Old Business: Presidents Cabinet Constitution was approved by SAB last week and a motion was on the floor to passit. It was passed with no disoussbon.

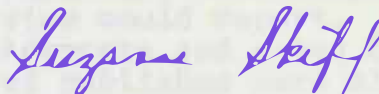
New Business: Resolution #61 was presented by Denny Ortman. There was an objection to consideration and it was passed. The resclution was not discussed. Resolution #62 was presented
