Mr. and Mrs. Brackett Clark receive "highest tribute" for service to RIT

Mr. and Mrs. Brackett W. Clark, 630 Rock Beach Rd. Irondequoit, have been selected to receive the Nathaniel Rochester Society Award for 1975.

The award, established in 1972, is the highest tribute presented by the Nathaniel Rochester Society at RIT and honors outstanding service to the Institute. Mr. and Mrs. Clark were charter members of the society and have been active in the life of RIT for over four decades.

"It's a lovely award," said Mrs. Clark. "We've had such enjoyment doing our work here over the years," she added.

Brackett H. Clark was elected to RIT's Board of Trustees in 1913. He has served as treasurer of the Institute for 21 years and is a member of the executive and finance committees. In addition, he has served with the new campus steering and funds committees, memorials committee, nominations committee and, most recently, the steering committee of the 150th Anniversary Campaign.

Clark is chairman of the board and treasurer of Rapidac Machine Corp.

His wife, Ruth, joined with Marcia Ellingson in founding the RIT Women's Council in 1954 and served as its first president. Under Mrs. Clark's leadership, an educational program was launched so that all members of the council would be thoroughly acquainted with the Institute and its several divisions.

She also helped the council delop fund raising programs

which have since provided the substantial funds for scholarships, the library, the Interfaith Chapel in Ingle auditorium, and remodeling and redecorating the lounges in the residence halls.

The selection committee for this year's award included: Dr. and Mrs. Frank W. Lovejoy, Jr., chairmen; Mr. and Mrs. Randolph E. Carlson; Dr. and Mrs. Kenneth C.D. Hickman; Mr. and Mrs. Arthur M. Lowenthal; Mrs. Robert W. Miller; and Mr. a Mrs. Gaylord C. Whitaker.

This is not the first time the Clarks have been jointly honored for their generous support of an academic institution. In 1972,

they were awarded honorary doctor of law degrees by Wheaton College, Norton, Mass., the college chosen for attendance by two of their daughters. Clark is a member of the boards of trustees of Wheaton College and Brown University, his alma mater.

Presentation of the Nathaniel Rochester Society Award was made by Walter A. Fallon, chairman of the society and Dr. Paul A. Miller, president of RIT, a dinner Tuesday, January 28. Prior recipients of the award have been Gaylord C. Whitaker, in 1973; and trustees of the Mary Flagler Cary Charitable Trust.

Students awarded Statler scholarships

Twenty-seven students in the Department of Food Administration and Tourist Industries Management are receiving a total of \$12,000 in scholarships for 1974-75 from the Statler Foundation.

The scholarships were awarded on the basis of academic achievement, future promise and an active interest in a career in the hospitality industry.

The foundation was established in 1934 under the will of Ellsworth M. Statler, founder of the Statler Hotel chain, to promote careers in the hotel and restaurant industry.

Professor Baldwin was "the guy all the students went to"

David M. Baldwin, 64, of 27 W. Canon Drive, Chili, professor of Biology who was murdered in his home January 19, was described by his colleagues in the College of Science as "the guy all the students went to with their problems."

Although Mr. Baldwin had no close living relations, his family--in the larger sense of the word--was broad. His door was always open to students, for school matters or personal matters.

Dr. Thomas P. Wallace, dean of the College of Science, said: "Professor Dave Baldwin was extremely devoted to RIT and was a person who was never too busy to take on one more task or spend time with a student. The feeling for him is best illustrated by the fact that he was awarded the first Outstanding Teacher Award from RIT in 1968.

"He was a pioneer in the use of educational television at RIT by developing a full course in general biology in 1970.

"He was a gentle, compassionate man who will be long thought of by faculty and students alike."

Dr. Wallace said the science faculty and students are initiating steps to establish a fund in Mr. Baldwin's memory.

Professor Baldwin had been on the RIT faculty since September 1953. He taught biology, chemistry and physics courses during those 21 years, and most recently taught biology to non-majors and a contemporary science course. He also taught evening College of Continuing Education science courses until recently.

He was born in Emporia, Kansas, on Dec. 13, 1910.

He received a bachelor's

degree from Reed College in Portland, Ore., in 1932, and a master's degree in bacteriology from the University of California at Berkeley in 1934. He did further graduate study at Berkeley until 1937.

Before coming to RIT, Mr. Baldwin was employed as chief bacteriologist at John Wyeth Pharmaceuticals and research bacteriologist at Lederle Labs.

He was a member of the RIT Faculty Council. His professional affiliations included membership in the American Society for Microbiology, the American Public Health Association and the American Pharmaceutical Society.

His only close living relatives, his mother and his sister, died within the past two years. He had lived alone since the death of his mother in October 1973, except for the foster children to whom he offered a roof.

Mr. Baldwin, a professor of biology in the College of Science, was murdered in his home at 27 W. Canon Drive, Chili, on Jan. 19.


Employee career program continues in Personnel

GARC will host pressmen for color seminar

The Graphic Arts Research Center will conduct a four-day color seminar for pressmen on April 1-4, 1975. In this seminar the emphasis will be on color control in the pressroom rather than the production of color separations and plates. The fourth day has been added to provide more time for practical applications, particularly in the area of densitometry.

The subjects covered in the course of the seminar will include the selection of color ink sets; ink laydown sequence; the gamut of printed colors; the problems of reds; and the effect of paper on printed color. Also included are discussions of color densitometry; evaluation of printed sheets; control of dot gain and trapping; how strong to print color; and standard illumination for color viewing.

Graphic Arts plans still photo seminar

The College of Graphic Arts and Photography at RIT will conduct a seminar on Still Photographic A-V Production for education, government, and industry on March 17 through 21. This 5-day program is for production personnel who want to expand their comprehension of the photographic process and learn time-saving techniques. It is designed for the person who had had A-V production experience and now wishes to improve the quality and quantity of his productions. Participants become actively involved in production and are encouraged to bring their production problems to the seminar.

The seminar includes such areas as title and graph slide preparation, slide duplicating for quality (both b&w and color), and general photographic problem solving. Under these categories are such subjects as methods of lettering, legibility, lith exposure/development.

Printing to expand bindery management program

RIT's School of Printing will be expanding its course offerings in bindery operation and management, according to Director Dr. Mark F. Guldin.

Guldin also announced that Werner Rebsamen, formerly with Book Crafters, Fredricksburg, Va., has joined RIT's faculty and will be teaching new bindery courses.

Rebsamen learned bookbinding in Zurich. He has worked as a samplemaker and handbinder, as well as on development of modern production techniques. As production superintendent at BookCrafters, he set up what is considered the first fully automated book production system.

"The addition of Rebsamen to our faculty and our new laboratories will enable students to get the most up-to-date experience possible in a college-based bindery setting," says Guldin.

Hand and automatic case binding course work will be offered in the future, and the setting up and operation of a binding testing laboratory is planned.

Equipment in the school's laboratory includes a Polar Eltramat cutter and Challenge cutters, Stahl C-26 and Baum Auto-Set folders, Mueller adhesive binder, Sheridan

Inserter-Stitcher-Trimmer, Macy Stitch-A-Fold II, McCain Stitcher and Kensol hot stamping press.

Nearly 200 printing students will be taking the new course in bindery operation and management during the first year of their program, Guldin said. Also, special courses and seminars are being planned through RIT's program of continuing education for industry.

Photo professor sets field trip

RIT photography professor Tom Muir Wilson will conduct a photographic field trip to England, March 29 through April 6.

The nine day workshop will include overnight stops in Bristol, Stratford and London.

Participants will have the opportunity to try their photographic skills at Stonehenge, Shakespeare's birthplace and the historical sights of London. Instruction will be informal.

Of special interest to photography students will be a visit to London's Central Polytechnic Institute which, like RIT, has one of the foremost schools of photography in the world.
