Opinions_ Reprofile

President Clinton has just announced major reductions in the size of his White House staff. I believe it is almost time for President Simone to do the same.

Since first coming to this Institute in 1980, I have seen the size of the administrative and support staff increase dramatically. New buildings have been built and lounge areas in old buildings have been converted, all to house the growing administration. RIT has grown much too heavy in the area of middle management. Take a look at the corporate structure some time and trace the number of levels of management between the President and, for instance, a Physical Plant engineer. Above the engineer is the chief engineer, the engineering supervisor, the director of construction and engineering, the director of physical plant, the vice president of finance and administration, and finally, the president. Of course, then there are numerous "assistant" and "associate" administrators.

I do not want to make it sound like I am picking on Physical Plant. I am not. I merely chose them as an example because I had heard one of their employees complaining about how difficult it was to get anything approved due to the numerous levels of management. I am sure there are departments with an even more vertical administrative structure than Physical Plant's.

For a school that teaches Total Quality Management, RIT uses very few of the TQM principles within its own administration. Primarily, RIT needs to empower its front line employees, to enable them to handle students' problems when they occur. It is extremely frustrating to try to get something

accomplished, only to find out the person you must get approval from first has to seek approval from their superior, who naturally, is on vacation this week.

One other important factor RIT needs to keep in mind, if and when it restructures, is the need to cultivate a prevailing attitude that we are all here, working together, to better the Institute and to provide a better educational experience for the students. I will never forget a planning meeting four years ago at which an RIT employee could not go on record for being present or for providing any input. The employee's department was in the middle of a feud with the department running the meeting and his boss had instructed him not to help out. This was not a meeting to plan some benefit for the department in question. This was a meeting to examine and plan an improvement for the campus. Unfortunately, because of office politics, the plans were not as strong as they could have been. The students, and the Institute community as a whole, suffered.

I realize these are people's jobs and people's livelihoods we are talking about. In addition to being a student here, I work here full time. It could be my position that is eliminated. But if this Institute is to move forward, it must make some difficult decisions, even if it means some individuals will be forced to seek employment elsewhere. RIT can not continue to carry this administrative burden while keeping tuition low and the quality of education high.

"Trendsetters for the 'Upliftment' of Humanity" would be one way to describe Alpha Phi Alpha, the first Greek letter organization recognized by RIT established for Blacks. Although their recognition was recent, Alpha Phi Alpha Mu Sigma Chapter has been chartered in Rochester since January 22, 1977. Along with their recognition, Alpha Phi Alpha has gained a greater exposure to the RIT community, one that is already showing the fraternity's positive influence on the campus.

There are nine men from RIT and three from the University of Rochester that make up the brothers of the Mu Sigma chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha. Unlike most fraternal chapters, the charter for Mu Sigma encompasses RIT, the University of Rochester, and Hobart College because there is a small percentage of African-American students at the three schools. The membership of the RIT chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha may be small, but there is justification. Alpha Phi Alpha is a highly selective fraternity with only the best men obtaining brotherhood. (The Mu Sigma chapter's membership will most likely increase in the next few years now that they are recognized by the Institute.) This can be seen on a world-wide scale with the ranks of Alpha's from other chapters including Duke Ellington, General Colin Powell, baseball great Jackie Robinson, W.E.B. DuBois, Frederick Douglas, Olympic track star Jesse Owens, talk show host Montel Williams, New York City mayor David Dinkins, former Dallas Cowboy Tony Dorsett, football great Art Shell, former Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall, and the great Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., with the list continuing.

Alpha's performance captivated all who attended the evening's festivities.

As it can be seen, Alpha Phi Alpha goes for quality not quantity. Statistics also prove the high quality of Alpha Phi Alpha. Professionally, sixty percent of all Black doctors are Alphas, as are seventy-five percent of all Black lawyers, sixty-five percent of all Black dentists, and approximately ninety percent of all Black college presidents.


Alpha Phi Alpha is the oldest and largest Black Greek letter organization—founded at Cornell University on December 4, 1906. The founders of the


fraternity, also known as the Seven Jewels, created the fraternity as a social and literary organization because of segregation and other problems facing Black college students. The Seven Jewels felt that because of these social problems they needed to come together for social and educational reasons. Upon that, their literary organization developed into a fraternity. Where as most fraternities traditionally resemble and take their ideals from that of the golden age of ancient Greece, most black Greek letter organizations gain their heritage from Africa. Alpha Phi Alpha uses images and songs depicting the sphinx pharos and other Egyptian heritage to represent their organization. Their basis for founding can be summed up in the aim of Alpha Phi Alpha, "Manly deeds, scholarship, and love for all mankind." Since that time Alpha Phi Alpha has grown internationally with approximately 200,000 brothers and over 500 graduate and undergraduate chapters across North America, Europe, the Caribbean, and Africa.

World-wide Alpha Phi Alpha works towards the 'upliftment' of African-Americans and positive social change for all mankind through programs such as the Million Dollar Drive to aid the NAACP, the National Urban League, the United Negro College Fund, and Project Alpha for the March of Dimes.

U of R and RIT Alpha Phi Alpha members formed basketball teams and played against each other for a winner-takes-all trophy.

The Mu Sigma chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha was the first Black Greek letter organization to become recognized here at RIT last Spring. When the Mu Sigma chapter was chartered in 1977, there were conflicts between the national rules of Alpha Phi Alpha and the Greek recognition policies of RIT However, in recent years both sides have changed in their views, and both RIT and the brothers of Alpha Phi Alpha felt recognition would be beneficial. Now that Alpha Phi Alpha has been recognized, and the recent the recognition of Alpha Kappa Alpha, a Black sorority, RIT will establish a National Pan-Hellenic Council. The NPHC is the governing body of Black Greek letter organizations, as is the Inter Fraternity Council is for RIT's twelve fraternities, and Panhellenic Council is for RIT's five Greek women's organizations. All three governing bodies, NPHC, IFC, and Panhell, will be governed by RIT's Greek Council.

The local chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha is a multifaceted group that has become very involved with the RIT, U of R, and Rochester communities. The activities of the chapter have proven to be beneficial. Earlier this year, Alpha Phi Alpha held "A Voteless People is a Hopeless People" voter registration drive. This drive is done on a national level and was started back in the 1930's. In the fall they also held the "Black and Gold Ball and Pageant," an annual event which raises money to provide scholarships for graduating high school seniors in the Rochester area who will be attending either RIT or the U of R. This year Miss Meka Jones won the award of Miss Black and Gold,

she will go on to represent the Mu Sigma chapter in the New York State Black and Gold Pageant at the state convention to be held here at RIT on March 20.

Alpha Phi Alpha has also sponsored the "Reel Black Series" which was a month long film series that honored African-American film makers. The Mu Sigma chapter also does things such as pass out safe sex flyers, hold resume writing workshops, and publish a weekly newsletter that hi-lights a famous African-American.

Most recently the fraternity held it's first annual Alpha Week which ran from February 1-7. On Monday, Alpha Week was kicked off by "Bridging the Gap" a cultural diversity workshop which brought about some good discussion on gays in the military and affirmative action. The focus of Tuesday

was and oratorical contest with the theme of "Restructuring the Black Family," winners were awarded gift certificates to

Campus Connections.

Wednesday and Thursday of Alpha Week were the first annual Black Expo held in the Student Alumni Union. Businesses owned by African-American proprietors in the Rochester area were brought in to set up displays and sold merchandise. On Friday, a candlelight vigil was held for Thurgood Marshall, honoring him and his passing into the Omega chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha. The Omega chapter is a recognition for deceased Alpha Phi Alpha brothers. Saturday Alpha Phi Alpha hosted its second annual basketball tournament at the U of R and followed up with a party and step show in the evening. The week ended on Sunday with a morning church service at the New Life Fellowship Church. The brothers of Alpha Phi Alpha felt the week was very suc-

cessful and found ways to expand on it next year.

This spring Alpha Phi Alpha will be co-sponsoring The Image Awards with Delta Sigma Theta, a Black sorority at the U of R. They will honor student leaders from RIT and the U of R.

Even with all this extensive community service and educational work, Alpha Phi Alpha is still an extensively social fraternity. They have a saying that expresses this, "We party hard, we stay up late, but most of all we graduate. We're scholars making dollars." Quite often they hold dance parties on campus, which usually have a good attendance. Alpha Phi Alpha only wishes that there could be a greater multi-cultural turn out at their events.

One thing that Black Greek letter organizations are known for is stepping. Stepping is a kind of dance that is a form of expressing the African heritage and love for one's fraternity/sorority. It originated from the tribal dances of Africa and is now a method of competition among black Greek letter organizations. A friendly rivalry exists among all Black Greek letter organizations and which fraternity is the best (in which stepping plays a big part) is considered "Running the yard." From what people say Alpha Phi Alpha "Runs this yard."

Alpha Phi Alpha would like to thank Kappa Delta Rho, Zeta Tau Alpha, and Dorothy Brown for making their transition into RIT's Greek Community a welcome one.

hen I was asked if I wanted to report on the Debate between former Black Panther Party members Bobby Seale and Idridge Cleaver, I jumped at the pportunity to interview two men ho helped advance the struggle of frican Americans in the late 960's and early 1970's. These nen along with other men branishing shotguns and pistols in lain view to all; these men who folwed police in order to make cerin that Blacks were not abused by olice; these men who were

attacked by police and fought back gun fight were here at RIT to express their views on Black Activism versus Political Action.

BACC allowed me to accompany the former Black Panther Party members before and after their debate so that I could write a more comprehensive story. This important event would only be the commencement of Black History Month festivities here at RIT. These two speakers were just the spark to set off what will be an informative month.

Bobby Seale was the first and killed many of the same offi- of the two men that I met. He wore cers who killed their members in a a black beret in the style of Black Panther which read "Seize The Time, Reach." This advertises the project he heads in his home of Philadelphia. My first reaction was that I had seen this man before. The charismatic appeal of Seale was later displayed in his memories of the Black Panther Party during the debate.

The SAU was full of tables selling African clothing, jewelry, and oils. The atmosphere was quite different than any other day I've seen in the SAU. It was filled with music and celebration from the defied the systems. The hypocrisy Alpha Phi Alpha Black Expo and seemed a lot more sunnier in the SAU lobby than usual. Mr. Seale and I sat a table where he could sell his books.

A point that our American media never divulged is that television viewers saw, but were never informed, that these were college men who debated the issues of their times on how to solve the problems of racism in America. This "Black Intelligencia" that the two men described was the combined mind power of Black college students in the United States who

that both Bobby Seale and the late Huey P. Newton saw in the racist system and the killing of Malcolm X in 1965 led the two men to found The Black Panther Party for Self Defense in October of 66'.

"If Malcolm had not been killed, the Black Panther Party would not have been formed." Seale told me as we sat in the SAU. Seale explained to me the principles that this party was based on. The most important of these principles was "to organize Black political, electoral, and community unity." The theme that summed up

their beliefs was the "Ballot or the Bullet," which essentially meant that the party preferred to use the vote to gain electoral power in the Black community. But if this was denied, violence would certainly erupt.

Along with this principle were the principles which included stressing communal education. establishment of businesses, teaching of self-defense, and improvement of housing. This ten point listing of the founding principles of the Black Panther Party are listed in Bobby Seale's book "Seize The Time."

THE STRUGGLE & THE DEBATE

Bobby Seale was a army mechanic who, after leaving, went to college at Oakland's Merick College to study mechanical engineering. Seale met Huey P. Newton and became involved in discussion both in and out of class about the civil rights movement. After becoming interested in the works of African-American authors and leaders, especially the actions of Malcolm X, he and Newton formed the Black Panther Party.

Bobby Seale, who is a powerful speaker, told us many stories about the Black Panther Party. Examples are his views on former Party member Alain Edwards who has just written a book about her involvement in the party, how cofounder Huey Newton developed the slogan "Power To The People," how Newton ran for president in 1972, and that the first Black Student Union was started by Newton at Merick College.

Mr. Cleaver arrived and explained that he was sorry that he was late. He had gone back to the hotel for some food. After the meeting of Seale and Cleaver in the BACC lounge, which was cordial but somewhat cold, we skirted up

to the backstage of the Ingle Auditorium.

The auditorium was almost full; something I didn't expect. After an opening by Minister of Information Brandon Howard, a thought provoking speech by a student, and the President of BACC. the two speakers presented their sides. Bobby Seale began and explained to the audience the principles of the Black Panther Party. Mr. Seale also described the state of race relations in that days the Black Panther Party, and the progression of these relations. This progression started with the elimination of segregation, then he moved to the elimination of disenfranchisement of Blacks, and it is currently at the stage of eliminating economic exploitation of Blacks in America.

In a slow and deliberate style, opposite of the style of Seale, Eldridge Cleaver talked about why he decided to join the Black Panther Party. Cleaver, who spent time in prison where he wrote the book "Soul On Ice," was involved with a revolutionary newspaper before his meeting with the Black Panthers. This decision came after

meeting Black Panther Party members in San Francisco. There he gained respect for them and came to realize what they stood for was important in solving the problems that Blacks faced in the civil rights movement. Mr. Cleaver's views did not seem that much different than that of his fellow party member. The surprising aspect of Eldridge Cleaver was that he supported the Governor that had barred down on the Black Panther Party for president—Ronald Reagan. He has recently changed his views on both the Reagan and Bush administrations.

When asked about the problems that Blacks face with drugs, both men believe that many Black leaders sold out to the "Just Say No" slogans and didn't do much to create solutions. Seale believes that the problems of drugs in America are a result of a conspiracy of the government to kill minorities.

The audience, which was very diverse, was pleased with the debate between the two men's. Afterwards, many people followed the speakers the for autographs, including me. The two presentations were interesting. Although they were supposed to be at odds in their style of solving today's problems in the African-American community, I didn't see that much of a difference in the means the two went about to achieve the ends of racial equality.

Loaded Weapon Shoots Blanks

The recipe is simple. Take a most of Lethal Weapon, a small chunk of Basic Instinct, throw in some Silence of the Lambs, a touch of Die Hard, and a pinch of Wayne's World. Put it in a blender and mix well...but leave the cover off. The result is Loaded Weapon/National Lampoon's latest spoof.

This mostly-star (as opposed to allstar) cast includes Emilio Estevez (Young Guns) Charles C. Jackson, Jon Lovitz (Saturday Night Live) William Shatner (Star Trek), and Tim Curry (Clue, Rocky Horror Picture Show) with cameos from such stars as Whoopi Goldberg, James Doohan, Alyse Beasley (Moonlighting) Charlie Sheen and Bruce

The story is one that most cop movies have employed but it is executed in a sick and twisted silly way. An excop (Goldberg) finds out that a local girls club is a front for a major drug

Jean-Claude Van Damme has a new flick "No Where to Run", which is not the same as all his other movies, with less high jumps and kicking, but plenty of punching and grunts. 
kiss could wake her, and since she was known to be a prude...it wouldn't happen. She placed the cooler among others in her book bag and then made her way into the forest.



RIT lost 7-4 against a Brockport squad that they should have easily laughed out of the building. Their Saturday game against Hobart was canceled due to the cold, Hobart is an outdoor rink, and as of production has not yet been rescheduled.

WOMEN'S HOCKEY RIT 6, COLBY 2

RIT jumped out to an early lead and never looked back in their first of two road games last weekend. 


Number 30, Derrick Barnett shows great effort as the puck slides by.




RIT 3, St. LAWRENCE 42

RIT won only one of a possible ten matches, with the only win coming in the final match of the day, a 5-0 decision by heavyweight Chris Merkel. The Tigers lost 24 team points on six St. Lawrence pins and another six when they had to forfeit the match at 126 pounds. The Tigers record dropped to a dismal 0-5 on the season, being outscored 194-37 by their five opponents.

WOMEN'S SWIMMING RIT 68 LEMOYNE 72

The lady Tigersharks traveled to LeMoyne last Tuesday for a dual meet with the teams from both LeMoyne and Utica. The contest against LeMoyne turned out to be a close one as RIT fell short by only four points when it was all over. Amira Gumby and Karen Strumlock paced the Tigersharks with two wins apiece, Gumby's in the 50 and 100 freestyle, and Strumlock's in the 500 and 1000 freestyle. Kathy Hugelier



also won both diving events, the required portion and the optional, while teammate Amber McFate took second in both events. Jody Thomas won the 100 Individual medley to round out the meet for RIT.

RIT 118, UTICA 21

The ladies made up for the close match with LeMoyne by creaming Utica. RIT swimmers took all but one event and took second in all but three. Karen Strumlock and Jody Thomas each won three events and Amira Gumby took two. Other winners included Allison Gilday, Lauren O'Connell, and Carrie Marlin. Kathy Hugelier also continued to dive well, taking both the required and the optional diving competitions. The victory raised the Tigersharks record to 44 on the season.

RIT 69, UR 159

On Saturday the Tigersharks went across town to meet the University of Rochester in a head-to-head contest. Amira Gumby, who has grown accustomed to winning the 50 and 100 freestyle, was bested in the 50 free by UR's Myers and didn't compete in the 100 free. Instead she entered the 200 freestyle and won that event by over seven seconds. Lauren O'Connell cap-

tured the 50 breaststroke and RIT swept the 100 butterfly, with Kelly Lindsay taking first place. Kathy Hugelier mastered the boards again, winning both the three-meter and one-meter events in record form. Kathy set UR pool and RIT school records for most points in both events, and qualified those scores for the second time this season for the NCAA championships. Despite her performance, the Tigersharks lost the meet and fell to 4-5 on the year.

MEN'S SWIMMING RIT 117, UR 144

The Tigersharks traveled to cross-town rival University of Rochester on Saturday looking to even their season record at two. The Yellow jackets had other plans, however, and beat the Tigersharks, despite winning only six of the possible fourteen events. But UR's six wins, including a sweep of both diving events and numerous second and third place finishes enabled them to out-point the Tigersharks for the victory. Women's Basketball


RIT 33, HARTWICK 67


RIT 86, RPI 83

Hugelier broke two school records at the University of Rochester on Saturday while capturing both the one-meter and three-meter diving events. She also broke the one-meter pool record at the Speegle-Wilbraham Aquatic Center, Hugelier has now attained both NCAA qualifying scores needed to go to nationals in March.




