DR. MILLER APPOINTS MEMBERS OF TASK FORCE ON ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES -- R.I.T.'s president Dr. Paul A. Miller has named 16 students, faculty, staff and citizens of the community to serve on a special Task Force on Environmental Studies. Dr. Edward T. Kirkpatrick, dean of the College of Engineering, was appointed chairman.

The announcement follows Dr. Miller's recent appointment of members of an Institute Task Force on Environment which will study and make recommendations on ways and means of improving the environmental conditions of the new campus.

Objectives of the most recently named task force as assigned

by Dr. Miller are:

"To study and make suggestions as to the type of short courses, institutes, seminars, and degree programs that might be appropriate for the Institute to undertake.

"To determine, and to help conduct, what the Institute may uniquely do in cooperating with local, state, and national groups to mount effective and sustained efforts in the environmental field.

"To encourage discussion and dissemination of information to the end that all of us will be increasingly more aware of the need for continuing action and thought on the problem of despoilation of our environment."

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R.I.T. 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KIMBER ESTATE SETTLEMENT AWARDS R.I.T. \$430,000 -- The estate of Mrs. Claire E. Kimber, widow of Harold C. Kimber, retired Eastman Kodak engineer, will leave over \$430,000 to

Rochester Institute of Technology.

The University of Rochester shared equally with R.I.T. in the bequest. Ten other organizations and 21 other persons in addition to her relatives shared in the estate. Mrs. Kimber died November 28, 1967 at the age of 72.

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DEAN BRENNAN SERVES AS ART JUDGE -- Professor Harold J. Brennan, dean of the College of Fine and Applied Arts, heads a trio of distinguished scholar designer-craftsmen in the acceptance of entries and final judging of art objects for the fifth biennial "Designer-Craftsmen Exhibition" sponsored by the Columbus (Ohio) Gallery of Fine Arts, June 13 through July 26.

With Daniel Rhodes of Alfred University and Theodore Hallman of Moore College of Art and Design in Philadelphia, Dean Brennan viewed over sixteen hundred 35 mm. slides of possible exhibits. Over 580 designer-craftsmen from 11 states in the North Central Region of the American Crafts Council will be exhibiting their works.

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SERIES -- A series of one hour seminars on R.I.T.'s financial systems are currently being held Thursdays from 10 to 11 a.m. in the Alumni room of the College-Alumni Union. The purpose of the seminars, which were arranged by William J. Welch, controller and John L. Gunter, Director of Computer Services, is to promote inter-departmental and Institute-wide communication and cooperation. The seminar program is designed to progressively cover computerized financial systems used by R.I.T. from the basic terminology stages through future planning in these areas for the entire Institute. The subject area is such that all R.I.T. students, faculty and staff members are invited to participate.

ASSISTANT PROFESSOR WRITES, TRAVELS AND GETS PROMOTED
WHILE ON SABBATICAL -- Pellegrino Nazzaro, assistant professor
of History, College of General Studies, published an article
simply called "Italy" in the May 1970 Current History magazine
at the request of the editor of the New York Times sponsored
publication. The article discussed Italy's political and economic
status within Europe and Italy's outlook toward the future.
Nazzaro's article also discussed the possible impact on Italy,
if Britain were to enter the Common Market. Also covered in the
story was his speculation on Italy's future attitude toward NATO
in respect to free Europe's current reapproachment trend toward
Eastern European Countries.

Nazzaro has been notified, that effective September 1 he will be promoted to the rank of associate professor. In the meantime, he is spending his last months of sabbatical leave in researching Alfredo Rocco and fascist constitutionalism in Italy (1925-1935). He is spending two months in Italy, searching the Archives of Rome, Naples and Padua, with the remaining period to be spent in Washington, D.C.

The scholarship is awarded annually to a junior graphic design student who is selected from 13 of the nation's top art

and design colleges.

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PHOTOGRAPHY TEACHERS AND GUIDANCE PERSONNEL TAKING SPECIAL GRADUATE LEVEL COURSE -- A nine quarter credit graduate level course on the theory, principles and applications of practical black and white and color photography is being offered at Rochester Institute of Technology from June 22 through July 24.

The course is for high school and junior college personnel who teach photography or who are involved in guidance for students

interested in the photographic science field.

The course is being sponsored jointly by R.I.T.'s College of Graphic Arts and Photography and the Winona (III.) School of Professional Photographers of America, Inc. of Des Plaines, III.

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DR. MILLER COMMENTS ON NIXON ADMINISTRATION ACTION -- When asked by the Democrat and Chronicle to comment on the Nixon Administration's recent dismissal of Dr. James E. Allen, Jr. as Secretary of Education for the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, R.I.T.'s President Dr. Paul A. Miller said "I have thought for years that Allen was one of the outstanding men in American Education". Miller also cited Allen's position on school desegregation as well as his work as assistant secretary with the Right to Read program and National Educational Research Center.

Dr. Miller recounted that he had served as assistant secretary for education from 1966 through 1968 under former Health, Education and Welfare Secretary John Gardner.

Miller said that he could not evaluate Allen's performance as part of the government, but that, as an outsider judging from news reports, he believes Allen's removal would be a "loss" for HEW.

Miller added, "But this is an indication of how important education is in relation to what is happening nationally".
Miller continued, "after Allen's frank criticism of the administration's Cambodian move, one would expect it would be difficult to retain him."

Miller emphasized, There has to be a general concensus, a teamwork in an administration". Miller felt that while he admired Allen's integrity and that his remarks on Cambodia were typical of his honesty, that those remarks triggered the Administration's action. Dr. Miller hoped the ouster was in no way related to Allen's attitudes on school desegregation. Dr. Miller expects that Dr. Allen will continue as a leader in education outside the government.
