

# Admissions, Records, Institutional Research Restructured

RIT admissions efforts will be concentrated in one office with the restructuring of two positions-- Admissions and Records and Institutional Research.

Provost and Vice-President for Academic Affairs Dr. Todd Bullard, in announcing the changes, said "Now and during the latter part of the decade, all institutions will have to pay especially careful attention to the admissions process."

Presently, the admissions function is handled by the dean of Admission and Records, Donald A. Hoppe, who has accepted the new post of dean of Administrative Services.

G.E.D. Brady, coordinator of Institutional Research, will become dean of Records and Institutional Research and Dr. John Humphries, associate dean of the College of General Studies, will become dean of Admission.

The change is effective in mid-January.

Hoppe will serve as chief staff person of the Policy Council; will develop systematic relationships with Rochester area school districts; assume general management of major a c a d e m i c e v e n t s like commencement, and handle other special projects.

Brady will assume overall responsibility for the maintenance of student records, and will be responsible for the effective, phased development of the institutional research function.

Humphries will assume general responsibility for the recruitment and admission of

students to the day colleges of the Institute and will work cooperatively with the dean of the College of Continuing Education in the recruitment and admission of students to that college.

A native of lowa, Hoppe joined RIT's College of Continuing Education in 1952.

Brady was Registrar at RIT from 1966 to 1972, when he was named coordinator of Institutional Research. He holds B.A. and Ed.M. degrees from the State University College at Buffalo.

Humphries joined RIT as assistant to the dean of the College of General Studies in 1965. He holds an A.A.S. degree in Publishing and Printing from RIT, a B.S. in Education from the State University College at Oswego, and an M.S.S. and Ph.D. from Syracuse University.

# \$20,000 Gift To Anniversary Campaign



Officials of RIT's 150th Anniversary Campaign have announced a \$20,000 gift from Curtice Burns Charitable Foundation. The foundation is the grant-making division of Curtice Burns, Inc. The check was presented to Dr. Paul A. Miller, RIT president (above right), today by Curtice Burns executives, Hugh Cumming, senior executive vice president (above center), and Ted Holmgren, vice president of marketing (above, left). The unrestricted gift will be applied to RIT permanent endowment. The Institute's 150th Anniversary Campaign was launched in November 1973 with a goal of \$42 million. To date over \$25 million has been pledged in the year-old drive. The Rochester-based firm is one of the ten largest processors of canned foods and vegetables in the United States. Products of its six divisions are sold in 42 states. The most familiar company brands in upstate New York are Blue Boy vegetables, Silver Floss sauerkraut and Ritter specialty foods.

# RIT To Host First On-Campus Packaging Competition

A week's focus on the progress of the packaging industry will accompany the Paperboard Packaging Council's 32nd Annual Competition to be held at RIT January 27-February 5. This is the first time in competition history that the event has been scheduled for a university campus.

The competition will draw package entries from national manufacturers across the nation. Dr. Harold J. Raphael, director of RIT's Department of Packaging Science, expects over 500 individual entries. Judges will include RIT faculty members: Robert Kerr, art and design; Clifton Frazier, printing; and Alfred Horton, printing.

Traditionally, the winning packages are kept secret until the Paperboard Packaging Council's Annual Meeting in March.

Three of the events scheduled for the Packaging Week will be open to the public. A lecture called "What's Happened to the Cracker Barrel?" will be given on Friday, January 31, at 12:30 p.m. in Ingle Auditorium. Leonard Barol, professor at St. Joseph's College, Philadelphia, and J.J. Wuerthner, vice president of public affairs for the Paperboard Packaging Council, Washington, D.C., will show over 25 samples of antique packages and will discuss package development from the 1800's.

# Jones' Gift Provides Science Lectureship

Jones Chemicals Inc. of Caledonia has contributed \$60,000 to RIT's 150th anniversary campaign to create an endowment fund in honor of John Wiley Jones, company founder and chairman of the board.

The gift will establish the John Wiley Jones Distinguished Lectureship in RIT's College of Science and a series of awards for science students. The fund is designed as a tribute to Jones' career in the chemical industry and as an acknowledgement of his interest in science education.

The lectureship will bring one or more eminent scientists to the RIT campus for two or three days each year. A formal lecture, possibly part of an academic convocation, would be open to the public.

Two outstanding scholar awards will be given annually to students, one in chemistry and one in physics. The cash awards to fourth-year students will be presented by Jones or another senior executive of the firm in conjunction with the lecture.

Dr. Thomas P. Wallace, dean of the College of Science, noted the lectureship is the first of its kind to be established in the science field at RIT.

"The company's foresight in honoring Mr. Jones while benefitting our students and faculty is most appreciated. The program will have a considerable impact on our college. In addition to its obvious educational value, it will assist the Callege of Science in bringing its potential to the attention of the community," Wallace added.

Jones Chemicals, Inc., was established in 1929 by John Wiley Jones as a manufacturer of household bleach. The first few batches were made in ten-gallon earthenware crocks in the basement of his parents' home in LeRoy. The firm is now a major supplier of chlorine for municipal water and sewerage systems throughout the United States and in many countries around the world.
