The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as corrected; Article XII, Section 1 of the Constitution was amended. The last sentence of Article XII, Section 2 of the By Laws, as amended reads, "If Council feels that the justification is not sufficient they shall vote suspension." Nancy Schusterbauer will serve as a new Business representative. LLOYDS OF LONDON will be contacted in an attempt to insure financial loss.

Dow Hamblin, Chief Planning Director, reported of the progress on the new campus.

DIVISION REPORTS

Internal Affairs - Don Lehmbeck

As a student representative of the Funds Committee, Don Lehmbeck announced that a national Advisory Council is being formed to help with the fund drive.

Don Lehmbeck moved to amend the Constitutional By Laws (Article VII~~4~~, Section 4) by adding Section e to read, "Balloting shall take place on the fourth Tuesday of Spring Quarter. The motion will be referred to the parliamentarian.

Publicity and Publication - Ron Solokowski

Since the method of distribution of the Student Directories was so poor, every student ~~will~~ <sup>may</sup> not be ~~given~~ <sup>able to receive</sup> a copy of the publication. No extra copies are available.

The Student Association cards will be available when the names of all students, who have not received cards, are submitted by departments to Ron.

It was moved by Ron Solokowski and unanimously passed that Student Council, through Publicity and Publications Division, submit the following proposal to the administration-

1. Student Directory
  - a. Data Processing print student lists on paper offset masters
  - b. These masters be run on mailroom facilities
  - c. Student Council will help correlate and bind them
  - d. Material costs to be absorbed by Student Council

OR

- a. Data Processing make a camera reproducible copy
- b. Copy be sent to a printer for printing and binding
- c. Student Council and the Institute share (50-50) the cost

2. Student Handbook - The Institute assume authorship and publication of the Student Handbook

3. Student Association Cards - IBM style Student Association cards be included in the registration process.

Campus Activities - Joe Wimmer

A written request, proposing student rates at the Eastman Theater, must be submitted before the matter will be considered.

The Blood Drive is February 12.

Organizational Affairs - Lloyd Beard

It was moved by Lloyd Beard, amended, and passed that Student Council send a letter to the Board of Trustees in care of Dr. Campbell, stating

1. We would like to see fraternities, sororities, and their houses on the new campus.
2. If at all possible, we would like to see alcoholic beverages available in such places as the Board of Trustees deem advisable.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

The New Campus-Student Union Committee submitted a list of proposed facilities for the Student Union on the new campus. Further suggestions would be appreciated.

Don Lehbeck moved that the motion involving the hockey allocation be removed from the table. The motion was passed. The main motion was passed as follows-

It was moved that Student Council allocate \$428 of additional funds to the RIT Hockey Club from the Council Contingency Fund.

It was moved by Gene Rendsland, amended, and passed that Student Council form a committee to cooperate with the Faculty Council and encourage them to examine the teaching effectiveness of the RIT faculty and to evaluate the data collected and make recommendations to the faculty in the form of a letter to Mr. Eugene Fran, President of the Faculty Council of RIT. The committee will be chaired by Gene. Kitchen, Fairbrother, LaDuke, Saden, Black, Hlasnicek, and Skillman volunteered to help.

It was moved by Jeno Horvath and passed that the service of the RIT Bits-Skeller be investigated. Jeno will investigate the matter.


The Budget Committee will meet February 5, at 8:30. The committee is in need of better representation for anyone interested.

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Continued complaints from the students have been raised, concerning teaching effectiveness.

Examples of complaints:

- 1) Too much emphasis on factual knowledge and problem solving.
- 2) Not enough challenge in class. Students are not required to think, to organize, to create. Many co-curricular activities have become more challenging and therefore less time is spent on the scholastic part of school.
- 3) No course outlines. Many students complain that there is no organization in their classes.

The above are only a few of the complaints received. It is the responsibility of Student Council to perform tasks that will be beneficial to the student body. This is an attempt at the pursuit of excellence in education at R.I.T.
