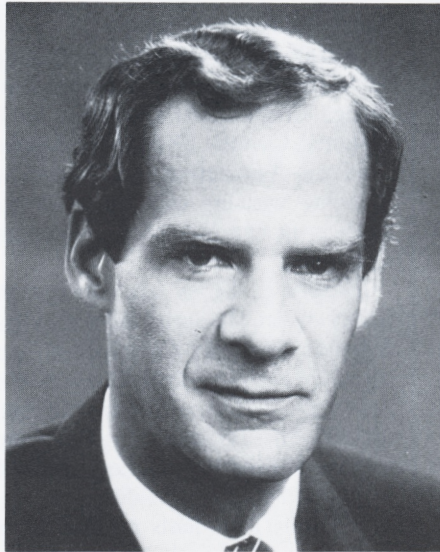

## NTID Dean Named

Dr. Peter J. Pere has been named dean of NTID, according to Dr. William E. Castle, vice president of RIT and director of NTID.

Pere has served as associate chancellor and associate professor of education for the University of Wisconsin-Extension, Madison, Wis., since 1977. UW-Extension is the outreach and continuing education arm of the nation's third largest system of higher education—the University of Wisconsin system.

Pere will oversee the academic curricula offered at NTID and assist Castle in establishing and evaluating general policies and directions for NTID. In addition, as one of RIT's 10 academic deans, he will have a reporting relationship to the RIT vice president of academic affairs.

Four undergraduates have been recognized for their service to the Institute and improvement of campus life with the 1981 Davis Leadership Award. **Gregory Borchardt**, third-year photojournalism major; **Linda Iannone**, third-year medical technology major; **Charles P. Rink**, fourth-year accounting major; and **Susan C. Wright**, third-year managerial economics major at Eisenhower, were cited for both the quality and length of their involvement.

Funds for the annual Davis Leadership Award are provided through a gift of Ruth and Brackett H. Clark. Brackett Clark has served on RIT's Board of Trustees since 1933. Part of the award includes a cash grant, based on the student's financial needs, to be applied to tuition.

The Clarks named the award for Ruby C. and Alfred L. Davis.

A scholarship program in honor of the late Veronica Maher has been established at Eisenhower College by the Seneca County Liberation Organization.

The first two recipients of the SCLO-Veronica Maher Scholarship at Eisenhower are **Ronald Snyder** and **Sean Egan**.

The scholarship will be awarded annually to two Eisenhower freshmen or transfer students from Seneca County.

Schmitt scholarship was established in 1978 to provide financial assistance to an RIT tennis player.

Two medical technology students recently won the Millard Fillmore Hospitals' School of Medical Technology award for best student research. **Dolores I. Burcyk** and **Michael L. Dekleva**, who have completed their professional year of clinical training at Buffalo Millard Fillmore Hospitals, presented their award winning paper, "A Comparative Analysis of Ellagic Acid and Micronized Silica Activators for PTT Testing," at June graduation ceremonies. Burcyk is now employed as a research scientist at Pennwalt Corp. Walter L. Dekleva has been hired by Millard Fillmore Hospitals as a microbiologist.

**Michael Campbell**, a third year criminal justice student, will be attending the Institute for Popular Economics at Amherst, Mass. Aug. 9-16. Campbell, a HEOP student, received a scholarship to attend the conference, which will focus on alternative political responses to "Reaganomics" and ways to organize students and the underprivileged.

**Dr. Francis M.
