NEWS BRIEFS

DAVIS NAMED TO ASSIST BOARD -- Alfred L. Davis, vice president for development and public relations at RIT will assume the post of administrative secretary to the RIT Board of Trustees, it was announced Aug. 26.

The announcement was made by Dr. Paul A. Miller, RIT president, who said that Davis would undertake his new assignment on September 1.

Commenting on the appointment, Dr. Miller noted Davis' long and valuable service to the Institute (28 years), and to the community. "It is because of this experience gained over the years that the Trustees feel Mr. Davis can be of great assistance in working closely with the many efforts and programs sponsored by the Board of Trustees and its supporting groups. These include the Nathaniel Rochester Society, Women's Council, Women's Club, Parent's Association, and others," he said. "One of the most important tasks for Mr. Davis in his new position," Dr. Miller added, "will be to represent the Board of Trustees, its sub-committees and supporting groups in a long-range planning effort which RIT has already begun."

Davis will report directly to President Miller, maintaining a continuous liaison with the chairman and secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Born in Boulder, Colorado, Davis earned a bachelor of arts degree from Salem College (W.Va.) and a master of arts degree from Syracuse University before joining the RIT faculty in 1938. Serving as an instructor in the General Education Department from 1938-41, Davis left RIT during World War II to become chief inspector of the Instrument Division at Bausch & Lomb, Inc.

Returning to RIT in 1945, he was named associate director of the Evening Division, a post he held until being appointed director of public relations in 1951. He was made vice president for development and public relations in 1960.

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WARREN CHAPPELL TO RECEIVE GOUDY AWARD ON OCTOBER 30 -- Warren Chappell, internationally known book designer, illustrator, and typographer, will receive the second annual Frederic W. Goudy Award from RIT on October 30.

The award is made possible by a grant from the Mary Flagler Cary Charitable Trust. It is a silver bowl, designed and hand-crafted by the noted silversmith, Professor Hans Christiansen of RIT's School for American Craftsmen.

Chappell has designed two type faces, "Lydian" and "Trajanus", and has designed and/or illustrated several hundred titles for the country's leading book publishers.

Chappell will deliver a lecture on October 30 and will spend several days on campus, conferring informally with RIT students and faculty members.

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THREE-DAY ORIENTATION PLANNED FOR NEW FACULTY -- RIT's new faculty members will participate in a three-day Incoming Faculty Orientation program September 9-11. The program, coordinated by Dr. Richard Zakia of Instructional Resources, will focus on the instructional aspects of RIT.

The agenda for the orientation includes tours of the campus by administrators and deans, two sessions on academic support services, and discussion sessions on governance and on instructional methods.

Dr. D. Robert Frisina, Vice President of NTID, will serve as moderator for a panel discussion on governance on September 10 at 9 a.m. in the Administration Tower's second-floor Auditorium. Participants will include RIT President, Dr. Paul A. Miller, Dr. Stanley McKenzie of the College of General Studies, and Alan Ritsko, president of the RIT Student Association.

The instructional methods session on September 11 at 9 a.m. in the Booth Auditorium will be led by John Henderson, director of the Center for Community College Faculty Development. Key discussion leaders will be Dane Gordon of General Studies, who will talk on the teaching-learning process, and Hollis Todd of the School of Photographic Arts and Sciences, who will speak on grading and testing.

Luncheons are scheduled for the served dining room in the College-Alumni Union on September 10 and 11, and, following the final session on September 11, there will be an informal reception, also in the Union.

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COLLEGE OF CONTINUING EDUCATION ENTERS THREE NEW AREAS -- RIT's College of Continuing Education, which is expected to serve over 12,000 people in its degree and diploma programs and short courses during the 1970-71 academic year, will offer instruction in three new areas in September. All three will lead to the Associate in Applied Science (A.A.S.) degree.

The three are Electro-Mechanical Technology, Money and Finance, and Health Institutions Management.

Electro-Mechanical Technology, in the Division of Applied Science, was developed to answer a need, expressed by local industry, to cross the electrical and mechanical disciplines.

The new program will be housed in RIT's Metropolitan Center, 50 Main St. W., and will employ over \$15,000 worth of new equipment.

Money and Finance, devised for people in banking, investments, and finance, is offered by the Business Division. It was developed in cooperation with the local chapter of the American Institute of Banking (AIB), and covers business law, accounting, data processing, management, and other related subjects.

Health Institutions Management, in the Management Division, is designed to prepare men and women for management positions in hospitals, nursing homes, and related health service areas. It sprung from short courses for nursing home and hospital administrators, offered in the past by the Extended Services Division of the College.

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RIT PROFESSOR WINS MASTER PHOTOGRAPHIC CRAFTSMAN TITLE -- Assistant Professor Douglas A. Lyttle of the School of Photographic Arts and Sciences was awarded the degree of "Photographic Craftsman" by the Professional Photographers of America, Inc., in a special ceremony Aug. 5 at the (PP o A's 79th International) STET Exposition of Professional Photography in Chicago. With a previously earned degree of Master of Photography, the new degree gives Lyttle the title of "Master Photographic Craftsman."

Two of Lyttle's prints, titled "Cloister--Antigua" and "Golden Light--Bogota", were selected for inclusion in the American Society of Photographers' Masters' Exhibit at the exposition.

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PROFESSORS TO TRADE HOMES AND JOBS -- Professor Charles A. Arnold Jr. of the School of Photographic Arts and Sciences will be trading homes, jobs, cars--even cats--with Derek Drage, a teacher at London Polytechnic Institute, starting this September.

Prof. Arnold, his wife, daughter and two sons will be living in the Drage home in Southbourne, England, on the south coast, while he teaches freshman visual studies in London. During their year in England, the Arnolds will have the use of the Drages' van and the care of their two cats.

Drage, his wife and their five young sons will be living in the Arnold home in Webster while Drage teaches third-year illustration and a fourth-year studio course at RIT. They will have the use of the Arnolds' station wagon and the care of the Arnold cat.

The two families will pass each other in mid-Atlantic. The Arnolds left Sept. 3 on the Queen Elizabeth II, taking six days to get to England. The Drage family leaves England Sept. 7 by plane.

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EASTERN NEW ENGLAND ALUMNI MEET -- RIT alumni from the Eastern New England area gathered August 19 at the MIT Faculty Club in Cambridge, Mass. for the traditional Freshmen-Alumni Luncheon.

The event was held to honor the entering class of over 50 RIT freshmen from the Eastern New England area.

Chairman for the luncheon was Robert J. Adler of Billerica, Mass., a 1959 graduate of RIT and president of the RIT Alumni Club of Eastern New England.

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ECKERT PROMOTED -- Charles J. Eckert, formerly assistant director of Student Activities, has been appointed director of Student Activities according to a recent announcement by Charles G. Welch, dean of students.
