Christopher is the son of Patricia and Bruce Gregory of 773-8 Stowell Drive, Greece, and entered the world at 1:38 a.m. at Rochester General Hospital.

Dean of Admissions Dr. John Humphries presented the Gregorys with an RIT t-shirt for the class of 2001. The t-shirt is symbolic of the 150 individual \$1,500 scholarships to be awarded in celebration of the Institute's 150th Anniversary.

Response to the project has been overwhelming with almost 700 letters coming in from nearly every state in the nation and even Australia as of June 19th. The first 150 respondents, as determined by postmark, will be declared winners. However, they also must be admitted to RIT when ready for college. Thus a list of alternates will also be selected and someone far down on the list may still have a chance for a scholarship.

Funds for the scholarships are being provided by Mr. & Mrs. J. Warren McClure, of Key Largo, Fla. and Charlotte, Vt. Mr. McClure is vice chairman of the RIT Board of Trustees and a board member since 1973.

Mr. Berman came to RIT in the fall of 1976 as director of the Alcoholism Education Development Program funded by the NYS Division of Alcoholism. During 1978-1979 he served as acting director of the Social Work Department.

Prior to coming to RIT, Mr. Berman served as executive director of the Finger Lakes Alcoholism Counseling and Referral Agency which provided diverse services in Wayne, Ontario, Seneca, and Yates Counties.

Berman is currently a member of the board of directors of the NYS Association of Councils on Alcoholism and pastchairman of the Region II Association of Alcoholism Program Representatives. He has received degrees from Hofstra University (BA), New York University (MA), and Syracuse University (MSW), and has taught at the University of Wisconsin (Eau Claire), Carnegie-Mellon University, Eisenhower College, and the Community College of the Finger Lakes.

This was the third consecutive year that a Mossien marketing class has won an SBI award, according to William Tierney, management assistance officer in the federal Small Business Administration's (SBA) Rochester office. Marketing studies compiled by Mossien's students have won regional SBI awards in the past two years.


RIT students who prepared the Rund's report included Kenneth Barkey, Arlington, Mass.; Dave McCadden, Pittsford; Samuel Walrath, Rochester and Mark A. Wilkins of Syracuse. Several teams of students in Mossien's class prepared marketing reports for various small businesses in the Greater Rochester area. The Rund's report was chosen by SBA officials to represent RIT in competition with reports prepared by student groups in about 20 other participating colleges in the region. It was then entered in the national competition with reports from colleges in other regions of the nation.

According to Tierney, the reports provide a solid foundation for the agency to begin monitoring the progress of struggling or fledgling companies. "We use these excellent reports as a take off for our work with the businesses," he adds.

"The students do a great job in identifying the problem that the businesses may have, and then we step in and see what we can do to help."
