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Dr. Kraus to head photo school

After more than a year's search, a teacher, researcher, and administrator has been named director of RIT's School of Photographic Arts and Sciences.

He is Dr. Russell Kraus, who most recently was director of the Institute for Human Design at the University of Wisconsin at Oshkosh.

Dr. Kraus has a background in academic administration, visual arts, and professional counseling. From 1971 through 1977, he served as special assistant to the vice chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst. Concurrently, he was assistant dean of humanities and fine arts and assistant professor of counseling.


While at the University of Massachusetts, Dr. Kraus, in addition to other academic and bugetary duties, was responsible for the development of a performing arts program for the institution's new \$15 million facility for the performing arts. That project included supervising an annual budget of \$130,000 for operating expenses alone, finding resources to support the program, and contracting with more than \$500,000 of performing talent.

Dr. Kraus was educated at William Paterson College and received an Ed.D degree from the University of Massachusetts. He has done post graduate work at Southern Illinois University, the New School of Social Research and and Fairleigh Dickinson University.

He was selected based on recommendations of a six-member Search Committee comprised of Dr. Lothar Engelmann, dean continued on page 4


New club seeks members

\$20,000 to aid foreign students

A \$20,000 scholarship will be established at RIT to assist foreign students, according to President Paul A. Miller.

The scholarship endowment was donated by John Wiley Jones, chairman of the board of Jones Chemicals, Inc., of Caledonia. It is the first of its kind at the Institute.

In addition, Mr. Jones has made five previous financial contributions to meet previously unfulfilled needs at RIT, including the establishment of the William D. Gasser Distinguished Lectureship in Business.

The late Mr. Gasser, a former RIT College of Business faculty member, and Jones were long-time friends and professional associates.

"The new scholarship once again demonstrates Mr. Jones' commitment to the Institute's unique, special needs," said Dr. Miller.

The scholarship was announced prior to the May 19 Gasser Lecture which was delivered by Rochester-area Congressman Barber B. Conable Jr.

Cary professor

Herbert H. Johnson will become the Melbert B. Cary, Jr. Professor in Graphic Arts at RIT effective July 1.

Johnson, an Ossining, New York resident, is the third person to hold the post, according to Dr. Mark F. Guldin, director of RIT's School of Printing. He succeeds Herman Zapf. Alexander S. Lawson was the original Cary Professor.

Zapf will join Lawson as an adjunct professor on a part-time basis at RIT.

"I am really very pleased that Mr. Johnson could accept this appointment to an area which I treasure very highly," said Dr. Lothar Engelmann, dean of RIT's College of Graphic Arts and Photography. "He will bring a new dimension to the School of Printing which should help to further our education in book design and production."

Johnson is a 1962 graduate of RIT's School of Printing.



NTID hosts national parley on captioning TV programs

The first national conference ever held to share information on the controversial subject of captioning television programs

The conference program emphasizes capticaptioning philosophies, new technology, research and processes.

Captioning commercial television programs would give the nation's 13 million hearing-impaired people the same access to entertainment and information programs as the rest of the population.

"It is not realistic to expect every program to be available, but we would like to break into prime-time programming both on the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) and the commercial networks," Dr. Edwin W. Martin, Jr., deputy commissioner, Bureau of Education for the Handicapped, U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare said.

Participants in the conference include experts and advocates of captioning from WGBH-TV, Captioning Center, Boston, Mass.; Public Broadcasting Service Closed Captioning Project; Gallaudet College, Washington, D.C.; National Film Board of Canada; the Department of Health, Education and Welfare; and others.

"Much money, thought and energy has been put into captioning by a wide variety of agencies, schools and production groups. We can all benefit from sharing our research, our philosophies, our techniques and our knowledge," Dr. Barry J. Cronin, conference chairperson and and chairperson of NTID's Instructional Television Department said. "NTID is one of the nation's leaders in captioning expertise so it is appropriate that we have initiated this conference and hope that others can benefit from our experience."
