NEW PROVOST NAMED -- R.I.T. President, Dr. Paul A. Miller, announced on March 27 that Dr. Todd H. Bullard, president of Potomac State College of West Virginia University, will assume the newly-created post of provost and vice president for Academic Affairs at R.I.T. on or about August 1.

Bullard, president of Potomac State since 1964, and an authority on post high school vocational-technical education, is a native of West Virginia and holds a Ph.D. degree (political science) from the University of Pittsburgh.

MRS. ELLINGSON NAMED TO DEFENSE POST -- Mrs. Mark Ellingson, wife of R.I.T.'s President Emeritus, has been appointed by Secretary of Defense Melvin R. Laird to serve on the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services (DACOWITS). The founder and president of Rochester Women Power, a group advocating draft reforms, Mrs. Ellingson will be advising defense officials on housing, training, recruiting and other matters affecting women in service. Her appointment was recommended by Rep. Frank Horton, (R-36.)
