The Nathaniel Rochester Society of RIT will meet on Jan. 23 for the first meeting of the new year, at the Inn on the Campus.

Highlight of the meeting will be the presentation of the Nathaniel Rochester Society Award to the four trustees of the Mary Flagler Cary Charitable Trust of New York City. Trustees are: Edward S. Bentley, Herbert J. Jacobi, Mr. L. Lee (Helen) Stanton and Frank S. Stubbs.

In 1969, the Trustees established the Melbert B. Cary, Jr. Graphic Arts Fund in recognition of the significance of the graphic arts program at RIT. The Fund, which meets important Institute needs includes: The Melbert B. Cary, Jr. Graphic Arts Collection; the Melbert B. Cary, Jr. Professorship in Graphic Arts; the Frederick W. Goudy Distinguished

Lecture in Typography; and the Melbert B. Cary, Jr. Scholarships and Fellowships for undergraduate and graduate students in the School of Printing.

Engineering Prof Researching Engine Failure That Crippled Ships, Nuclear Power Plant

The failure of blades in its turbomachinery can cause a ship to be sidelined in port for a month. Repair costs can run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Great Britain recently experienced a national crisis when this problem beset the luxury liner "Queen Elizabeth II" on its maiden voyage.

And a similar failure recently closed Rochester Gas & Electric's Ginna nuclear power plant indefinitely.

Up to now, the U.S. Navy and the merchant shipping fleet have had to grin and bear such calamities.

But a project being conducted at RIT by Dr. Neville F. Rieger of Pittsford, for the Navy, might make headway into the problem.

"Only part of the problem of failure of blades is understood," says the James E. Gleason Professor of Mechanical Engineering at RIT. "We really don't know much about how big the forces cont'd p.2

Hugh Hammett Named To Continuing Ed Post

Hugh B. Hammett has been named chairman of the History and Political Science division of the College of Continuing Education.

He is the author of "America's Non-Policy in Eastern Europe and the Origins of the Cold War" in the Autumn issue of Survey: A Journal of East and West. His essay, "The Jay Treaty: Crisis Diplomacy in the New Nation" will appear in the forthcoming January issue of The Social Studies, and an article on "Labor and Race: The Georgia Railroad Strike of 1909" is to appear in a forthcoming issue of Labor History.

Also forthcoming is Hammett's book, Hilary Abner Herbert: A Southerner Returns to the Union, a biography of the 34th Secretary of the Navy, to be published by the American Philosophical Society of Philadelphia.

Dr. Hammett most recently taught at Ithaca College. He has taught graduate courses at Elmira College and the University of Virginia, and was an assistant professor at Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University for one year. Recipient of several scholarships and fellowships, Dr. Hammett earned his B.A. in History from Furman University, and both his M.S. and Ph.D. in History from the University of Virginia.

"Dr. Hammett will be a significant addition to RIT's faculty, and we expect his leadership to enhance the reputation of the College of Continuing Education for innovation," according to Fred Gardner, Director of General Education.

Two RIT mechanical engineering professors have received a publishing contract for a textbook to support a series of videotapes they've produced for teaching a basic statics course.

Dr. Robert A. Ellson, associate professor, and Dr. William F. Halbleib, professor of the Mechanical Engineering Department of the College of Engineering, team taught on the 28 videotapes which premiered to a class at RIT during Fall Quarter 1973.

The West Publishing Company of St. Paul, Minn., will begin printing the supporting textbook and will assume part of the responsibility for advertising the videotapes along with the text.

are that are causing the trouble, and up to now there has been no reliable way to make any useful measurements."

But through Rieger's project - which is being carried out with the assistance of the RIT Media Design Center - those forces are being measured for the first time.

Alfie Wicks of 269 Perkins Green, Henrietta, a research associate in Mechanical Engineering at RIT, designed and built Dr. Rieger a water table which simulates the flow of fluid through a cascade of blades and nozzles such as would be used in any piece of turbomachinery.

Larry McKnight of 33 Crestline Drive, Avon, a photographer in the Media Design Center, is filming the flow with high speed movie cameras. Every one second of actual action will be seen for 1 1/2 minutes on the screen. Dr. Rieger and the team of experts he has assembled can watch every wave in the flow under simulated blade operating conditions.

"Some of the world's first results in studying this problem will come from our water table," says Dr. Rieger. The model cost \$20,000 to build and develop --- not much when compared with the hundreds of thousands of dollars it costs to make similar tests on actual machinery without getting the new knowledge the water table yields.

Dr. Rieger believes the project could take about five years of work for "quite a team" of people: engineers, scientists, mathematicians and photographers. The first stage of the project has been successfully completed. Dr. Rieger's team is waiting for the next stage to be approved by the Naval Engineering Center in Washington.

Meanwhile, the U.S. Air Force, which has a similar failure problem with its aircraft turbines, is also interested in the study, as are the Big 3 of the turbine industry - Westinghouse, General Electric and Worthington Turbine.

Applications of the study go well beyond these giants, however, says Dr. Rieger. Down - time for a large turbine could cost a utility like Rochester Gas & Electric Corporation \$1 million a day in lost revenues, he says.

The first showing of the films McKnight made came at a conference in India over Christmas. Dr. Rieger spent four weeks lecturing at Indian institutes of technology and at heavy industrial plants on failure prevention in machinery.



Work/Study Program Big In Future: Dr. Eble

"The thing you've been doing at RIT - - maintaining a close relationship between the practical world of work and the world of study - - is what other colleges are now being forced into . . . you're lucky you're at RIT," Dr. Kenneth Eble told faculty members at a lecture last week.

Eble, former director of the Carnegie Foundation's Project to Improve College Teaching and author of "Professors as Teachers," spoke on "College Teaching Today: Some Proposals," last Thursday.

His lecture was sponsored by the faculty council as the first in a series on faculty productivity and teaching effec-

Eble said "there's not going to be much growth" in general higher education, particularly the liberal arts, over the next years, and said there's been a loss in faith in "ever - continuing education."
