
Some of the prizes and their donors include the following:

Gifts Policy

n anticipation of the holiday season, the RIT community is reminded of the Institute policy regarding gifts and gratuities.

William Batcheller, director of Purchasing, remarked that "a number of our vendors, acting in good faith, feel the necessity to offer various favors in celebration of the holiday season. We insist that RIT employees conduct their association with individuals outside the Institute with the highest degree of personal integrity."

The Institute policy as published in the "Purchasing Policy and Procedures Manual" reads:

The acceptance of gifts by RIT employees from any of its suppliers is against Institute policy. However, this policy is not intended to eliminate entirely ethical and traditional business-related functions such as business lunches, nor does it preclude the giving of token, personal mementos of nominal value.

If in doubt as to the possible propriety of any such exchange or activity, it should be rejected as contrary to our policy. In making this judgment, the ultimate criterion must not be whether the exchange or activity would influence an RIT employee in any way, but rather what appearance or construction might be placed on this action by a critical third party.

December 29—Model Programs for School Aged Handicapped Children, The purpose of the awards is to develop and conduct model programs designed to meet the special educational needs of handicapped children.

December 15—Consumer's Education Program, The purpose of this program is to increase the capacity of organizations and institutions which educate consumers to prepare people for intelligent participation in the marketplace and in the economic system. Priority is given to applications which are designed to serve as models or which build an organizations's long-range capacity to provide consumer's education. 55 or 60 awards are anticipated at an average total of \$45,000 per year.

December 22—Public Service Education Program, This program issues awards to institutions of higher education to develop training programs by providing fellowship, and in some instances, institutional grants, for graduate or professional study for persons who plan to pursue a career in public service. Forty institutional grants at an average award of \$25,000 are anticipated. Three hundred new fellowships are available for individual students to apply for.

Alford Quits Dean's Post

On November 16, Dean Harold Alford of the College of Continuing Education announced that he will step aside from the deanship of CCE effective June 30, 1979 to accept a new opportunity with CCE and RIT.

Dr. Alford will be appointed professor of Continuing Education and director of the Frederick H. Minett Project. This innovative project will have several elements. Primary will be the development of studies and working papers dealing with the role of continuing education in higher education, specifically in communities like RIT's with business and industry contacts. The intent of this study and research will be to give some kind of shape to what continuing education ought to be through the 80s in an environment like RIT's. The project will host at least one major seminar a year for outstanding people in the field of continuing education, and will also investigate international aspects of continuing education.

In addition to directing the Minett Project, Dr. Alford will remain editor-inchief of *Continuum*, and, as professor of Continuing Education, will continue to teach and develop the communications curriculum for the School for Applied Industrial Studies.

Plenty of tournament action, both home and away, will highlight the weekend for RIT teams.

Basketball

Coach Bill Carey's basketball team opens the season at the Binghamton Invitational slated Friday and Saturday. The Tigers are matched against Brooklyn College in the opening round Friday at 6:30. Host Binghamton goes against Medgar Evers at 8:30. Consolation and championship contests take place Saturday at 6:30 and 8:30.

The Tigers feature a young squad with only one senior. Returning to pace the cagers are Bruce Sage, Howie Wurster, Dave Grundtisch, Jim Cole, Tim Giarrusso, Jeff Golterman and Woody Hudson. As a freshman last year, Sage was the team's playmaker, averaging 9.9 points. The speedy guard made the Lincoln First All-Tournament team and was a key factor in the Tigers winning their second straight crown.

Wurster, newly elected captain, is top defensive player. He is out to improve on his 6.7 average and is termed an excellent outside shooter. He led RIT at the foul line last year, connecting on 82 percent. Grundtisch, at forward, gained much experience in his frosh campaign. He is a strong rebounder with scoring potential. Cole, lone senior, is out to increase his 4.5 points and 4.8 rebounds of a year ago. Giarrusso played briefly at guard last season after a banner year with the JV squad, averaging 13 points. Golterman and Hudson missed last campaign and must take up the slack left with the loss of Stan Purdie, RIT's leader last year. Both the returnees will see action underneath.

Carey points to a talented group of newcomers to turn around a 10-12 record last year. Joining the scene are Luther Nicholas, Jim Donovan, Mike Beedy and Bill Hollenbeck. Nicholas was a starter the past two years at Broome Community College. Carey considers his guard potentially one of the best in the league and a superb partner for Sage.

Freshman Donovan brings size and excellent credentials to RIT. He was All-State at St. Francis High (Athol Springs), averaging 21 points and 14 rebounds. Beedy sat out last year but shows good high school background as a forward or underneath. Hollenbeck comes from the JV ranks where he averaged 10.4 points last year.

The Tigers face a tough 26-game schedule. Goals include a winning season, repeating in the Lincoln First Tournament and topping University of Rochester.

Preliminary competition starts Friday at 1 p.m. Saturday's competition is scheduled to start at 1 p.m., with finals late in the afternoon.

Hockey

With a 2-3 record, the Tiger icemen host the RIT Hockey Invitational Saturday and Sunday in the Frank Ritter Memorial Arena. In the opening round Hobart faces Lehigh at 6 p.m. The Tigers play Ramapo at 8:30. Both games are scheduled Saturday. In Sunday's competition the consolation game begins at 6 p.m., with the championship to follow. Men's Swimming

The varsity team opens its season Tuesday, Dec. 5, hosting Cortland in the Edith Woodward Memorial Pool at 4 p.m. Packing the young finmen are co-captains Mark Mayhew and Dennis Connolly. Mayhew, who can swim any event, will concentrate on the middle distance. Connolly handles one and three-meter diving.

The Tigers posted an 8-4 dual meet record last year and 4-1 mark in the Independent College Athletic Conference (ICAC). In the Upper New York State Championships RIT had to settle for sixth place.
