REGISTRAR REPORTS
ENROLLMENT INCREASE

Overall registration in excess of 15,000, a new high for the academic year 1969-70, has been announced by RIT registrar George E.D. Brady.

Included in the figure of 15,057 is combined enrollment of day and evening students and summer course registrants. The figure compares with 13,946 for the academic year 1968-69.

He will also be responsible for initiating and carrying out programs, determining business and industrial needs for RIT, and relating the foregoing to RIT objectives, facilities, and resources.

SUGGEST IMPROVEMENTS FOR PALMYRA
