



## **REPROFILE**

The Gary Hart/Jim and Tammy Show, and subsequent demise, has highlighted just how powerful the press can be. The Charlotte Observer and The Miami Herald were unquestionably within their constitutional freedom to print what they did. In doing so, they thoroughly destroyed the integrity of one America's most popular evangelists, and ruined the campaign of a powerful presidential candidate.

More important than the constitutionality, are the ethics of writing and printing these types of stories. Always popular reading, every news reporting organization is frequently tempted to print juicy articles about influential and powerful people [even Reporter]. Good taste has prevailed. Cheap shots, while not exactly rare, are normally not as extensive or damaging as the most recent. In the past, a story about Jim Bakker fooling around with a secretary would have appeared in the *National Enquirer*, and after a few denials by

Bakker, the matter would have been dropped. Since both stories were printed by Pulitzer Prize-winning newspapers, not predisposed to sensationalism, they have become legitimate news stories.

Is this a trend? Are our quality newspapers and magazines going to start staking out the residences, follow important people on vacations, spy on them in bars in order to get their stories? I hope not. We can only hope that editors around the country are telling their reporter's not to pry into the personal lives of public/famous individuals in search of stories. What would have happened if Woodward and Bernstein had been staking out McGovern's place instead of listening to deep throat?

News reporting is a difficult business, to get a good story takes many interviews, searches through reams of dull paper, cross checking of facts, and many hours of writing and rewrites. *The* 

Charlotte Observer did a good job, but the focus of the story should have been on the financial shambles of PTL not on some bimbo in a hotel room. The Miami Herald should be ashamed, watching a candidate's house is not reporting. Rather, it is work done best by tabloid photographers.

As for Gary Hart, he should have stayed in the presidential race. Every voter who has slipped away into an short, unpublicized affair would have voted for him out of sympathy. How ironic it might have been for *The Miami Herald*, by discrediting him, they might have ultimately put him in the White House.

#### We Need Any Money

On behalf of the Campus United Way Steering Committee, we would like to respond to Professor Richard Walton's letter (May 1 issue) regarding the campaign material he received.

Neither the United Way materials nor the supplementary information developed for RIT personnel was meant to suggest that small contributions would not be acceptable. In fact, in our RIT campaign we have always stressed that any contribution is greatly appreciated and that individual giving is a very personal decision.

Several years ago, RIT initiated a payroll deduction option for those who found it more convenient to make their gift in periodic installments. For the convenience of this option, donors were requested this year to donate at least 30 cents per week. Those not wishing to donate this amount were of course free to choose a different payment option. This level of giving also provided donors an opportunity to participate in our United Way raffle, including over 20 prizes donated by area businesses and RIT departments.

Donors to the United Way also have the option to designate all or part of their gift to a particular agency, or to request that a particular agency not receive any portion of their gift. This is known as the

donor option. This year, the United Way asked donors choosing one of these options to make a donation of at least \$25. Again, contributions of lesser amounts were most welcome as general contributions.

The United Way explains the need for the \$25 minimum in the donor option as

"The extra steps involved in processing a gift in the donor option plan are the same no matter what amount of the gift. Handling contributions of less than \$25 [with donor option] would increase fundraising costs exorbitantly. At the same time, we encourage those individuals who wish to designate lesser amounts, to send their contributions directly to the agency instead of through the United Way."

It is to our local United Way's credit that they have been able to retain as low an adminstrative overhead cost as they have (it is the lowest in the country among United Way organizations), and still offer donors a wide range of payment options and choices as they have. For example, individuals may designate their gift to any human service agency, including those that are not regularly funded by the United Way. It also should be noted that the minimum donor option has been in place for some time and there has been no change in the past two years.

The United Way recognizes and appreciates the fact that all donations, large and small, are vital to meeting the human service needs of the Rochester community. This year, the United Way is hoping to raise \$30 million, of which approximately 60% will come from individual employees of local companies and organizations.

The RIT Steering Committee has made every effort to make our campaign a participatory one and we welcome suggestions from the RIT community. We are also most interested in responding as forthrightly as possible to any questions or concerns and hope this letter adequately addresses Professor Walton's comments.

Allen, Jr. held in the evening of Monday, April 27, 1987, along with the members of the Department of Campus Ministries.

Secondly, I wish to commend Adnan Derti, a student reporter for the REPORTER who managed to do a basically sound job in covering the event in the evening. I do wish he had managed to include the major supporters (at the least) of the the observance, instead of relegating this department (the Department of Campus Ministries) to the sidelines. Without it, I am not at all certain that this two-part observance would have occurred!

Thirdly, there were some errors in the article which need correcting: Mr. Allen never once mentioned "persecution" of Nazi war criminals. His remarks dealt with investigation and *prosecution* within the criminal justice system. Perhaps this was

a typographical error.

Finally, Mr. Allen did not say that he was unalterably opposed to the death penalty for all Nazi war criminals. What he did say was that he did not favor its use in the case of John Demjanjuk, who is accused of being "Ivan the Terrible" and who is now on trial in the State of Israel.

#### Problems Solved

During my stay here at RIT I have heard of three major problems which are communications, student involvement in campus activities and school spirit. I believe these problems can be resolved with the full commitment of everybody at RIT: students, faculty and staff. As I graduate I would like to suggest a few solutions to these problems.

We have two major communication sources on campus: REPORTER and WITR. REPORTER can do wonders if it starts giving more importance to students and student organizations. Instead of record and film reviews (which readers can find in other off campus magazines), it is more important to inform the RIT community about what is going to be happening the coming week on campus and cover important events after they take place. I would say that the phrase most commonly used on campus, "There is nothing much to do on campus," is partly REPORTER's fault, because students never come to know what is really happening on campus.

According to a survey, only five percent of the total RIT population listens to WITR. This is not suprising, since WITR plays music which is not acceptable to the majority of the RIT population. It seems that these organizations are only meeting the objectives of the people in the management. Bureaucracy has prevailed in these organizations. These organizations should listen to what the majority of people have to say and act accordingly.

Physical education is good for the physical development of students and I believe participation in activities in different roles is good for the development of a student's personality. These activities are a good source for learning how to communicate well, manage people and work as a team. These three things are the basis for performing any kind of job we will be doing after we graduate from RIT. Why don't we give much importance to participation in these activities? ## Final Meeting For SD

This weeks meeting of Student Directorate was sparsely attended, despite the rather important issues on the agenda. This was the meeting to accept next years operating budget, which is usually a hotly debated topic. This week it passed without a hitch. The meeting was chaired by Thaddeus Pruss, vice-chairman. Larry Masle, chairman, was absent. Director of Finance, Bobby Fallon, had the honor of presenting the bottom line figures. The total expected budget is in the neighborhood of \$136,000.00.

The term expected budget is used because the Student Life Advisory Board (SLAB) has not yet determined the final method for dispersing funds to Student Directorate. This year marks a distinct change in the way that funds are dispersed to student groups. Historically, Student Directorate has received five eighths of the total student fees collected from tuition. The College Activities Board received the last three eighths. This system is being

completely revised by SLAB. Student Directorate will no longer provide funding for the Black Awareness Coordinating Committee (BACC) and WITR, just to mention a few. This means that the operating budget for Student Directorate will be cut at least by the amount that was spent to support the above mentioned groups, possibly more.

Under old business, a motion was made to accept the newly revised Computer Code of Conduct. This document outlines a specific set of rules that all computer users at RIT should adhere to. The Code of Conduct has not been officially recognized by Policy Council, but a motion was made to send a copy of the document to be reviewed. The voting members of Student Directorate officially recognized the new document by a unanimous vote.

The administration has announced plans to install electronic bulletin boards across the campus to help address the information problem on campus. Thaddeus Pruss entertained suggestions as to where these bulletin boards should be placed. Ideas considered were; placing a bulletin board in the breezeway between the pool and the basketball courts on the quarter mile. Another suggestion was to place a board near the library and in Grace Watson dining hall for the benefit of NTID students.

Announcements were made for the student club of the quarter, this club was RITISA (RIT International Students Association). The New York State Restaurant Association was named club of the year.

This was the last meeting of the new Student Directorate for the 1987 academic year. An informal announcement was made to welcome the end of the spring quarter and to send all graduating seniors off with the best of luck.

# Defense Consultant Lectures On SDI

On Tuesday, May 5, in Ingle Auditorium, Richard L. Garwin, scientist, presented his views in a lecture titled Space Weapons or Arms Control: Which Way to Security?. Publicity flyers distributed on campus gave a brief biography of Garwin. The flyer stated, "physicist and long-time defense consultant, contributed to the construction of the first Hydrogen bomb, and has worked on many offensive and defensive weapon systems and technologies. He has also participated in arms-control negotiations for the U.S. government." Garwin, a senior scientist for IBM, is currently working on interactive systems such as touch screens. Garwin used an overhead projector to display sketches, figures and scientific and logical explanations to the audience. During the lecture Garwin's opinion of SDI (Strategic Defense Initiative) became evident. According to Garwin, our government's attempt to create a super-defense against nuclear weapons is not a wise investment for our national security, technology and

Garwin began the lecture by explaining the origin of SDI. He explained that in Ronald Reagan's attempt to protect American society from nuclear attack, he was seeking a better way to "deter" or discourage war by the conventional threat of retaliation and vast deployment of weapons. "SDI was created in order to replace deterrence," Garwin said.


According to Garwin, the principle goals of SDI are: first, to assure survival of society; second, to deter nuclear attack: and third, to strengthen deterrence by means of retaliation by making a defense that is as invulnerable as possible. Garwin then raised points to show the faults in SDI. One point raised during Garwin's speech was that it is inconceivable to base a defense in space. It would be vulnerable and costly, but also inefficient against lowflying missiles. On the other hand, there is no perfect ground-based defense. Garwin pointed out that our government is reluctant to look for countermeasures and faults to SDI, which he emphasizes as important to the conception of a defense. Because there is no perfect defense, it is senseless to envision one. Garwin adds that SDI impedes the mutual reduction of nuclear weapons. The Soviet government refuses to slow down the arms race if the U.S. deploys SDI, using the pretext that it is actually an offensive act. He cited the analogy that an armored tank in itself is not harmful, but it becomes very dangerous when weapons are added. This can be related to SDI, which is then potentially offensive.


Garwin then noted how much money is being spent on the project. According to Garwin, SDI will continue to consume more expenses as needed, while there is no guarantee for success. He suggested that SDI simply be declared bankrupt. "It won't replace deterrence," he says, while

adding that it is "not a good bargaining chip" for arms limitation talks. He says that it actually worsens the U.S. position. Garwin also pointed out that SDI impedes the advance of technology because it consumes so much effort and money. Although technology is advancing because of SDI, there should be technological adavancements in fields useful to mankind. For example, nuclear fusion, an alternative form of energy, would be beneficial to society.

Garwin added that the government is trapping itself because there will never be a definite agreement among the representatives in Congress about SDI. Therefore no progress can be made. Instead, Garwin recommends the continuation of talks between Soviets and Americans which will lead to a gradual reduction of weapons, while deterrence of war through mutual threat of attack on the population should continue. Garwin summarized his scientific and logical arguments against SDI by saying, "Everything that is planned can be built, but an opponent will find a way around it."



# THE YEAR IN REVIEW-

s the second week of the Senate/House contra hearings closes we are reminded that the Year's most significant RIT event was also tied directly to the Iran-Contra Affair: the visits from Robert McFarlane. His first visit, before the 'Iranaround' deal surfaced was well attended, but lacked the excitement of his next two lectures. His second lecture even sparked lively protests and counterprotests. For awhile, it looked as though this campus, as politically stagnant as it is, might even have some interest in things politic. In addition, there was controversy concerning the cost of McFarlane's visit; several Liberal Arts professors claim it cost over \$70,000, a charge the administration denies.

Although McFarlane dominated this year's speakers, RIT was blessed with a number of other notables. Prominent individuals who spoke on a range of topics; from Charles Allen's talk on Nazi hunting to Andrea Parrot's lecture on date rape, and Theodore Lowi's numerous discussions of the

constitution during its Bicentennial. Two lectures were cancelled, Ray Bradbury and Terri Waite. (Waite is now scheduled for the fall, if he gets

out of Lebanon).

While our intellect's expanded listening to noted speakers, our academics suffered because of a crippling power outage and a rash of bomb threats. The power outage, caused by excessive rainfall and aging electrical cables cancelled classes in six academic buildings for most of a week in late September. The cancelled classes forced the administration to cancel exam week and extend fall quarter an extra week. Though many students were disappointed with the extended quarter, most were pleased with the unexpected days off. The bomb threats, mostly affecting the James E. Gleason Memorial Building and the Chester F. Carlson Memorial Building, were a source of great distress to Campus Safety (as well as students and staff). Although no bombs were found, the threats caused the evacuation of numerous classrooms and labs. After Campus Safety investigators apprehended one culprit,

there were only two more threats, and classes have since gone uninterrupted.

While investigators were digging for clues concerning the bomb threats, patrol officers were avidly enforcing all parking regulations. The parking problem has been widely discussed this year, for the first time, it was a major source of discussion at the stuffy Faculty Council meetings. Although Campus Safety has not issued any more tickets than in previous years, the increasing number of vehicles has sparked Institute-wide concern about the problem. The academic lots get so

crowded that at times Campus Safety suspends ticketing in recognition of the fact that there is simply nowhere legal to park. Campus Safety representative Jeff Meredith concedes that next year things will be worse with the presence of new construction.

Unfortunately no groundbreaking ceremonies were held for the sorely needed library expansion. According to library director Pat Pitkin, construction has been held up on the expansion because "RIT will not build until all the funding is in place, currently we have half of what is needed." For now the


only expansion remains on the model which sits in the library lobby. Some good news on the Student Life Center however. According to Board of Trustee member Marge Fitch, "the Student Life Committee (a committee made up entirely of RIT trustees) is convinced the need for the center is real, and we may try to borrow the final amount needed to construct it." It's about time.

A note on the capital campaign, to date RIT has \$73,710,717.00 in committments. But to meet all the objectives, RIT needs to have "between 95 and 105 million in committments," according to Cy Young, Vice President for

Development.

The College Activities board had a rough year. Facing stiff competition from VCR movie rentals, their Talisman Division lost money—a lot of money-for the first time ever. The most notable of their events were the Wednesday coffee hours. On one particular Wednesday the entertainment was to be poetry readings. The readings contained words which the Ritzskellar management took offense to, and censored the readings. Although CAB attempted to program a number of nonalcoholic events, these events did not bring the crowds CAB had hoped for. CAB successfully organized a trip to the Bahamas, three bus loads of RIT students blew off Fort Lauderdale in favor of the Bahamas' Conch and Casinos.

In retrospect, it has been a better than average year here at the rock. McFarlane lit the campus up like never before, there were protests, scandals, and controversy. Things happened around here for a change. It seems that every year RIT becomes more and more like a real college campus.



# **English Consciousness With American Appeal**

Rock and Hyde. Sounds like a clever enough name for an emerging pop band; maybe it has something to do with the ambiguity of social tensions in modern culture. It turns out that Rock and Hyde stands simply for the band's principle members, Bob Rock and Paul Hyde. OK guys, which one of you changed his name? Originally from Canada, the pair first



performed as the Payola\$. "The name was a jab at the record companies," Hyde explains. "It was not the best name to pick in the world. As a matter of fact, it was the worst you could think of. People said we would sell more records if we had a different name". Merely changing images have helped some bands in the past and time will tell whether the public will take to their new style.

Under the Volcano, their first album on Capital records, is a moderately successful attempt at blending the social consciousness of progressive English bands and the mainstream appeal of American pop. The first track and subsequent single, "Dirty Water," is the most intelligent and musically-inspired song on the album. It was recorded in Rock's living room on a 24-track recording board that was in transit to a studio. "I sang the vocals in the sauna," says Hyde. A great deal of this work focuses on socio-religious themes: "If I wash my hands in your dirty water/Will your religion make me clean?" The song "I Will" follows the direction of many romantic rock anthems that emphasize committed bliss. "The Blind, the Deaf and the Lame" features a 35-voice choir in another pointed attack on religion and its misuse through the ages. As the tracks go on, the songs seem less controlled and drift toward generic pop. Says Hyde, "It is really risky having such a diverse sounding group of songs on the album. It makes it more difficult to fit us into a neat compartment, but the alternative is instant boredom." Unfortunately, it seems they did not accomplish their intended risk factor. The album's main fault is that it is not as diversified as it sets out to be.

There are, however, enough strong tracks to make this a contender on the charts in the near future if it receives ample airplay. This pair is focused in the right direction and future work could prove to be interesting if they achieve what they have been striving for. As with many new bands searching for exposure, Rock and Hyde have been touring small but well-established clubs in major cities of the North East. # **Howard Jones Synthesizes Geneseo**

Supporting his new album, One To One, British synthesist Howard Jones performed in Wilson Arena at State Universtiy of New York at Geneseo on Saturday, May 2. Jones, voted best keyboardist by Rolling Stone magazine, released his first album in 1984 which was entitled Human's Lib. Although very popular in England, Human's Lib was not well received in the U.S. It wasn't until Dream Into Action, Jones' second album, that he gained U.S. acclaim. The show was opened by Toronto-based, Frozen Ghost. Their upbeat/pop sound presented a stimulating start to an evening of lively and danceable music. Later on Jones, opened his show with a

theatrical battle between two beings. Jones and friend appeared onstage with animal-like masks and began to act out a battle with staffs in hand. Jones removed his mask and jumped right into "Don't Want To Cry" in front of a roaring crowd. Howard frequently accented his music with short mimic narrations and projected silhouettes acting out parts of the songs.

played a solo version of "Hide and Seek" from *Human's Lib*. The show also included an a capella version of his hit, "Life In One Day", with his back-up vocalists, "Afrodesiac".

The Beatles' "Life in One Day" left the crowd in awe but the show was still on its way to a higher peak. Jones and company later returned on stage to play an encore of Donald Fagen's classic, "The Nightfly". Finally, Howard went into a short story to set the scene for his final song, "Things Can Only Get Better". Jones' performance was flawless and very artistic in sight as well as sound.



# Tigers Bow In Second Round

The setting and the outcome were disappointingly familiar last Sunday, as the RIT lacrosse team ended its drive for the NCAA Division III Championship at Hobart's Boswell Field. The Statesmen defeated the Tigers, 14-4, eliminating RIT from the tournament in the semifinal round for the third time in the past four seasons.

RIT advanced to the semifinal round by defeating St. Lawrence, 14-11, last Wednesday. The Tiger offense dominated the first quarter, jumping to an early 5-0 lead. Tom Kraft led the attack with two goals, while Ted Diehl picked up two assists. The Saints came alive in the second quarter, scoring three consecutive times to cut the margin to 7-4. Tim Turner scored off the opening faceoff for the Tigers, but SLU answered with three of their own to pull within one, 8-7. Jim Connell added one for RIT before the Saints exploded for three more goals to take the lead, 10-9. With less than a minute left in the third quarter. Diehl scored off an assist from Steve Schmidt to knot the score at 10-10.

St. Lawrence took the lead for the second time at the 2:44 mark on a man-up goal by Steve Jewett. The Tigers regained their composure and the offense went

back to work. Diehl went one-on-one into the crease to score unassisted and throw the momentum back in RIT's favor. Kraft picked up his hat trick midway through the quarter to give RIT the lead, 12-11. Maintaining control of the ball, the Tigers coasted for the rest of the game. Schmidt and Kevin O'Reilly added insurance goals in the final two minutes.

The Tiger offense was led by Kraft and Turner with three goals each and Diehl with two goals and two assists. Faceoff man Mike Wojnovich boosted the Tiger effort, winning 18 out of 28 faceoffs. Goalie Dave Doughty recorded 14 saves.

The Tiger offense did not fare as well against the Statesmen. Hobart jumped to a 5-0 lead in the first quarter, while RIT missed several scoring chances. The Tigers settled down in the second quarter, picking up goals from Dan Stehn and Kraft, assisted by Diehl and Schmidt, respectively. The defense held the Statesmen to just one goal, but missed opportunities prevented RIT from turning the tide in the game.

Hobart dominated the second half, building a 9-2 lead in the third quarter. Stehn picked up his second goal, and Connell added a goal to mount a small rally, but Hobart quickly crushed it. The Statesmen added three more goals in the final quarter to put the score at 14-4. Doughty played an aggressive game in goal, coming out of the crease frequently to meet the Hobart fast break. He tallied 17 saves. The Tigers had trouble clearing the ball into the offensive zone against the tough Hobart ride. Wojnovich won 11 of 22 faceoffs.

RIT completes the 1987 season with a 12-3 overall record. All three losses were against Hobart (2) and Ohio Weslevan. These two teams meet tomorrow in the tournament championship game. The Tigers dominated the recent All-ICAC team. Tim Turner (30 goals, 5 assists) earned Player of the Year honors, while Tom Kraft (31 goals, 5 assists) picked up the Rookie of the Year award. Third year coach Bill Glennon was named Coach of the Year in the conference. First team honors go to attackman Ted Diehl (19 goals, 33 assists), midfielder Kevin O'Reilly (20 goals, 10 assists), defensemen Jim Kimmel and goalie Dave Doughty. Jim Connell and Neil Mullane were named to the Second Team All-ICAC.

# Nineteen Straight

The RIT men's track and field has found the Upper New York State (UNYS) meet to their liking. Last Saturday, the Tigers won their nineteenth straight UNYS team title. In fact, no other team has captured the overall crown. RIT amassed a total of 153 points. Hobart College finished second with 65 points, followed by Niagara University with 57 points, with Canisius College placing fourth with 27 points.

Paul Boccard won the Henry Clune Award (most points in the meet by an individual) for the second year in a row. Boccard scored 32 points on eight events. He won the pole vault (3.96 meters/13' 0"), 100-meter dash (0:11.1), and 200-meter dash (0:26.09). He placed second in the high jump (1.73 meters/5' 8") and the long jump (5.75 meters/18' 10 ½"), while finishing third in the 110-meter high hurdles (0:16.5). He also ran on the winning 4 x 100-meter relay team

(Boccard, Scott Edmonds, Glenn Marshall, and Rob Mills) and the second place mile relay team (Boccard, Marshall, John Wagner, and Mills).

Scott Edmonds won the 110-meter high hurdles (0:15.8), placed second in 100-meter dash (0:11.36), third in the triple jump (11.60 meters/38' %"), and fifth in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles (1:05.8), which was won by Dale Foster with a time of 1:00.3. Foster placed second in the 3,000-meter steeplechase (9:30.09) and fifth in the javelin (42.45 meters/139' 3 1/2"). Rob Mills defended his 400-meter dash title in 0:53.8. He also placed third in the 200-meter dash (0:23.68) and fifth in the triple jump (10.75 meters/35' 3 ¼"). John Wagner grabbed the top spot in the 1,500-meter run (3:56.7), plus he placed second in the 800-meter run (2:00.49). Todd Hinkley won the javelin with a toss of 50.77 meters/166' 6 %".

Multiple placers include Jeff Burroughs (long jump, triple jump, and 100-meter dash), Bill Enderle (110-meter hurdles and 400-meter intermediate hurdles), Chris Flaherty (javelin and hammer throw), Glenn Marshall (400-meter dash and 200-meter dash), Jim Mount (long jump and triple jump), and Rich Perry (discus and hammer throw). Other finishers include Jim Buhrmaster (3,000-meter steeplechase), Rob Dietrick (200-meter dash), Pete Jensen (3,000-meter steeplechase), Mike Lupo (400-meter intermediate hurdles), Kevin McKee (10,000-meter run), and Eric Seymour (800-meter run).

Today at the Union Invitational is the final opportunity for members of the track and field team to qualify for next week's national championships, held at North Central, Illinois.

## **Disappointing Season**

The RIT women's softball team ended their 1987 season last week with two more losses to Hamilton College. It has been a frustrating season for the Lady Tigers, who finished with a final record of 2-20 overall. RIT's two wins came from Buffalo State and Elmira College earlier this season.

In their first game against Hamilton, RIT faced some blazing pitching speed, as every one of the Lady Tigers struck out at least once. After the first inning, Hamilton went out to a 4-1 lead and kept increasing it. They eventually were able to hold RIT to two hits and just three runs for the rest of the game. Gretchen Sarstedt (1 for 3) and Karen Leach (1 for 3) recorded RIT's only hits. Hamilton went on to win decisively, 6-1.

In their second game, the strong

Hamilton team again stifled any chances of RIT ending with a win. After three innings, Hamilton led 7-1, and again the Tigers were held to just two hits for the game. In the sixth inning, RIT managed to score one more run, but still fell short for a 7-2 final season loss. Again, Leach (1 for 2) and Toni Kiefer (1 for 3) had the Tigers' only hits.

For the 1987 season, Leach was the Tigers' leading hitter with a .404 batting average, leader in runs-batted-in (11), and stolen base leader (12). Following behind for the Tigers was Kris Coon, who finished with a .300 average, and Mimi Kuryak, who batted .288 and led the team in fielding average (.929). The pitching responsibilities for the season were split between Sarstedt (6.47 ERA), Becky Martin

(5.90 ERA), and Sara Johannsen (7.71 ERA). Martin recorded both wins for the Tigers this year.

Under the coaching of Janet Jones, RIT has been 24-75-2 over the last five years of play. If the women's softball team at RIT is to be successful in the future, their program must be re-evaluated. Consistency of players and their positions is important, as well as getting veteran players to return and compete each year. Perhaps an improvement in leadership is needed to guide next year's club into a winning attitude. Next season looks optimistic as the Lady Tigers should welcome back all but two seniors.

## RIT Split Doubleheaders

The RIT baseball team split two doubleheaders against Hobart and Oswego to up their record to 12-13.

On Thursday, the Tigers traveled to Geneva to take on the Statesmen of Hobart and came away with a win in the first game on Tom Reed's game-winning, three-run homer in the fifth inning. Bill Spath got the win on the mound, improving his record to 6-1. He allowed only three hits, while striking out four. Adam Dworkin and Mike Turrisi were both 1 for 2 with an RBI apiece.

In the second game, RIT not only had to battle Hobart, but the home plate umpire as well. He had no idea what a strike was, and this affected all the pitchers. The Tigers ended up on the short end of a 9-5 score. Sophomore John Loiars started RIT's scoring off with a shot over the 375-foot sign in right-center field during the second inning. Hobart came back with two runs in their half of the inning, but Loiars tied it back up with a sacrifice fly in the third to score Dworkin, who had singled. Hobart then scored three runs and never trailed again. For RIT, sophomore catcher Paul Vinges had a double with a RBI, Rob Grow was 2 for 3, Spath was 2 for 3 with a solo homerun and 2 RBI, centerfielder Dave Rogers roped a double, and Chuck LaPree hit a smash to deep right field for a pinch-hit double.

On Saturday, RIT hosted Oswego and, in the first game, the Tigers won a slugfest, 18-14. Tommy Reed was the hero again for RIT, as he ripped a 2-1 pitch over the centerfield fence for a game-winning grand slam homerun in the sixth inning. Rob Grow was 2 for 3 with two walks and two RBI, slick-fielding Mike Turrisi had

two doubles and four RBI, Rogers was 2 for 4 with a double, Dworkin had a double and two RBI, and freshman shortstop sensation Brian Marek was 2 for 4, including a triple.

In the second game, Bill Spath was going for the RIT record of most wins in a season, but his teammates failed to produce an offense, as Oswego won, 4-1. Spath allowed only seven hits, with two walks on only 83 pitches. Paul Vinges was 3 for 3 and drove in Lou Dickinson, who had singled in the bottom of the seventh for RIT's only run. Dickinson, a gold glove junior first baseman, was 2 for 3 in the game.



For the second time this season, Tom Reed is Male Athlete of the Week. One of RIT's top outfielders, Reed wielded a big bat last week as the Tiger baseball squad split with Hobart and Oswego. In the first Hobart game, Reed connected for a three-run homer which provided RIT with a 5-3 victory. At home against Oswego last Saturday, Reed was again true to the test in what proved to be a slugfest. The Tigers scored an 18-14 victory, sparked by a grandslam home run by Reed. Following weekend action, the left-handed hitting Reed was batting 315 which included a team leading 27 runs batted in and 11 doubles. He also leads the team in slugging percent (.575) and fielding at a .957 average. A transfer from Monroe Community College, Reed majors in criminal justice at RIT.

It was an awesome weekend for senior Paul Boccard. Competing in the Upper New York State (UNYS) track championship at RIT, Boccard ran off with the individual point trophy (Henry Clune Award), scoring 31.5 points. He captured titles in the pole vault (13'0"), 100-meter dash (:11.1) and 200-meter dash (:23.09), and combined with teammates for top honors in the 440-yard relay (:44.7). Boccard also took second in the high jump (5'8"), long jump (18'10 1/4") and as part of the mile relay (3:38.1), and wa third in the 110-meter high hurdles (:16.5). RIT captured its 19th straight UNYS championship totaling 153 points. With his versatility, Boccard has a chance of qualifying for the nationals in the decathalon. He majors in physics at RIT and maintains a 3.59 grade point average.




