# **Bevier Gallery show**

More than 200 photographic images-the work of 45 of the faculty members of the School of Photographic Arts and Sciences--will be exhibited at RIT's Bevier Gallery through February 27.

Reflecting the diverse curricula taught in the school, the show will cover a broad spectrum of photographic styles and techniques ranging from straight pictorials to photojournalism to innovative non-silver images.

The photographs date back to the early 1930s, with Colorado railroad scenes photographed by Ira Current. Some of the more contemporary work includes Charles Arnold's Xerographs, Betty Hahn's modern gum bichromate prints and Tom Muir Wilson's ortho film positives sprayed with silver.

# **Hollis Todd retires**

Professor Hollis N. Todd has retired after 30 years of teaching in The School of Photographic Arts and Sciences.

Todd, who came to RIT in 1946 after 10 years as a high school science teacher, was instrumental in establishing RIT's program in photographic science, still the only program at 464-2424 for further information. of its kind taught in the United States.

During recent years Todd has taught firstyear students and worked under a grant to

prepare programmed instructional materials.

In addition to his work with RIT students, Todd taught several industry seminars and worked as a consultant to the photographic industry. He is the author of several books; the most recent, "Sensitometry--A Self-Teaching Text," will be published this fall.

In 1966 he received RIT's Outstanding Teacher Award for his "excellence in teaching" and "attention and devotion to the intellectual development of his students."

Todd has been given the title of professor emeritus at RIT. He will continue to work as a consultant from his retirement home in Florida.

### **Self-evaluation**

In accordance with Title IX regulations, Dr. Paul Miller recently announced that RIT will carry out a self-evaluation in terms of its current policies and practices concerning admission of students, treatment of students, and employment of both academic and staff personnel. The self-evaluation will include a search to identify any discriminatory policies or practices based on sex which may exist and to take whatever remedial action is needed. The self-evaluation will be completed by July 21, 1976.

In addition, an advisory committee has been named to work closely with the coordinator and departments in order to achieve Title IX objectives. # Science course

course in probability to 20 outstanding high school students in the Rochester area this summer under a grant from the National Science Foundation.

The students will observe how probability models are used to analyze a wide range of phenomena from molecular motion to modeling the stock market.

RIT was one of a group of 125 institutions in 43 states to be supported by NSF's Student Science Training Program, whose purpose is to offer guidance and encouragement to talented young people with strong potentials for scientific and technical careers.

The program at RIT, under the direction of Dr. Neil Bromberg, is designed as a course in probability for high school students of high ability and interest in mathematics who have had three years of college preparatory

mathematics. Its main purpose is to demonstrate to these students that much of mathematics is rooted in the observations of real-world phenomena.

The program will run from June 28 to July 30. Two-hour morning lectures will be followed by a laboratory session. During the five weeks, the participants will be exposed to various probabilistic models; in each case the mathematical models will be built around a specific mathematical application.

# "Taugner Shows" will open at Metro Gallery February 20

Robert T. Taugner, a member of the art faculty at RIT between 1959 and 1968, will return to Rochester for the opening of an exhibit of his works. "Taugner Shows," a collection of paintings and drawings, will open February 20. There will be a reception at the Metro Gallery, 50 West Main St., from 4-8 p.m.

Following the reception Taugner will present a talk entitled "War to Sea: Art and Reality" in which he will explore the effects of his past experiences on the development of his art.

Taugner's paintings have been exhibited in major museums and galleries throughout the United States, including the Albright-Knox Art Gallery, the Museum of Modern Art, and the Art Institute of Chicago. He was a recipient of the Widmer Award at the

Finger Lakes Exhibition, Memorial Art Gallery, Rochester.

While at RIT, he initiated and taught painting and printmaking in the then-new graduate program. He also reorganized and taught foundation drawing and design, intermediate painting, and figure drawing.

Peter J. Vogelaar, one of Taugner's students and now chairman of the Fine and Applied Arts Department of the College of Continuing Education, remembers him as a teacher who could stimulate creative thinking.

"He was a mover and a shaker in the arts," said Vogelaar. "We couldn't get complacent. He'd grab us and plunge us into new dimensions of the creative struggle. His art and his life, his painting and his teaching, were inseparable, and he learned

from his students as they learned from him.

"This show will give Rochester, and the many people here who knew and loved Bob Taugner, an opportunity to see what he has been doing since his departure," Vogelaar said. Taugner's most recent work reflects his present life as a successful farmer in Wisconsin.

"Taugner Shows" may be viewed at the RIT Metro Art Gallery from February 20-March 19. The Gallery is part of the College of Continuing Education and is located on the 4th floor of 50 West Main. Gallery hours are Monday, 12 noon-4 p.m.; Tuesday through Thursday, 4 p.m.-8p.m.; Friday, 12 noon-4 p.m.; and Saturday, 10 a.m.-2 p.m.

1936 he was appointed president, a position he held for 34 years. During his remarkable career of guiding RIT through three decades of growth, the construction of the \$60 million Henrietta campus was completed in 1968.

Since his retirement in 1969, he has continued to be active in RIT affairs. From his office at 50 West Main Street he serves in an advisory capacity to RIT on a voluntary, part-time basis.

Dr. and Mrs. Ellingson are active members of the Rochester community. They reside at 3940 East Avenue.
