

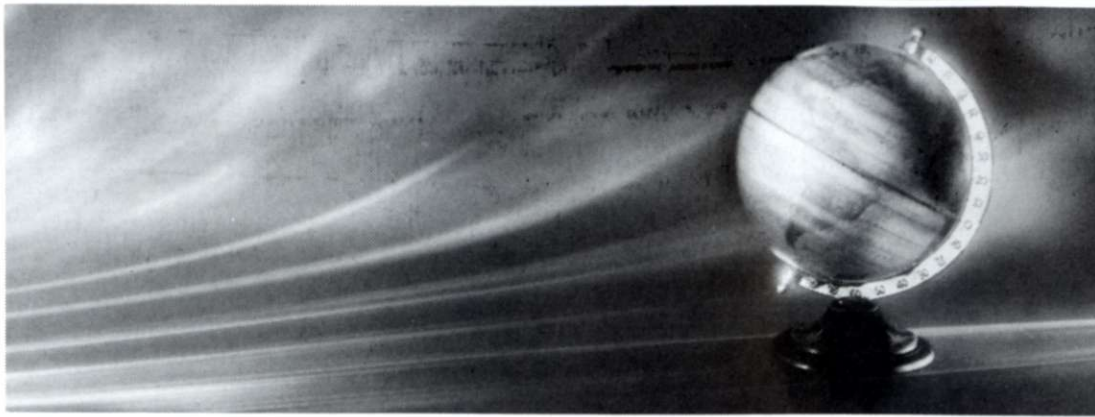

# Around the Campus

## Castle Development and Advancement

Dr. William E. Castle has been named Interim Vice President for Development, assuming the duties previously held by Vice President Cy Young who quietly vacated the office last quarter. Castle will maintain his duties as Vice President for Government Relations and Director of NTID. RIT President Albert Simone has charged an internal and external investigation into the elimination of a vice presidency by combining the two departments, Government Relations and Development, into a single department, Institutional Advancement. A search for a permanent officer will commence once a decision has been made based upon those recommendations.

## New Top Trustee

Colby Chandler, former president and chief executive officer of Kodak, has been named the new Chairman of the Board for the RIT Board of Trustees. Former chairman of the board, Thomas Gosnell, has been named Chairman Emeritus.

## Trustees Entrust Students

The RIT Board of Trustees will now invite the Student Government President and Vice-President to attend all general trustee

meetings. Previously, they were only invited to the Student Life Subcommittee meetings.

## Interim Executive Committee

A proposal was made in the November Policy Council meeting to change the Steering Committee to an Interim Executive Committee until such a time as a new structure for Policy Council has been adopted. The change was made in light of the changes towards shared governance at RIT including the creation of a Staff Council. Proposed membership was: Institute President, Student Government President, Faculty Council Chair, Staff Council Chair, Deans' Council representative, and the Executive Vice-President.

## Army ROTC Takes Honors

RIT's Army ROTC took two honors in recent competition. This fall, the Tiger Battalion was named the best in the Northeast Region in the Medium Category and will receive the prestigious MacArthur Award. In late October, the Ranger Challenge Team won the 2nd Brigade ROTC Ranger Challenge held at Fort Dix, NJ. This is the second time the RIT Rangers have won the meet since 1990.

## NTID Receives Workshop Grant

NTID has received a grant of \$29,000 from the NEC Foundation of America to support its workshop "Teaching Mathematics and Science to Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing Students." The 2 1/2 day workshop, offered in various locations throughout the United States since 1989, is provided to educators who teach grades 6-12.

## Expanded Library Computer Service

The library has added Reader's Guide and General Science Index to the on-line menu on the library's 'Einstein' computer system.

In addition you can now fill out interlibrary loan forms on-line. 'Einstein' also allows you to limit the search of films and videos to search for captioned versions. Finally, the library has added VAX terminals to the AfterHours Room and the second floor MicroVAX area.

## The Last Day

Bob Day, Assistant Director for Public Safety, will be leaving RIT today to pursue a Fire Safety Consultant position with Phillips & Associates. Day has been with RIT for 12 years.

## "The World of Visual Communications"

An exhibition of batiks, weavings, watercolors, and tempera paintings by Sandi Inches Vasnick will be presented in Gallery Two of RIT's Wallace Library through December 19. The galleries are open, free to the public, Monday through Friday 7:30 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. and Saturday and Sunday 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. Born into a family with three deaf siblings, Vasnick states, "I adopted signing as my primary vehicle of communication, even before I became the fourth deaf sibling at age six." Expressing the importance of visual communication, hands and eyes are often employed as the primary motifs in Vasnick's works.

## Alumnus With Wings of Gold

C.J. Deni, RIT NROTC graduate and former soccer player, has completed his naval aviator training and is now flying F-14 Tomcats for the Navy. "Landing at night on an aircraft carrier is definitely not fun. When you are preparing to trap (land) in an aircraft traveling 400 knots, the battle group below you whips by very quickly. We have to be able to land on a small surface traveling away from us while flying 150 miles per hour," Deni described in a naval public affairs interview.

# Prophet Jesus in Islam

"Early 'Christians' had celebrated the birth of Jesus (peace be upon him (p.b.u.h.)) for over the first three and half centuries on March 25," comments Alaaddin Shahbazz, an Islamic scholar, "But the Pope of Christendom, Julian II, in the year 345 A.D., decreed that Christians should unite with the followers of Mirtha and of Bacchus in celebrating the rebirth of the deity under the solar symbolism at the winter solstice." Muslims, in agreement with many Eastern and Western historians and scientists, feel that there is no accurate record of Jesus's (p.b.u.h.) birthday.

However, the belief in Prophet Jesus (p.b.u.h.) by Muslims is a fundamental article of faith in Islam. "Jesus (p.b.u.h.) is not only a historical fact, but also one of the distinguished prophets of God," explains Dr. Shafiq, the Islamic representative at RIT's Interfaith Center and the Imam at the Islamic Center of Rochester. Moreover, every Muslim accepts Jesus's (p.b.u.h.) fatherless birth, his miracles, and his revelations. Yet, every Muslim continues to testify that God exists in perfect unity and not trinity, and that Jesus (p.b.u.h.) was not the son of God but only His prophet.

The Islamic scholar Hammudah Abdalati emphasizes this point by reasoning that one of several manifestations of God's power is shown through His four types of creations. The first, had been that of Prophet Adam (p.b.u.h.) without a father and mother; the second, of Holy Eve (p.b.u.h.) without a mother; the third, of many people with both a father and a mother; and the fourth, of Prophet Jesus (p.b.u.h.) without a father. Hence if Jesus ((p.b.u.h.) were to be God, then Adam (p.b.u.h.) should surpass this status.

The Holy Qur'an describes Jesus's birth. It goes on to say, "That is Jesus, son of Mary, in word of truth, concerning which they are doubting. It is not for God to take a son unto Him. Glory be to Him! When He decrees a thing, He but says to it 'Be', and it is." (Qur'an 19:34,35) "Truly the likeness of Jesus, in God's sight, is as Adam's like-

ness; He created him of dust, then said He unto him 'Be', and he was." (Qur'an 3:59)

Furthermore, Muslims do not believe that Jesus's (p.b.u.h.) miracles distinguish him as God. There are of record, several prophets before him who could also perform such wonders. Jesus (p.b.u.h.) is also viewed as a prophet to whom the original Gospel was revealed. While Muslims accept the original Gospel (referred to as Ingeel in the Qur'an), they believe that it has been changed over time and no longer exists. This fact is verified not only by the Holy Qur'an, but also by both Western and Eastern historical and religious scholars. As a consequence, God sent the Holy Qur'an to restate and complete His message. The Holy Qur'an, as it exists today, is identical to that which was revealed to Prophet Muhammad (p.b.u.h.).

The Holy Qur'an also clearly states that Jesus (p.b.u.h.) was never crucified. "In fact, the four Gospels present contradictory statements on this most significant event in Christianity," said Dr. Shafiq. "Thus, some early Christians like the Bacilidians did not believe in Jesus's crucifixion, but thought someone else was crucified in his place. Also the Gospel of St. Barnebas supported this theory of substitution on the cross."

"The mission which God entrusted to Jesus (p.b.u.h.) was not salvation through total atonement by blood sacrifice, but salvation by virtue of right guidance and self-discipline," stressed Abdalati. The Islamic doctrine does not preach that human beings are fallen by nature. All people are held accountable for their deeds.

The Islamic Center of Rochester will further discuss Jesus (p.b.u.h.) in its next publication of 'AlSiraj'. For further inquiries about Jesus (p.b.u.h.) in Islam, or other Islamic issues, contact Dr. Shafiq at the Islamic Center of Rochester at 442-0117.

## A New Campus Chronicle Is Proposed

Extra extra! Read all about it! RIT may soon have a new university newspaper. According to President Simone, Faculty Council initially proposed a publication to share Faculty concerns and news with RIT. With consideration President Simone has recommended a university newspaper be created.

"It would help create a sense of community amongst students, faculty, administration, and staff... to share goals, trust, and to work together," stated Simone. "It would provide ample communication and access; it would be a vehicle for universal interests such as tuition increases, administrative decisions, new programs, admissions information, and ethics.

The proposal, available on VAX Notes under College Life, states the newspaper would be weekly; expressing viewpoints and to provide an outlet for reports of campus organizations. The newspaper would be run by the Newspaper Publication Board (NPB) appointed by the President in staggered three year terms. The NPB would include both inside and outside university members. A managing editor with extensive journalism experience would be hired to oversee operations. The President would help create and set goals and objectives with RIT's Policy Council for the NPB, and for the selection criteria for the NPB members. The proposal suggests the newspaper could be done in-house, on newsprint and will use advertisement for its revenue. It's possible subscriptions will be offered as well.

Early rumors suggested this new publication would replace REPORTER magazine and/or New and Events. It will do neither. Says Simone, he hopes the newspaper will "capture life on campus and will supplement and compliment the REPORTER and News and Events."

At this time President Simone is still meeting and discussing the proposal with the various organizations and groups on campus. If the proposal is accepted and further developed, it's possible the new publication could be out by next September.

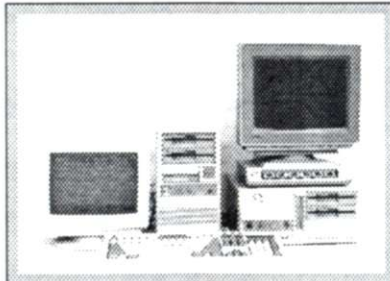

# Hollywood Goes Awry For Men's Soccer

It had all the makings of a Hollywood script. Following a defeat by Union College, the Men's Soccer team shuffled a few of its players around, including moving defenseman Jason Rich up to offense. There, he excelled, working extremely well with Scott Randall whose long kicks set up many a goal by Rich who headed them in. The team finished off the season strongly and managed to secure the final bid in the NCAA playoffs. It marked the tenth trip to the NCAAs in the past 11 years.

But naturally, being the lowest

seed in the playoffs meant they would have the toughest road through the regionals. The Tigers would have to face two undefeated teams in order to advance through the playoffs, including undefeated Hobart, the number one ranked team in the nation, a team that had destroyed the Tigers 5-2 in the regular season.

The Tigers faced Hobart in the first game of the playoffs and within 12 ticks of the clock, Hobart jumped to a 1-0 lead. There had to be the question in people's minds, "Are they going to control

us again?" But true to the Hollywood script, the Tigers toughened up and held Hobart to just that one goal. Yet, they could not seem to score a goal of their own. Time was running down. The Tigers were pressing, but could not convert. Then, with about nine seconds left, the ball was kicked over the end-line, giving the Tigers a corner kick. But with just nine seconds left, they would not have time to set up a play, not have time to bring Randall from the sweeper position, the defenseman furthest away from the opponent's net, to take the kick. Then, the miracle happened. A Hobart player was injured on the play and remained on the ground, thus the referee was forced to stop the clock. Just five seconds separated Hobart from victory and the Tigers from defeat.

The player was helped off the field and the Tigers set up for their corner kick. The referee blew the whistle and play started. Randall sent the ball into the goal area and Rich leapt to meet it. He headed the ball into the net, stunning the Hobart team and crowd. The game went to overtime.

As was the case through the majority of the game, neither team was able to battle past the other's strong defense and score. So, as light began to fade after two overtime periods, they went to penalty shots. RIT won the battle of the penalty shots, 4-2, thus winning the game. Drama enough to make

any Hollywood producer smile. But it was not finished.

Now the Tigers were to face Plattsburgh State, also undefeated through the season. As with the Hobart game, the Cardinals took an early lead, scoring just one and a half minutes into the game. Again, the Tigers then shut them down and took control of the game. This time, they did not wait until the waning seconds to tie the game up, but once again, when regulation ended, the game was tied. And once again, it was Scott Randall and Jason Rich who tied the

game, doing so midway through the first half.

For the second day in a row, the Tigers were embroiled in a double overtime game. On this day, it would go further. With enough daylight to continue playing, they went on to a third and fourth overtime. With the clock winding down on the fourth and final overtime period, Randall connected with Mark Vaughn to chalk up the winning goal, making RIT the winners of the Northeast Region.

RIT's next opponent was Western Connecticut State, winners of the New England Region. Laying at home on a snow covered and rain soaked field, the Tigers dominated. On this day, they did not allow the early score. In fact, they allowed no goals, goalie Doug Kaufman making five saves to preserve the shut-out. The scoring team of Randall and Rich opened up the scoring with one of the prettiest goals seen in a long time. Randall took a free kick from near the mid-field and sent a high, long kick to

the far post where Rich jumped up and over the defender set to cover him and headed the ball into the far side of the net. RIT scored two more goals to guarantee the win. Rich fed teammate Charlie Stead in a scramble in front of the net just six minutes later to put the Tigers up 2-0 at the half.

In the second half, John Ilijevski was sprung on two breakaways. He missed on the first attempt, but a few moments later, Randall hit him with a long feed for his second breakaway and this one he put past the Connecticut goalie. The game ended 3-0 with the Tigers making their fourth trip to the NCAA Final Four in 11 years. The Tigers anxiously awaited the pairings for the nationals, and it was finally announced that the Tigers would face Kean College, the host for the final four tournament.

Kean College was a team with a few individuals of strong offensive talent and two players on their team led the league in scoring. They would represent a challenge to the Tiger defense.



Fortunately, the Tiger defense responded and shut down the Kean offense for the majority of the day. Unfortunately for the Tigers, there were two defensive breakdowns, and on the first one, Freddy Guiran, Kean's leading scorer, took advantage of it and put Kean up 1-0 at 7:57 of the first half.

As in the first two playoff games, the Tigers responded and toughened up. They controlled the ball through the majority of the game, outshooting Kean 16-7 in total shots and 9-2 in shots on goal. Midway through the first half, the Tigers had the ball deep along the end-line and sent a pass back towards the goal mouth. Jason Rich was there to try to head it in, but it was just out of reach and the goalie scooped up the ball after it went past Rich. The first half ended with Kean holding on to their one goal lead.

The second period saw the Tigers apply more offensive pressure. In the middle of the second half, their offensive drive sputtered a little, but as time wound down, they began to pick it up again. They generated a number of scoring opportunities, but were unable to convert. Kean was concentrating on taking Rich out of the play on the corner kicks, and although the Tigers were able to put some on net, the Kean College goalie scooped up every head ball or shot sent his way. Then, with about three minutes remaining in the game, the Tigers marched down the field. A shot was fired but missed.

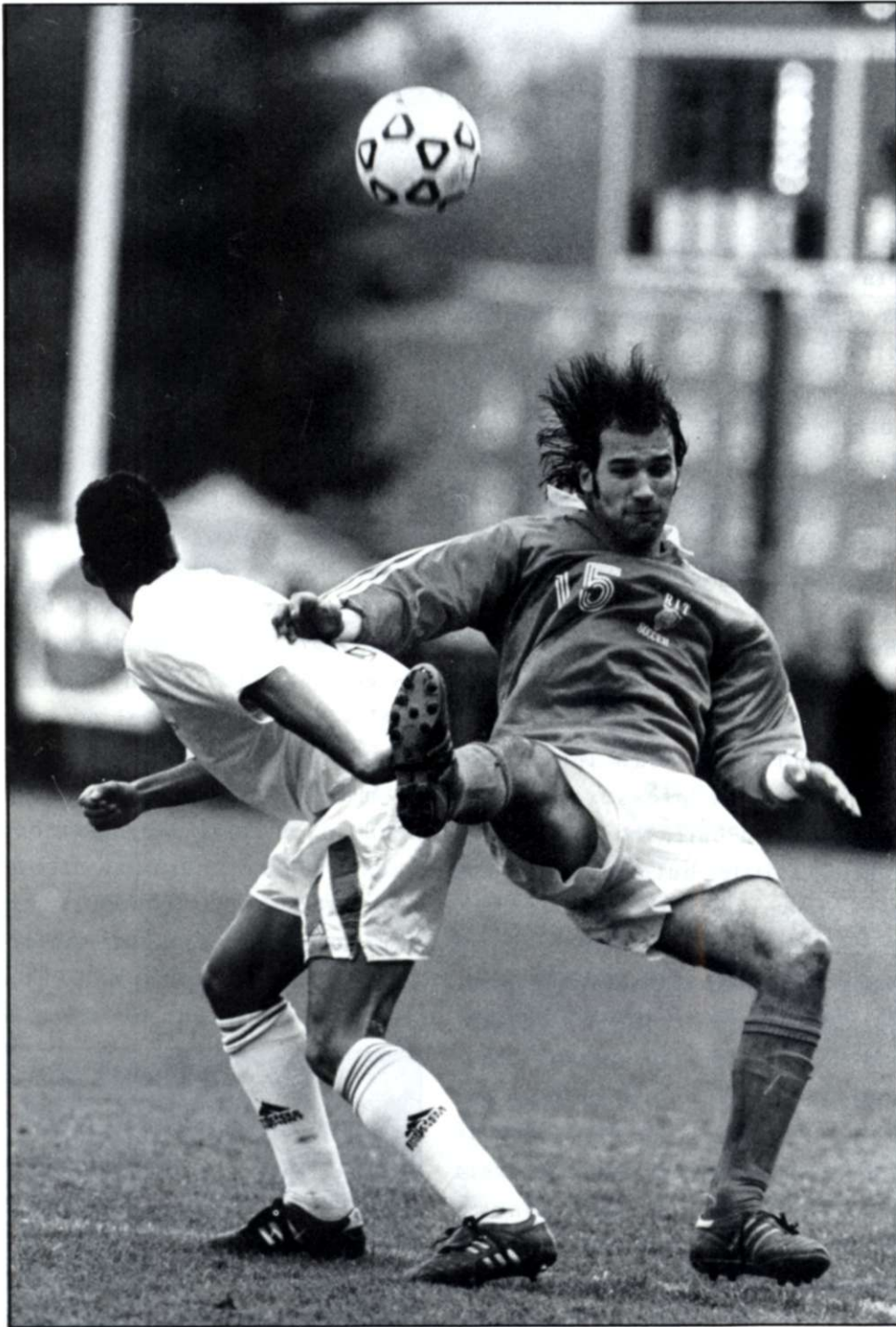
The large RIT contingent in the crowd went wild, only to drop back down in their seat in disappointment. Though it looked like the ball had gone into the net, it had actually hit the side of the net, just outside the post.

This day, there would be no last minute goal. This day, there would be no overtime. When the last seconds ticked off the clock, Kean still had their one goal lead, even though they had been outplayed for almost the entire game. There would be no Hollywood ending for this powerful RIT team. Instead, Kean would go on to defeat Ohio Wesleyan in the championship game, 3-1, to take the national title.

Though the Tigers once again fell short of their elusive goal of a national championship in soccer they can take great pride in the fact that they reached a plateau in soccer few schools ever achieve. Not only did the Tigers reach the semi-finals in soccer, but they overcame two very strong opponents just to do so. In addition, the Tigers have been achieving a great deal of success season in and season out. Few schools can claim as much. Just one acclaim has eluded head coach Doug May and the RIT Men's Soccer team: a national title. They came close this year. Hopefully they will be able to go that one step further next season.

# Malcolm

After all of the over-exposed media focusing on the budget of the film *The Autobiography Of Malcolm X* and conflicts between the director Spike Lee and members of The Nation Of Islam and many members of the Black community you would think that this movie's importance would be lessened by its hype. Before the movie began production fashion conscious people began to wear the baseball caps with the striking X on the front. This ill contrived fashion statement was ironically started by Spike Lee himself with the permission of the widow of the great leader. This hype snowballed into X jeans, sneakers and everything else imaginable by persons looking to make money off a man many people never knew.

You would think that this hype might turn many people off to the movie as well as devalue the civil rights leaders importance. Well it does not and this film's depictions of the martyred Black leaders life are as pertinent to present day America as it was to the turmoiled race struggles for equality by Blacks in the in the 50's and 60's.

The connection to present day America and the civil rights 60's is portrayed in the beginning of the movie where the infamous and still shocking video of the brutal beating of motorist Rodney King by California Highway Patrol officers is shown during the movie's credits. This footage sets the tone as it cuts back and forth between the beating and the burning of an American flag into the shape of an X. From this prelude it is apparent that you were in for an experience in great movie making.

The events which were originally told in the *Autobiography of Malcolm X*, written by the late Alex Haley were adapted to the screen by Black novelist James Baldwin and

rewritten by Spike Lee who did his own research into the life of the slain leader. The smooth flow of events is a credit to the screenplay work which keeps the movie from ever being slow paced or concentrated on any specific area of Malcolm X's life. It is not hard to sit in your seat for 3 hours and 21 minutes.

The film depicts the life of Malcolm X (played by Denzel Washington) from his teenage years as a pleasure seeking young man in the Roxbury section of Boston to his numbers running, cocaine sniffing activity in Harlem and back to Roxbury where he robs well to do Whites until he is caught along with his White girlfriend accomplice, his best friend Shorty and a fence of the merchandise that is stolen. His girlfriend is sentenced to two years while he and Shorty are sentenced to 8 to 10 year terms in a state penitentiary.

In this prison he learns the teachings of the Honorable Elijah Muhammed (played by Al Freeman Jr.) who is a self proclaimed prophet of Allah and leads a group of Black nationalists called the Nation of Islam. From his beliefs in the teachings Malcolm Little changes his name to Malcolm X, the X signifying Blacks unknown surnames and dedicates his life to Allah and The Honorable Elijah Muhammed.

The film frankly shows the impact Malcolm X has on the development of the Nation of Islam, on the Harlem community and Black Americans newfound consciousness. After the marriage to his wife Betty Shabazz and the birth of his four girls Malcolm X learns of the adulteries of his father figure the Honorable Elijah Muhammed and the jealousy of other ministers who believe that Malcolm is looking to lead the Nation Of Islam in the place of Muhammad. After remarks made Malcolm X about the

assassination of President John F. Kennedy in the news media after Elijah Muhammed forbids him to be in the United States. This leads soon to the tragic assassination of the great leader. In this process it is hinted that the government knows of the assassination before hand and does nothing.

Upon his return Malcolm X separates himself from the Nation to form his own organization according to his new beliefs on race relations in the United States. This leads soon to the tragic assassination of the great leader. In this process it is hinted that the government knows of the assassination before hand and does nothing.

This film is visually striking and brilliantly directed. It relates the conflict of the aftermath of the Los Angeles uprisings to the race struggles of the 60's. We see how this intelligent man like many Black men and women are cast aside because of the simple fact that they are Black. The scene that portrays the experience of many Blacks even today, is a scene of Malcolm as a child telling his teacher that he wants to be a lawyer but is told that he can never be because he is Black.

Harlem is shown as it might have been in those renaissance years when Billy Holiday belted beautiful notes and Joe Louis was the heavyweight champion of the world. The music in this film also helps to depict the time and place of occurrences in the film from the jitterbug dance music of the late 40's and early 50's to the Motion blues of the early 60's. This movie continually allows the viewer to experience the culture of persons of Blacks during these times.

Throughout the movie scenes flashback to struggles of Malcolm's father who was a preacher and activist who was killed by Klan members because of his separatist rhetoric and of his mother subsequently losing her children to the state. The film gives a

feeling of a Shakespearean tragedy in which the hero tragically dies, in this instance, violently like his father before him because he spoke about his beliefs openly like many leaders.

The number of extras in this film are unbelievable as Spike Lee directs a camera through the streets of Harlem over a sea of people in many scenes you can see that this film was worth every cent to tell the epic story of an important man in the history of this country. Malcolm X is on the same level of the epic film Gandhi in its relevance.

The anchor to the success of this film is the performance of Oscar award winning actor Denzel Washington who is again in the hunt for another. Washington played the role so well that he made me think that he was actually Malcolm X at times in the movie. Upon first thought I would have never envisioned the actor as being able to play the great civil rights leader because of physical differences but all that is forgotten when he first enters the second scene of the movie.

Washington portrays Malcolm X incredibly convincing in all of his stages of development. When Washington portrays Malcolm as a teenager you believe he is a naive, forever smiling, bright eyed teenager. In retrospect I can not see anyone other actor playing the role.

This film is a film that everyone should see because it effectively removes the spin of the media on a movie-goers opinions on Malcolm X and shows the man as he really was, a man. The film also is not a White bashing film in which it is emphasized that the white man is the devil but only shows events how they actually happened.

This film will remain over time a dramatic story-telling of the real man and how he became that man. Through all of the pre-movie hype this film lives up to the expectations of an epic film that tells history the way it was.

## Aladdin Rubs You In All The Right Places

With the amazing success of *The Little Mermaid* and *Beauty and the Beast*, you would think that Disney would sit back and let the profits roll in. *Beauty and the Beast* won so many awards that Disney would be crazy to tempt their luck and try another film so soon. To top last year's hit was a gamble at best.

Their bet paid off—BIG! *Aladdin* is the funniest, most entertaining animated film that I have ever seen. Utilizing their best talent from their past two hits, Disney transforms the ancient story "Aladdin and the Enchanted Lamp" into a movie that everyone can enjoy.

The story was originally part of a collection of stories known as *The Thousand and One Nights* or *Arabian Nights* where a beautiful woman is kidnapped and must entertain her captor with a different story each night to avoid a painful execution. In keeping with the theme of *Aladdin* as one story of many, the film starts out as a street merchant tries to sell the audience a beat up looking lamp. He then goes on to tell the tale of Aladdin indicating that the lamp he is holding is the lamp that started it all.

The art work and animation that went into *Aladdin* was another victory in Disney's continuing quest for the perfect marriage of hand drawn animation and computer technology. The latest trends in computer graphics and animation were used to make the picture bright and vivid. Each character was hand drawn, frame by frame, while computers developed the fantastic 3-D

images that composed the background.

Kathy Altieri, and the other 15 background artists on her team, used real Persian paintings and Islamic calligraphy to make the scenes authentic. The colors used for the characters were chosen carefully, with the "good guys" in cool colors such as blues and greens, while the "bad guys" were draped in reds, golds, oranges - the "fiery" colors to help the audience feel their evil natures.

The voices of Jonathan Freeman (Shere Khan in *Jungle Book*) and Scott Weinger (*Full House*) are joined by such well known talents as Gilbert Gottfried (Lago the parrot) and of course Robin Williams as the Genie. One production member described the Genie as "Robin Williams ad libbing with an animator trying to keep up." That is a perfect way to describe it.

The brilliant music of composer Alan Menken (*The Little Mermaid*, *Beauty and the Beast*, *Home Alone 2: Lost in New York*) and the late lyricist Howard Ashman (*Little Shop of Horrors*, *The Little Mermaid*, *Beauty and the Beast*) lend a new twist to the story. These five original songs will be remembered by everyone who hears them.



## Power Play Goals Hurt Tigers

PRIT hockey carried its 2-2-1 record into a pair of games this past weekend. The first coming at home on Friday against the Mercyhurst Lakers. The Tigers, coming off a big win over Scranton (16-0), were looking to get past the .500 mark on the season by turning away the Lakers at home. They didn't get off to a very good start, however, as they surrendered four first period tallies, two of them in a span of 31 seconds near the end of the period, to trail the Lakers 4-0 at the end of the first.

Freshman winger Jasen Wise broke the Laker's string three minutes into the second on a power play goal from Jason Supryka and Kyle O'Brien to get the Tigers on the board. The Lakers answered two minutes later, however, when Kevin McKinnon scored his third of the night and then again when Rob Madia scored on the break-away during a Tiger power play to give Mercyhurst a 6-1 lead after two.

The rest of the game saw the two teams trade goals, RIT's John Pallante on the power play, followed by McKinnon's fourth of the night, giving Mercyhurst their third power play goal. Pat Boller scored for the Tigers at 14:09, but that was negated by Mercyhurst's eighth goal, coming with less than a minute to play, to give the Lakers the 8-3 victory.

On Saturday, the Tigers traveled to Buffalo, NY, to face off against the Ice Griffs of Canisius. The game got off to a furious start, with 71 of the first

period's 111 penalty minutes being handed out before the puck was even dropped. This resulted in a Canisius power play against a Tiger penalty killing unit that had given up three goals the night before. Again, the Tigers had trouble against a strong opponent power play, and Canisius capitalized on three straight opportunities in the first period to earn a 3-0 first period lead.

Apparently realizing that giving up power play opportunities was not in their best interests, the Tigers settled down and slowly worked their way back into the game. Captain Scott MacNair led the charge as he scored the first goal and set up the next two to tie the game for the Tigers. Kyle O'Brien got the second late in the second period and Randy Cheynowski tallied midway through the third to knot the game at three.

The Tiger's valiant effort at a comeback fell just short, however, when Canisius' Mike Messina scored with only 2:06 remaining, giving the Ice Griffs a 4-3 victory and improving his team's record to 9-2 on the year. The Tigers fell to 2-4-1 and will face off this weekend in a home and home series with the Geneseo Ice Knights, starting at home on Friday at 7:30 PM. Let's hope the Tigers learned their lesson on giving up power plays and can use it to win both of these big games. I know I'll be there to cheer them on.

## Fall In Review

The first quarter of RIT's sports was a good one. All of the teams showed their skills during the season, a season with many highlights.

Women's Volleyball was one of last quarter's highlights. Coach Jim Lodes took his team to the second round of the NCAA Championship, and set a team record of 51 wins. Along the way, Liang Gaik Khaw and Kris Gray managed to be named to the AVCA All Northeast Region, AVCA All American First Team, the GTE Academic All-American District I First Team, and the All-NYSWCAA Team. Kris Gray broke the school record for most kills in a career in three years with 1355. She also had the most digs in a career at 1248. Liang Gaik Khaw set the most assists in a season with 1610, and the best assist average in a season, 10.59. Lucy Caner also achieved honors by making the All Northeast Region, and Lucy Emberg made the GTE Academic All-American District I second team.

Men's Soccer had a great season this year as the Tigers advanced to the final four where they lost 1-0 to Kean college in the semifinals (see *Hollywood Goes Awry for Men's Soccer* pg. 14) Jason Rich lead the Tigers with 34 points on the season and Scott Randall tied the NCAA tournament record for assists with five.

Men's Cross Country Team runners Greg Coughlan, and Kevin Collins were both named All-American. Collins also went on to win the EAA, ECAC, and NCAA NYS Regional Qualifier. Collins finished 15th and Coughlan 20th in the NCAA's and the team finished 12th.

Women's Soccer ended the season with a 5-9-1 record. Kim Shaver had eight points for the team. The team showed great ability at some points during the season, and is hoping for a better outing next year.

Women's Tennis ended the season with a 6-3 record. They placed fifth in the EAA's, and fourteenth in the NYSWCAA's. The Tigers had a good season and look to have a promising future.

Jensen captured first place in the 100-yard freestyle this weekend at the Empire Athletic Association Championship, with a time of :48.95. He also placed third in the 200 free, seventh in the 500 free and anchored both the 200 free and 400 medley relays, placing third in both events. Jensen's efforts led the squad to a fourth place finish, their highest finish in five years.

"This was Nick's best EAA championship ever," notes Coach Gary Mauks. "He's continuing his fine senior year."

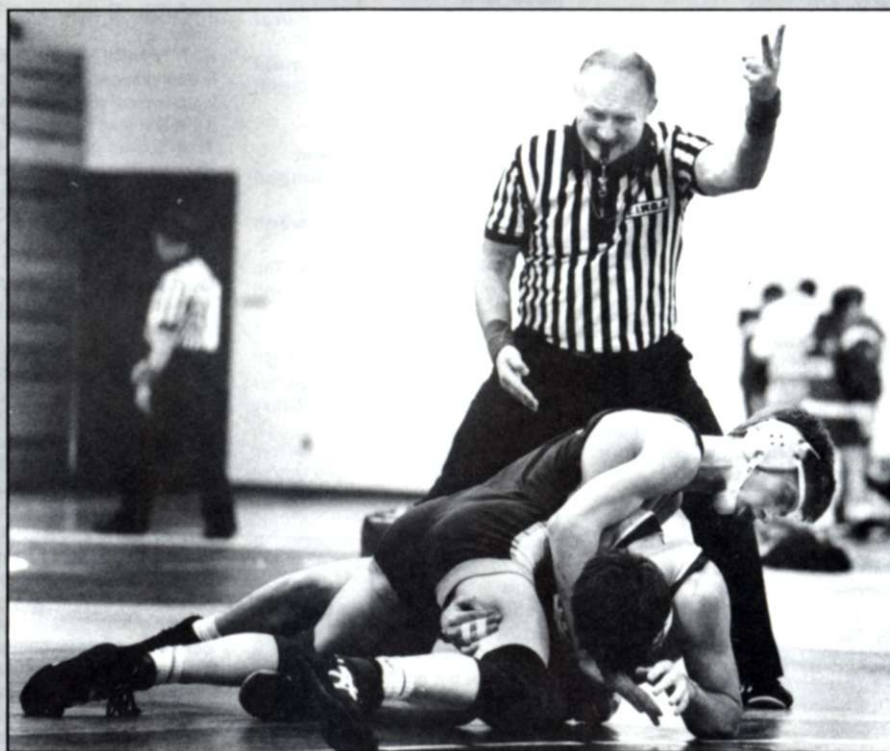
