# 1982-83 Caroline Werner Gannett Professor in Humanities Named

Dr. Lewis White Beck, professor of philosophy emeritus of the University of Rochester, is the Caroline Werner Gannett Professor in the Humanities, College of General Studies, for 1982-83 academic year.

Author of seven books and many magazine articles on philosophy and the history of ideas, Beck plans three public lectures and will teach the General Studies "Great Thinkers" course during the winter quarter.

Beck, who taught philosophy at the University of Rochester for 30 years, hopes to explore with students how philosophers have dealt with the feelings and emotional issues that are a part of everyone's life.

The professorship was established in 1974 to honor Mrs. Gannett and to perpetuate her life-long interest in fields of study with a humanistic perspective.

The lectures, set for November, December and March, will deal with the relationship between science and technology and the moral issues that surface from technological advances; philosophical exposition of freedom of will; and a description of Sir Harold George Nicolson, English writer, statesman, and literary critic.

Beck was born in Griffin, Ga., and received his bachelor's degree from Emory University, Atlanta, and his master's and doctoral degrees from Duke University.

He joined the faculty of the University of Rochester in 1949 as professor of philosophy and served as chairman of the Department of Philosophy and as dean and associate dean of the Graduate School.

He was named a Guggenheim Fellow in 1957 and an American Council of Learned Societies Fellow in 1965.

He was a visiting professor at the University of California at Berkeley,

Columbia University, University of Minnesota, Sir George Williams University, and the University of Western Ontario.

He is the author of Philosophic Inquiry, Six Secular Philosophers, Commentary on Kant's Critique of Practical Reason, Studies in the Philosophy of Kant, Early German Philosophy: Kant and his Predecessors, The Actor and the Spectator, and Essays on Kant and Hume.

### Rankin Receives Matrix Award

Carolyn P. Rankin, RIT's director of public information, has received the 1982 Matrix Award for excellence in communications. Rankin, who has worked at RIT for nine years, the last three as director of public information, was selected for the award for achievements in increasing the productivity, quality and scope of RIT's media relations and publications work. In the last three years under Rankin's leadership press placements have quadrupled.

The Matrix Award has been given annually since 1970 to individuals who set "high standards of performance and dedication" for work in the communications profession and in the community. The award is given by a national professional society, Women in Communications, Inc., and also was presented this year to Murray J. Green, regional vice president of the Malrite Communications Group, owners of radio stations WEZO and WNYR and of WUHF-TV.

Smith cited her work in widening the national image of RIT through placements in the *New York Times*, *Time* magazine, NBC's "Today" show, Charles Kuralt's "Sunday Morning" show, National Public Radio and other major media outlets. 

### **Engineering Scholarship Announced**

College of Engineering Dean Richard A. Kenyon has announced the establishment of the Ronald D. Dodge Memorial Scholarship Fund in the College of Engineering.

The fund was made possible through a gift of Mrs. Alberta B. Dodge of Lexington, Ky., in memory of her late husband, a 1929 mechanical engineering graduate of Mechanics Institute. As an endowment fund, the income will provide scholarship aid for worthy students enrolled in mechanical engineering.

Known to his colleagues and friends as "Mr. Electric Typewriter," Dodge was associated with IBM Corp. for 37 years before he retired in 1971.

Throughout his years with IBM, he was credited with many significant achievements in the development and design of the electric typewriter. In 1946, he was awarded a certificate of merit from the Franklin Institute for his invention of the proportional spacing machine, and in 1954 he designed the decelerator that is used in the Model D typewriter for smooth and reliable carriage motion. For his design of the wear compensator for the Selectric typewriter in 1962, Dodge received one-third share in the company's Corporate Outstanding Invention Award. In 1963, he became the first IBM Fellow in the Office Products Division.
