

Mid - States reaccreditation affirmed

The reaffirmation of RIT's accreditation by the Commission on Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools has been announced by Dr. Paul A. Miller, Institute president.

The reaffirmation follows a four-day visit by Middle States delegates in April to review RIT's Case Study, "Designing the 80s," and conduct the reaccreditation survey.

Photo Congress to attract about 700 world leaders

About 700 leading photographic scientists and engineers from throughout the world will be at RIT Aug. 20–26 for the International Congress of Photographic Science.

The congress, hosted by the Society of Photographic Scientists and Engineers, will be the first of its type ever held in the Western Hemisphere. The last such congress took place in 1974 in Dresden, East Germany.

The participants will exchange information on the latest developments in photographic science. Highlighting the week-long congress will be six plenary lectures delivered by scientists from the United States, Japan, Germany, Russia, and Bulgaria. Their topics will range from the latent image in silver halides and the sensitization and structure of organic dyes to electrophotography and solid state electrical imaging.

In all, more than 125 technical papers will be presented at the congress. Sixty of them will be displayed through innovative poster sessions at which the various authors will be available for discussion. These sessions, featuring bulletin board and photo photo displays will cover such topics as a new photographic material for microelectronics, the information content of color photographic images and psychophysical

quality evaluation of photo positives.

In a special evening presentation on Wednesday, Aug. 23, Dr. Edwin Land of the Polaroid Corporation will deliver an address entitled "A Study in the Science of Invention: Exorcising Noise" at the Xerox Square Auditorium in downtown Rochester

Technical tours of the Eastman Kodak research laboratories, the International Museum of Photography at the George Eastman House, and RIT's photographic science department also will be offered during the congress.

Several faculty members from the College College of Graphic Arts and Photography will be involved in the congress. In its report to Dr. Miller, the commission granted RIT the highest possible rating, with the reaffirmation applying for the longest possible period of time—five years. RIT's next periodic review report to Mid-States will be due April 30, 1983.

In the periodic review report five years from now, RIT will be expected to include the following:

- 1. A current general overview of the institution.
- 2. Significant developments and/or changes since the previous evaluation.
- 3. Evidence of continuous institutional self-study.
- 4. Indications of responses made or actions taken with respect to recommendations resulting from the previous evaluation.
- 5. A summary of fiscal and enrollment data for the previous five years and projections for the next five years.
- 6. An outline of plans for the next fiveyear period.

With its top rating, RIT is not required to provide any further immediate information to the Middle States Association in order to affirm its reaccreditation.

However, various campus groups and committees will be dealing with detailed recommendations and suggestions which came out of the Case Study and reaccrediation review.

Teacher conference set

The theme "Keeping Awake In The Eighties" has been selected for RIT's sixth Effective Teaching Conference on Tuesday, Sept. 5.

Irene Payne, associate director of the Learning Development Center, is coordinating arrangements for the program which is being sponsored by the Teaching Effectiveness Committee. All faculty members are being invited to participate.

The day-long event will open at 9 a.m. in Ingle Auditorium. It will be highlighted by an address by Dr. Paul A. Miller, Institute president. This is Dr. Miller's tradi-

tional opening day address to the faculty and his last prior to leaving the presidency later this year.

Presentations during the morning will address issues raised by Dr. Miller during his talk. Luncheon will be served at noon in Grace Watson Dining Hall.

A total of 13 presentations have been scheduled for the afternoon. These sessions will center on discussions related to maintaining faculty vitality through faculty and curriculum development and effective productivity.

1978 alumni fund hits \$53,000 mark

The 1978 Alumni Fund chairman, Jim Bovay, MBA'74, has reported a total of \$53,000 to date in gifts and pledges toward the Fund goal of \$90,000.

"This is a tremendous start for the 1978 Fund," Jim said. "I am indebted to the enthusiastic group of volunteers who gave so willingly of their time to help with the Rochester, New Jersey and Boston phonathons. Without their help we simply could not build the strong annual support that a private institution such as RIT needs," he said.

In Rochester, Laima Lelis, MT'67, and Jerry Pavelsky, BA'72, coordinated more than 70 volunteers to man the phones during eight nights of calling. In New Jersey, Jack and Judy Maltby, PR'61, headed a group of nine alumni who raised more than \$2,000 in one evening. And in Boston, Richard and Bonnie Gorbaty, BA'71 and BA'72, coordinated two nights of calling and raised more than \$1,200.

Chicago and Los Angeles phonathons are scheduled for September and October, respectively.

"Although we are past the halfway mark, we still have a long way to go," Bovay added. "I hope all non-participating alumni will consider giving to the Fund this year. Participation is the key to success of the annual giving program and I urge all fellow alumni to respond positively when they receive a letter or phone call from the Fund committee," Jim said.

RIT among Kodak program beneficiaries

RIT is one of 58 public and private colleges and universities throughout the nation to benefit from a new Kodak Scholars Program designed to support and encourage academic excellence.


The scholarship program, sponsored by the Eastman Kodak Co., initially will provide 75 percent of tuition costs to 180 students in selected disciplines beginning with their sophomore year and continuing for two more years, or to the completion of their bachelor's degree. In addition, unrestricted supplemental grants of \$300 to public, and \$1,000 to private schools for each Kodak scholar will be made annually to the department in which each scholar is enrolled.

When fully implemented in 1980, the program will support 540 Kodak scholars enrolled at the 25 private and 33 public colleges and universities. School officials estimate that funds from the Kodak Scholars Program will represent a value equal to \$14 million in endowment funding funding at six percent to them.

Beginning this fall, 180 scholarships will be awarded annually to students in the 58 institutions pursuing degrees in the following disciplines: engineering, including chemical, electrical, industrial, mechanical, textile and packaging; chemistry chemistry, polymer science, quantitative business analysis, computer science, and marketing.

Individual universities and colleges will handle application procedures, arrange personal interviews and make final selection of all scholarship recipients.

The Kodak scholarships are contigent in successive years on students' ability to maintain standards established by their schools. The scholarships are financed from the company's current earnings and from funds previously set aside for the purpose.

Rennals named to council

Professor Martin A. Rennalls of the Film Making-TV department, School of Photographic Arts and Sciences, has been appointed to the board of directors of the Rochester International Friendship Council.

Professor Rennalls is chairman of the Foreign Students Committee and the Foreign Students Scholarship Committee. His appointment to the Rochester Council board is a result of his efforts on behalf of foreign students on the RIT campus.

The Friendship Council, established in 1957, is a non-profit ogranization designed to provide and establish ties of friendship, goodwill and understanding between residents of Rochester and its surrounding area and visitors and students coming from abroad for temporary residence here.

The purpose of the Foreign Students Committee on campus is the promotion of the academic and social welfare of foreign students at RIT.

The Foreign Students Scholarship Committee has two principal objectives. (1) Establishing an endowment fund for scholarships and (2) establishing an emergency fund for foreign students to assist them in overcoming short-lived financial problems.

Art Berman, coordinator of Alcoholism Education Programs at RIT has been elected President of the Board of Directors of the Huther-Doyle Memorial Institute. It is a non-profit corporation established to conduct alcoholism services in Monroe County. The first project of the institute will be the assumption of administrative control of the Continued Care Unit, a 72 bed residential rehabilitation facility and the Alcoholism Outreach Service, a 13 bed medical detoxification service. Both facilities are located at Monroe Community Hospital.

Bruce Proper, director of Physical Education, Recreation and Intramurals and former RIT baseball coach, was a recent lecturer on catching at Kutsher's National Sports Clinic at Monticello, N.Y.
