

and I soon am graduating,


Graduating from this place that I have come to quite abhor.

Where will these funds come from? More research is needed before Physical Plant can present bids for the phones. —Alfred Penn

#### Latin culture comes to RIT

"All my life I have been stuck between 3 worlds; hearing, deaf, and Mexican" signed Victor Medina to a mostly deaf Ingle Auditorium. On Thursday October 20, 1994 Ingle played host for the "Celebrado la Cultura Hispana" (Celebration of the Hispanic Culture) presented by NTID and the Commission to Promote Pluralism. Several speakers as well as the highly acclaimed Borinquen Dance Company joined in on the celebration. All five student speakers gave a view of their culture and life stressing that though several times they were separated by communication (with their families) their culture held them together.

After tales of family and friendship, Nydia Padilla-Rodriguez and the Borinquen Dance Theater gave a magical performance, showing how lively Latino dance is. It is one of many important pieces of Latino life that reflects elements of Tiano Arawak, African, and Spanish styles of dance. "It's the flavor, excitement, and movement; at times explosive, which embodies the spirit of being alive," said Nydia Padilla-Rodriguez, artistic director of the Borinquen Dance Theatre. One student, Madelin Perez, performs with them on a regular basis. "We love sharing culture, dance, and music," and truly, when one sees Latino culture they feel it too. —PI Gaynard

#### **Financial Woes**

Kristin Jankowski, Secretary of Finance for Student Government, held the second meeting of the Finance Committee last Thursday night in the basement of the Liberal Arts building. The Finance Committee was created by SG in order to review and approve club budgets and requests for funds. Money for budgets started at \$50,000 for the 1994 - 95 academic year. \$30,000 was set aside for fund requests which are moneys asked for by a club, but not planned for in their original budget. \$20,000 was for the club budgets themselves. Clubs are asked to submit budget proposals during spring quarter. Their money is approved by fall of the following year. A problem has arisen this year as a result of numerous "stragglers": clubs who submit late budgets. 19 clubs have yet to be given budgets, 9

of which have yet to submit proposals. Approximately \$4100 is left to divide among these organizations, some of whom are asking for amounts in excess of \$1000.

Solution?

One idea was to draw money from the request for funds account. This could cause problems in the long run with other clubs who have priority requests.

A more viable answer is to divide the majority of the money (\$3500) evenly among the ten clubs and split the remainder to the nine slower groups.

The latter suggestion turned out to be the winner.

Until a set of budget guidelines is established and written in stone, problems like these will continue to plague Student Government. Helene Manglaris, Director of Campus Life, is responsible for distributing student activities fees. She feels a late penalty must be initiated to prevent such problems in the future. —AP

#### The Interfaith Chapel

Every college campus needs a quiet and meditative space to escape from the stress of student life. Reporter interviewed Father Jim, Director of the Interfaith Chapel, to find out more about this campus' place of prayer. "This is a place to reflect, for counseling those with personal issues, and to celebrate moments of rejoicing as well as moments of difficulty."

The faith communities represented are Jewish, Catholic, Lutheran, Episcopal, Baptist, Methodist, and Islamic. Although each usually holds its own services, there are Interfaith Services as well: November 22 marks the "Annual Thanksgiving Service" and the Chapel observes a day of fasting in the Fall and Spring Quarters. The Chapel also has a directory of all the Temples, Churches and Communities in the area to help students of other faiths connect with religious gatherings in the Rochester Community.

The Chapel sponsors a variety of social programs, such as the "Cropwalk," an organized walk which collects money for the hungry in the Rochester Community. In addition, Pastor Jeff Hering has organized group trips to St. Peter's Soup Kitchen.

Father Jim is optimistic about the way in which the Chapel is being used: "[The different faiths represented at the Interfaith Chapel] all interact very well. We make an effort to respect beliefs and traditions represented here. We are willing to talk to any student without the intention of converting them, and we will refer them to someone else if we can't answer their questions." He states that the personnel are always searching for new ways to involve the students, staff and faculty, especially in activities that will enrich life, not only on RIT's campus, but also the Rochester Community as a whole. The common elements steadfastly shared by all of the Faiths at the Chapel are their "Belief in God, concern for others and the desire to enrich the lives of people on campus." —Eve Saturn

#### Students speak out

Quarters versus semesters was the hot topic this Tuesday, October 25 Student Government (SG) senate meeting. The meeting has been advertised as an open forum for students and faculty to voice their opinions on changing RIT's quarter system. It is only the first of several meetings. Why bother? RIT will see numerous changes in the coming year; many of which affect the entire student body. Switching from a quarter system to semesters is one change that could turn the campus upside-down: course credits would have to be re-evaluated, curriculums restructured and rescheduled, teachers shuffled or even phased out of particular programs. Flexibility of student scheduling would also be affected.

Faculty council will soon hold an open forum to hear out more student opinions. It is necessary to hear all sides of the story before policy council meets in December to discuss and decide the issue once and for all (or at least until next year).—AP

# Fiction' Delivers Twisted Fun

Don't be misled: *Pulp Fiction* is far from the empty-headed, sensationalist orgy of carnage that its detractors are making it out to be. The film is indeed strong stuff, but those without a basic sense of humor are missing the fact that it's also a riotously funny and wholly unique renovation of every foundation of "film noire." Filmmaker Quentin Tarantino, the rogue responsible for 1992's instant-classic *Reservoir Dogs*, will undoubtedly repulse many mainstream moviegoers with this wild homage to "pulp" novels of the 30s and 40s. Regardless, those mature enough to deal with the less-than-sunny side of everyday life will discover one of the best and most original gangster movies to surface in years.

This mammoth production, which gives us portraits of L.A. hoodlums in both rest and motion, also sports an equally mammoth cast drifting in and out of Tarantino's labyrinthine storyline. During the course of the film, we meet a slow-witted mob-flunky with the worst luck in the universe (a surprisingly mannered John Travolta), a Bible-spouting hit man (Samuel L. Jackson) who is beginning to question his "true calling," a washed up prizefighter (Bruce Willis) who dares to betray a domineering crime boss named Marcellus Wallace (Ving Rhames), and even Wallace's own coke-head wife, Mia (an appropriately moll-ish Uma Thurman). All of them are lost in a modern criminal land-scape that, in their blurry and crazed imaginations, echoes not only the seediness of the "pulp" era but also the swagger of 50s' pop culture, the groove of 60s' surf culture, the "hip" of 70s' funk culture and the desperation of 80s' drug culture.

If *Pulp Fiction* sounds like an ambitious movie, that's because it is; if it also sounds like a barrel of fun, that's because Tarantino consistently plays all of his outrageous premises to their hilt. And though his characters aren't very nice, polite or even pleasant, they still come across as completely endearing, thanks to Tarantino's sharp ear for equally razor sharp dialogue. A former actor himself, Tarantino (who also appears in the film as a hilariously cranky friend of Jackson's) differs from most of his "indie" contemporaries in that he not only has a total mastery of editing and cinematography, but also the unique ability of being able to coax a convincing performance out of any actor to grace the screen. Lowbudget films usually don't have the money to invest in a top-notch ensemble cast, but *Pulp Fiction* nevertheless clicks because of the director's flair for crafting one out of what is essentially an oddball collection of has-beens, relative unknowns and few truly seasoned professionals.

It's twisted, daring, and sometimes drop-dead brilliant, but what makes *Pulp Fiction* so exhilarating is that it's so unlike anything else you're likely to see anytime soon. Though hardly to everyone's taste, it's the kind of film that could revitalize even the most jaded moviegoer's love for the medium. —*Josh Slates* 

#### Telling Tall 'Tales'

Greetings Video Viewers! Welcome to my favorite month of all, October. Why is it my favorite month? That's easy to answer—it's the only one that has Halloween in it! There's nothing better to do during such a spooky holiday than to sit down with a few friends and pop in a morbid video classic (circa 1973 to be exact). The flick of which I speak is *Tales From the Crypt*, not to be confused with the HBO series of the same name.

This film starts off with five people in some catacombs, who have gotten separated from their tour group. Totally lost, they end up in a dead-end room. When the door through which they came closes behind them and a strange man in monk's robes suddenly appears, they start to worry. And they have plenty of worries! He shows each some terror that either they have already experienced or have yet to encounter.

The first story features Joan Collins as the wife of a fairly wealthy man. It is Christmas Eve and her gift to him is a good whack in the head with a poker. On the radio, which is playing Christmas carols throughout the episode, the newsman tells of a maniac killer who has escaped a local asylum dressed as Santa Claus. She locks all the doors and windows and desperately searches the house for her daughter only to find that her little one has already found "Santa Claus."

The film makers saved the best story for last. If nothing else, the fifth story of the film makes the entire thing worth watching. This tale of terror features Nigel Patrick as a former military commander who has assumed control of an institution for the blind. Patrick has plans to run the place as efficiently as possible, which means, of course, he does not care much for needs of the people who live there. This beautiful story of cruelty and fitting retribution is punctuated by some well illustrated metaphors and a particularly creative twist.

Freddie Francis directed the on-screen terror to produce an overall enjoyable film that may catch you off guard once or twice. All in all, the stories average out to a six out of ten. Pretty good for a good late night when the wind is howling outside.



The Keuka game was a defensive masterpiece from the RIT perspective. The game marked the last game for RIT senior Tina Bartucci who closed out her career with a stellar performanc. Junior Brena Gilbert set up the first goal of the match when she dropped a ball back to Jen "Cannon" Boland, who whistled a ball from 20 yards out past a keeper who did not even have time to react. It was her first of the year.

"Bullet" Sterling completed the scoring for RIT with a goal in each half. The second one was a direct kick from 20 yards out. The goalie knew it was coming, the team knew it was coming, the two guys selling hot dogs knew it was coming. It did not matter as she blasted the shot in for the 3-1 lead that would hold for the rest of the game. St. Amand and Jen Muller combined for nine saves on the day as the Tigers pummeled Elmira for 90 straight minutes.

#### Tigers Streak Towards Playoffs

One overtime win and one shutout. The men's soccer team, unbeaten in the month of October, continued their winning ways as they defeated a tough Ithaca squad and rolled to an easy win over Alfred last week.

Last Wednesday, the Ithaca Bombers decided that someone should stand up to the Tigers. They scored a pair of early goals against Tiger players who looked like they were thinking about which party to attend that night. For the first time this season, RIT was trailing by two. However, RIT rallied. Senior Charlie Stead was tripped outside on the Ithaca penalty box in the 26th minute and the John Im to Sean Spencer combination connected once again for the first RIT goal.

In the second half, before the fans had returned to their seats with their hot dogs, Ithaca scored again to take a 3-1 lead. Around that time an Ithaca defender was ejected and the Tigers decided to wake up. Two minutes after the Ithaca goal, Jeff Thomas headed home a Kirk Sinkins cornerkick to cut the lead to 3-2. The equalizer came in the 84th minute when Tom Casciani beat his man around the corner and played a great ball back to Spencer, who blasted it past the Ithaca goalie for his eleventh tally of the year. The scored stayed knotted at 3-3 until the end of regulation time.

# From the

Ghosts, Hauntings, Apparitions, and Demons

NE NIGHT, MARIA WAS LYING ON HER BED, HAVING TROUBLE getting to sleep. After watching some television, though, she drifted off at about 4:30 in the morning. Less than an hour later she was awakened. Looking down toward the end of her bed, she saw a young man standing there. His red baseball cap was pulled down, hiding his eyes. It almost looked like someone she knew; then a thought crossed her mind. She knew she had locked her door and that there was no way anyone could have gotten in. Thinking that it may just be a trick of a tired mind, she closed her eyes and she thought, "He doesn't look like a ghost." When she opened her eyes and saw that the solid-looking man was still there, she jumped out of pure surprise. As she lay there, he crouched down, smiled at her, and faded out of existence. Every night after that, she would awaken at the same time, usually she would see nothing. One night, though, she saw a man crouching next to her bed, smiling at her. It did nothing else, but vanished promptly as she became more aware. She doesn't feel as though it was the same form from a few nights before.

A couple of weeks after her first encounter with the odd fading man in her room, Maria had a dream that struck her as equally odd. She dreamt that she woke up to the feeling of a cat walking across her comforter. Looking down at the end of her bed, she saw an old woman dressed as a nun sitting there. Maria asked the woman if the ghost was coming. The woman answered that he would be there soon. In her dream, she went back to sleep only to be woken up again to see a young man in bed with her, smiling. It was not the first one she had seen, it was the one that had appeared briefly to her after the first. They talked for a while, lying there like there was nothing at all odd about the situation. He told her that his name was Jason and that he was from Tampa. When it came time for him to leave, neither one wanted to go. But the dream was over and she awoke, remembering every detail of what had happened as if she had been awake.

While this may sound like the beginning of a new film from some Hollywood director, these events happened not too long ago to a student here on campus. This is only one of the many stories that can be found around here, not only on campus, but in the Rochester area as well. They all fall under the category of the supernatural or the paranormal because of their lack of explanation using common sense and regular reasoning. It is said that things out of the ordinary happen every day to members of the world's population. Why don't we hear about it then? Some theorize that the human mind has an amazing capacity to ignore what it does not want to accept into its view of how the world should be. Sometimes the events witnessed or

experienced are too intense to be ignored or explained away using conventional means. Other times, the person or people involved are more open to the idea of the paranormal. Usually, after getting up enough courage to ask about what is happening to them, people who have had out of the ordinary experiences can usually find their way to someone knowledgeable in the paranormal or supernatural who is willing to help them. This expert in the paranormal or supernatural can be of either scientific orientation or the more common spiritualist or psychic. Those of scientific orientation are called parapsychologists. Using scientific methods and devices of detection, they attempt to explain the phenomenon in question in order to produce repeatable results. The psychic, on the other hand, while not totally ignorant of or opposed to scientific methods, relies more on natural abilities to detect and communicate with the forces involved.

According to both psychics and parapsychologists in the area, Rochester has had quite a bit of paranormal activity over the years. This is where the spiritualist movement in America is said to have started with the Fox sisters and their spirit communication. There are also certain legends in the Rochester area that are intriguing to those with an interest in weird happenings and ghost stories. And, of course, there are haunted houses, some of which have been investigated by local psychics.

As far as legends go, one of the most popular and interesting is that of the White Lady. It is said that she can be seen in Durand-Eastman park wandering at night from the remains of

an old, stone building to Eastman Lake and Lily Pond. Her banshee-like moans express her sorrow over her child who was reportedly kidnapped, raped, and murdered by a man who was never caught. Wearing all white, she is accompanied by two ghostly German Shepherds in her search for the criminal. This story matches a typical haunting story. A spirit feels that there is some unfinished business that must be taken care of so it lingers, attempting to finish it.

Another legend of the area is the Lady in Grey at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery. It is said that around midnight she can be found hitchhiking on the roads around the cemetery. If picked up, she will want to go to Four Corners. Needless to say, she is never in the car by the time it arrives at Four Corners.

The Paddy Hill branch of the Greece public library, housed in the 150 year old building that was formerly the Mother of Sorrows Church, has a history of odd noises. A janitor regularly heard footsteps at 11 pm every night while he was in the basement of the church, whenever he investigated, he discovered that he was the only one in the building. In 1986, psychic Lydia Samuel-Hanselman was brought in



by the Times-Union to investigate the occurrences. As she walked through the rooms of the building, she began to get images and feelings of things that had happened there long ago and the people who had been there years before. She described one of the priests that had lived there, what he had looked like,

his sense of duty that kept him doing the church's work until the day he died. Shirley Husted, the Monroe County Historian who was along on the investigation, recognized the description as Father Louis-Jean-Marie Maurice, the founder of the church. Throughout the rest of the investigation, more facts about the church were brought out by Samuel-Hanselman who wasn't told beforehand where she was being taken. At the end, the historian proclaims her 90% correct with what she had said. According to believers, Father

Maurice still wanders the grounds of the church he founded, and people still sometimes have odd sensations and see move-

ments out of the corner of their eyes at the library, but, according to Samuel-Hanselman, there is nothing dangerous in the building.

Samuel-Hanselman has also investigated private homes in the area. One particular house on Carolina Street has given her an interesting story to tell. The family that dwelt there had a dog that died. After burying the dog in their back yard, a pool of blood appeared in front of the washer in the basement and would not go away. Also at this time, a lamp that they had

brought in from the garage acquired a blood stain on it that could not be explained in any way. When they called in

Samuel-Hanselman, she got the impression of a black man in a great deal of pain. After some research, it was discovered that the house was a stop on the underground railroad. Allegedly, one night the owner went on a rampage, killing and dismembering a slave in the basement of the house. When the blood stain on the lamp was looked at more closely, it seemed to look like the silhouette of a dismembered human. According to Samuel-Hanselman, that and the pool of blood in the basement was the spirit's way of trying to communi-

cate what had happened to it. It was a story that the man had to tell before he could find peace. The burying of the dog provided the last bit of energy needed by the spirit to make itself known.

Other psychics in the area also work as investigators into haunting phenomenon, and, when the need arises, may even help the people involved get rid of a harmful entity. One such

case occurred less than a year ago in Hilton. The people involved were a woman and her two teenage sons. Some problems developed in the woman's marriage, and during that time, problems with drugs and alcohol were also prevalent in the household. According to the investigating psychic, someone

> took advantage of these problems and attacked the family by sending a spirit in to wreak havoc. This evil entity caused many problems, from breaking things to physically assaulting the members of the household. Things had been going on for a little while by the time Debbie Guite, a local "ghostbuster" (for lack of a better term), was called in.

> As she approached the house for the first time, Debbie says that she saw an image of an ancient Celtic deity known as Lilith, a very powerful force of evil, in the

window. Worried a little by this, Debbie continued on into the house. Once inside, there was a noticeable drop in tempera-

> ture, it was unusually cold, especially considering that the house's heat was set at 70. After trying unsuccessfully to contact the entity with clairaudience (being able to hear things, such as the voices of spirits), she attempted to make contact using a pendulum (yes and no answers are determined by the direction of the swing). This attempt failed as well and contact was finally made through the Ouija board. The first thing that the entity said to her was "Get out." This, to her, was a good sign. It meant that the thing was afraid of her, that

she was more powerful than it was. After her attempt to talk to the entity and convince it to leave peacefully failed, she resort-

> ed to a less safe and less preferred method of ridding a house of a spirit: She attempted to force it out. This time, she was successful, and the entity was sent back to whomever had sent it to the house to begin

> Many of the psychics warned that drugs and alcohol and the supernatural are a bad mix, especially when using things like the Ouija board. Another rule, according to the pros, is don't panic-it usually only makes things worse. Some say that spirits can bring messages to us that can be very impor-

tant; if we are afraid unnecessarily, that message may be lost.

Exactly what these phenomenon are, no one is sure. All that is known is that something is happening to a number of people, in Rochester, on this campus, and all over the world. Some believe that it is the dawning of a new age of mankind, others think that it is only a matter of time before science explains it all. Which one is the right answer? Only time will tell. ◆





beneath the Residence Halls tunnels of the Rochester Institute of Technology this morning, bringing the total to seven in the grisly series of coed murders here on campus. A Campus Safety spokesperson confirmed weeks of speculation by fellow students as to the disappearances of the girls ranging in ages from 17 to 23. Sheriff's Department deputies using teams of dogs found the bodies in the not-known-until-recently labyrinth which honey-combs a vast area underneath N.R.H., Sol, and Kate Gleson halls. Two girls are still missing.

she described as "a thing". The girl was unable to give investigators any more information, and she is said to be under heavy sedation at Monroe County Hospital at the present time. The passageway described by the girl was marked with traces of blood from what was later found, through D.N.A. testing, to belong to one of the missing girls. Dog teams and investigators followed the blood trail to an entrance that workers opened to reveal a maze of corridors, old sewer systems, chambers and vaults that sent R.I.T. officials scurrying through old blue-prints of the buildings. Their efforts so far have produced negative results. It is believed that there are other entrances as well.

Upon learning of the sub-chambers, trackers launched a search into the network of interconnecting passages, however their efforts were hampered by partial flooding of the narrow corridors. Conditions like this, according to one State Trooper, make it difficult for the dogs to stay on a scent. Indeed dogs had picked up several trails only to be frustrated by circumstances which include not only flooding, attributed to an underground spring, but decaying mortar that loosens the stonework making cave-ins a real possibility.

A breakthrough came late last week when dogs following yet another scent, discovered a small cell of slime-covered confrontation." Searchers would not say exactly what happened, but reports are that two of the State Police German shepherds have been badly hurt and what is additionally troubling—two others are missing.

Who or what is responsible remains a mystery at the moment but there have been several theories offered that some large animal, like a bear, has gotten into the system down there, but others were quick to disagree. Eye witness accounts of the attack differ in several aspects, most noticeably though, in the physical description. Where the "official" eye wit-

ness version is of a large hairy animal-like beast resembling a lumbering bear, other accounts are of a large shinny-skinned human-like manifestation that was quick and agile in moving through the darkened labyrinth.

The concern is that without a clear description of the thing



gation other than they have been in contact with New York authorities and both agencies are working together to bring about a swift end to these bizarre slayings.

Still another school, Syracuse University here in New York had a number of like occurrences that surfaced over the summer months. There the remains of ten students, two men and eight women, were discovered in an old boiler room abandoned for years at the university. Representatives from the school mentioned that the investigation hit rock bottom when reports began to surface of two bizarre sightings by campus work-

ers of some kind of large animal living in the abandoned service sections on campus. Officials there went on to say the disappearances stopped after a scheduled renovation of the area began in August. That coincides with the time troubles began here at R.I.T.

According to Campus Safety personnel speaking on condition of anonymity, the disappearances began the first week of the quarter and have continued into October. responsible, Campus Safety officials may not be able to quell any panic-driven exodus from campus. "We do not want to cause needless fear and panic on this campus with unsubstantiated rumors of monsters. The very idea is totally absurd."

Yet there have been other reports of similar disappearances at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst from January until April of this year. There, where the on-campus population is as large as R.I.T.'s, thirteen college girls were slain in a string of unsolved mutilations. Massachusett State Police conducting the probe had little to say about the on-going investi-

Amid these calls for calm by R.I.T. officers there is the huge cloud of uneasiness that has descended over the institute these past few weeks due to the disappearances of the young women and the realization that we may not be alone on this campus.

There may indeed be some "thing" that drools and goes "bump in the night". Some "thing" that is there in the catacombs beyond the sealed entrance to the sludge-pools, which lies waiting under a blanket of darkness. When it opens its maw the stench of rotting corpses fills the stagnant air, and when it speaks its voice is low and dry like the rustling of leaves in a midnight graveyard. For it just may be that you find yourself in its grasp, and as you gasp your last breath you hear, hissed through poison lips, the sick wish of evil itself: "Happy Halloween." \(\infty\)

A committee was immediately instituted with representatives from SPIRIT, Financial Aid, Planning and Utilization, the Hizb'ullah, and Bi-GALA to look into the matter and provide some answers. Today, at a press conference, the committee presented their findings and reconstructed this gruesome incident.



It's weird, you know? I didn't feel anything. One minute I was falling, and then I was just standing there, like nothing had happened. But I was still on the ground. I

was just lying there, dead. Then my friends came down, and they tried to help me, but they couldn't see me, they couldn't see what I was.

Reporter: So, why are you here, John? Why did you want an interview? Why can I see you now?

**Claris:** On certain days and near certain things, you can see me. My birthday, Christmas, and obviously around Halloween. There are a lot of things running around on Halloween, if you look close enough. And, as for the interview, I just needed to say good-bye. I needed to get everything in order before I go.

**Reporter:** Who do you need to say goodbye to, John?

**Claris:** Well, first, I wanted to tell my parents that I loved them, and that I'm sorry for all the pain they went through, and that if they need me, that I'll be there, and that I'm listening. And I wanted to apologize to Brenda.

(Brenda Farquin was John's girlfriend until just before they died. Apparently they had had a fight just before that party, and she was walking back to apologize when she saw John fall.)

I tried...I tried to see her, on my birthday, I went to her to say good-bye. But when she saw me, she just started screaming. Like just crying and screaming and telling me to go away.

**Reporter:** But you didn't just go to see her, did you John?

**Claris:** N-no, no I didn't. I knew the only way we could be together would be if she were to die. So I went to her so I could...so I...so....

Reporter: You tried to kill her, didn't you

John?

Claris: N-no, it...it wasn't like that. I just wanted to be near her again. I just wanted to be able to touch her, to really feel her, to spend the rest of my life with her. WHY COULDN'T SHE SEE THAT?

(Claris' s voice shakes the room and I break out in a cold sweat.)

...Oh, God. I don't have the rest of my life anymore, do I? I don't have anything. I'm just some freak now, a bogeyman, just...just this.

(Claris raises a translucent arm and the mist that comprises his hand swirls and cascades into thin air. Claris laughs once and shakes his head slowly.)

I'm nothing. Just dust and smoke and dim light.

(I sit in the glow of Claris's "dim light" while he makes a long, drawn out high pitched noise. In a few seconds I realize he's crying. A few moments later he stops.)

I guess...I guess that's it, then, isn't it? Thank you for taking the time to interview me.

**Reporter:** What now, John? Where do you go from here?

**Claris:** You know, I don't really know. But one thing's for sure.

Reporter: What's that? Claris: I won't be alone.

(With a sudden rush of black, icy air, I am knocked out of my chair. Frozen razor-blades cut through me as I fight to breathe. In a moment it ends and I'm on my feet, struggling against the suddenly locked door. Claris is gone, but a whisper of chill runs up my spine as I hear the echo of his voice skittering down the hall. I know where he's going.) —Bryan Howell
