off duties are still a question, but they will probably fall on the shoulders of Cincebox, Guild and sophomore transfer Jim Connell. RIT's face off success will be a



determining factor in their overall performance.

Despite the loss of the two All-American defensemen the Tigers should remain strong, bolstered by the return of captain Ed Purcell. Purcell, who missed last season due to back surgery, was an All-American two years ago. Glennon is also counting on veterans Jim Kimmel, Neil Mullane, Marc Touchette and Kurt Peterson. Tim Byrnes, a freshman from Syracuse, is the top defensive prospect.

Sophomore Dave Doughty will step into the goaltender spot, replacing All-ICAC Andy Demetres. Doughty was 2-0 in six appearances last season. Freshman Frank Scialdone brings a solid background to the RIT netminders group and should challenge for the starting role.

RIT's 14-game schedule started two weeks ago with a game at New York Maritime. The Tigers easily beat the hapless Maritime squad, 24-3. Bill Bjorness led the scoring with four goals and two assists. Freshman Tim Cronin added two goals and four assists. Fifteen different Tigers recorded points in the game. Led by

middie Chuck Cincebox (seven for seven), the Tigers won 69.2 percent of the faceoffs. Goalie Dave Doughty handled seven shots in the first half, allowing just one goal. Frank Scialdone took over goaltending duties at the half. He faced seven shots and allowed two goals.

In pre-season, the Tigers went 3-1 in exhibition play. They defeated Roanoke (an NCAA opponent last year), Hampden Sydney, and Randolph Macon. The single loss was at Nassau Community College. As in the past, RIT's toughest games occur at the end of the season, with ICAC rival Ithaca, defending national champion Hobart and Cortland State.

Coach Glennon doesn't plan to alter the RIT style of play, which has proven successful in the past. "We'll play the transition game and have the ability to slow it down and play six-on-six," comments Glennon. "We have the speed and scoring potential up front, and hopefully we can cut down our goals against average by playing aggressive man-to-man defense."

# Hockey Wrapup — Tigers Close Best Season Ever

Now that the RIT men's hockey team has completed its most successful season ever, it is time to recap the season and look over some of the team's accomplishments. Also, six seniors ended their careers this year.

The team's 31 wins breaks the previous school record of 29, set in 1983-84. Among the wins are five over Division I schools, including Clarkson Unioversity, Colgate University, and NCAA quarterfinalist Western Michigan University. Previously, the Tigers had never beaten a D-I team. The only D-I loss came to Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. RIT also won back-to-back tournaments at Christmas, the Syracuse Invitational and the Merrimack Bud Light Tournament.

The 275 goals and 726 points scored this season are team records. The Tigers made their fourth appearance in the NCAA playoffs, all in succession, won their second ECAC title in three years. This was their eighth appearance in the ECAC's and fifth consecutive. The team also collected its fourth NYCHA title in as many years.

Freshman center Scott Brown set a school record for most points in a season. Brown scored 32 goals and recorded 42 assists for 74 points this year, breaking the

record of 67 set by Chris Johnstone as a freshman in 1981-82. His 42 assists are only two away from B.J. Hull's record of 44 set in 1983-84. He also had a 29-game scoring streak, ended when he was held scoreless in the Bemidji game. He was held scoreless in only two other games all season.

Junior right wing and co-captain Ritchie Herbert tallied 65 points this year on 27 goals and 38 assists for his most productive season to date. With 98 points in his first two years, his career total of 163 leaves him fifth on RIT's career scoring list. 47 points next year would put him second on the career list. Other leading scorers were senior wing and alternate captain John Hinrichsen (20-31-51), freshman center James Cotie (16-34-50), junior defenseman Maurice Montambault (10-36-46), senior wing Gord Rivington (21-23-44), and senior defenseman and co-captain John Hawkins (10-32-42). Seven other Tigers accumulated 30 or more points.

Hawkins, Hinrichsen, Rivington, Mike Jones, John Bourbonnais, and Rob Lorenzen completed their hockey careers at RIT this year. Hawkins capped a great career with a great year; much of what he has accomplished has been well-documented this year. To sum it up, he has 152 career points, sixth on the all-time scoring list and tops among defensemen. This year he was named ECAC and NYCHA Player of the Year. He is a strong defender with excellent offensive skills and a team leader who will not be easy to replace.

Hinrichsen tallied 51 points this year after accumulating 68 in his first three years, leaving him tied for ninth on the alltime list. His accomplishments have also been documented. Rivington played three years for Ohio State before coming to RIT. Besides his 44 points, he contributed the kind of leadership that a former Division I player can. Jones and Bourbonnais transferred to RIT after two years at Canton and played two years at RIT. Jones, with 33 points this year, emerged as a defensive leader and finished his career with 50 points. Bourbonnais improved greatly at the end of last season and scored 19 goals among his 33 points this year. Lorenzen closed with five points in nine games this year. - DAN LONG

# **Ruston Earns All-American Honors**

The weekend of March 14 proved to a record weekend for Paul Ruston as he achieved All-American status at the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Indoor Track and Field Championship. In the process, the fifth-year photographic management major became the first RIT athlete to be All-American in three different sports.

Ruston placed fifth in the 5000 meter run with a time of 14:45.13. A placing of sixth or better receives an All-American standing. He qualified for the March 15 meet, held at Bethel College in Saint Paul, Minnesota, on the last possible day. On Sunday, March 9, Ruston's clocking of 14:42.6 at the University of Florida's Fast Time Invitational made him the final man in the NCAA field of eleven with one-tenth of a second to spare.

Ruston is one of four NCAA Division III runners in the United States who is presently All-American in cross country, indoor track, and outdoor track. The others are Arnie Schraeder (University of Wisconsin at Stevens Point), Jukka Tammissuo (Saint Lawrence University), and Jim White (Southeastern Massachusetts College). Ruston has particpated in the last five national

championships and currently holds 13 records. He is competing in his last season of outdoor track, as well as RIT athletics.

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
