FAMOUS DEAF ACTOR TO PERFORM AT RIT -- One of the foremost deaf actors in the world, Bernard Bragg, will be part of the cast when the National Theatre of the Deaf (NTD) performs October 8 and 9 at 8:15 p.m. in the Ingle auditorium of the College-Alumni Union.

Bragg, one of the founding members of NTD, also will participate in workshops for area college and high school drama groups. The workshops are scheduled for October 6 and 7 at 7:30 p.m. in the Ingle Memorial Auditorium.

The performances and workshops are designed for the hearing as well as the deaf and are open to the public. Tickets are available in RIT's College-Alumni Union.

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BRITISH JOURNALIST, AT RIT ON OCT. 6th -- G. Allen Hutt, an internationally recognized British journalist and newspaper designer, will be a guest at RIT on Oct. 6.

In the United States as a consultant to the Washington Post, Hutt will tour the RIT campus in the morning and give a talk at 1 p.m., in the Booth Auditorium of the Frank E. Gannett Memorial building, to the School of Printing faculty and students.

Hutt was the first journalist and newspaper designer to be named a (British) Royal Designer for Industry when he was granted the honor this year. A technical adviser to the Annual Award for Newspaper Design in Britain and a lecturer on newspaper typography for the National Council for the Training of Journalists and the Thomson Foundation, he has been the editor of The Journalist, the newspaper of the British National Union of Journalists, since 1948.

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APPOINTMENT OF MRS. MICHAL McKENZIE ANNOUNCED BY DEAN WELCH -- Mrs. Michal McKenzie has been appointed assistant to the dean of students for Institutional and Residential Programming, according to a recent announcement by Charles G. Welch, dean of students and acting head of Student Personnel Services.

Mrs. McKenzie received her B.A. degree from Whitworth College in Spokane, Washington, and her M.A. degree from the University of Wisconsin. She was the executive director of the Campfire Girls in Wenatchee, Washington before joining the staff at RIT in July of 1969 as associate director in Housing. Her office is now located in the Nathaniel Rochester Hall, room 1044.

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TALISMAN LISTS WEEKEND PROGRAM -- "Take One," the first in a Friday night three-week series of student documentaries, to be presented by Talisman Film Festival of the Cinema Arts Division of RIT's College Union Board, leads off the October 1 thru 5 film presentations in the Booth Auditorium of the Frank E. Gannett Memorial building. All Talisman films will be presented at 7:30 and 10 p.m. with admission fees of \$1.00 per person.

"Take One," to be shown Friday, October 2, is a series of student produced experimental films from New York University and the University of Southern California. The viewings are open to the general public.

"Bonnie and Clyde," starring Warren Beatty and Faye Dunaway, will be shown on Saturday, October 3. The film is a drama of gangster violence of the 1930's and is directed by Irving Penn who also directed "Alice's Restaurant." -- Open to students and all Institute personnel,--closed to the general public.

Sunday night's viewings are two versions of "Imitation of Life," based on a novel by Fannie Hurst. Claudette Colbert and Louise Beavers star in the earlier interpretation with Lana Turner and Juanita Moore in the Ross Hunter produced remake of the 1934 film. The movie's theme centers around a business partnership between a young white widow with a baby daughter, and a black woman who also has a young daughter. In the later version, the black women's daughter tries to pass herself off as white. --Open to students and all Institute personnel,-- closed to the general public.

On Monday night, October 5, the Foreign Film Festival of Talisman will present "Shop on Main Street," which in 1968 won an academy award for the best foreign film of the year. --Open to all students and Institute personnel,--closed to the general public.

As a special bonus, College Union Showtime will present "Invasion From Mars," at 7 p.m. on Saturday, October 3, in room A-205 of the College of General Studies. The film portrays a quiet country town which is thrown into an uproar when invaders from Mars turn "parents into killers, policemen into arsonists and a general into a saboteur."--Open only to students and all Institute personnel,--closed to the general public. --Admission is free.

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FIRST FORUM SERIES STARTS SEPT. 28th-- Arthur C. Bryant, Lutheran pastor in Greenport Long Island, and one of the film makers of the 1968 CBS Television documentary "What Harvest the Reaper?," will speak on "Democracy's Dispossessed-- The Migrant Worker," at Rochester Institute of Technology on Monday, Sept. 28, 4 p.m. in room 1251 of the College of General Studies.

Sponsored by RIT's Student Christian Movement as part of the group's First Forum Series program, the lecture is open to all Institute personnel and the general public at no admission charge.

Bryant is the recipient of the 1970 "Man of the Year" award from the Suffolk County (N.Y.) Civil Liberties Union.

Long involved in the problems of the migrant farm worker, he is currently vice chairman of the Suffolk County Human Relations Commission, and chairman of the group's migrant worker committee.

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PHOTO EXHIBIT BY PFAHL ON DISPLAY IN LIBRARY -- "Oaxaca," an exhibit of 25 color photographs by John Pfahl, assistant professor in RIT's School of Photographic Arts and Sciences, will be on display in the Wallace Memorial Library through October 15.

The photographs were taken in Oaxaca, Mexico, the location of one of the largest and oldest Indian markets in the world. Pfahl's prints were made by a special color process which utilized a color transparency film as a negative material.

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ARTICLE BY DR. STARK RECENTLY PUBLISHED -- Dr. Egon Stark, associate professor of Microbiology, in RIT's College of Science, is the author of a scientific article published in the August issue of Applied Microbiology.

In the article, entitled "Fecal Streptococci on barley and malt kernels and instant malted milk powder." Dr. Stark reported, apparently for the first time, the abundant occurrence of these indicator organisms of fecal pollution on malt and malt-containing food. A manuscript of the wide-spread occurrence of these bacteria on malt-contained foods bought in Rochester supermarkets, is now in preparation by Dr. Stark.

Dr. Stark was recently named editor of the Microbial Biochemistry section of Chemical Abstracts.

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NEW DEAN TO OFFER CLASS IN JUDO -- Dr. Robert Johnston, recently appointed dean of the College of Fine and Applied Arts, will offer instruction in one of his hobbies--judo--to all interested RIT students, faculty, and staff starting on Tuesday, Sept. 29. 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RIT CAMPUS PICTURED IN "TIME" MAGAZINE -- RIT's College-Alumni Union is featured in an article titled "The Campus: Architectures's Show Place," in the current issue of "Time" magazine (September 21).

The article states that college campuses have become the latest media for architectural innovations. The design concepts of architects Keven Roche and John Dinkeloo, who designed the College-Alumni Union building, are discussed in the article. 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PHOTO SOCIETY HONORS PROF. MCMILLION -- Prof. James E. McMillion, holder of the James E. McGhee Memorial Professorship in Photographic Management, has been given the Victor H. Scales Memorial Award by the Photographic Society of America, (PSA).

The award, conferred by Col. Joe E. Kennedy, FPSA, president of PSA, August 18 at the PSA international convention in Los Angeles, cites Prof. McMillion for service to photography and the society, ". . . especially for his administrative ability in recognizing and coordinating a working relationship between the amateur and professional photographer." It is one of the top three awards the PSA gives.

Prof. McMillion is an Associate of the society and has been its publications vice president since 1968. He is also the chairman of W.G. 9, a section of the International Standards Organization.

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CHECK PRESENTED TO SCHOOL OF PRINTING -- F. Richard Eichorn, president of the Printing Industries Association of Rochester, Inc., presented a check for \$3,500 Sept. 14 to Prof. Hector H. Sutherland, director of the School of Printing. The money is the third and final portion of \$10,500 pledged to the Institute three years ago for the new campus fund.

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SCHOOL OF PRINTING FORMS DIVISIONS -- Prof. Hector Sutherland, director of the School of Printing, has announced the formation of four divisions within the School and the appointment of four staff chairmen to lead them.

The new divisions and their staff chairmen are as follows: Design-Composition-Journalism Division, Assistant Professor Archibald D. Provan; Photo-Plate-Press Division, Assistant Professor Clifton T. Frazier; Printing Management Division, Assistant Professor Dr. Robert G. Hacker; Graduate Studies Division, Associate Professor Dr. Mark F. Guldin. (Dr. Guldin's new title is Coordinator rather than staff chairman.)

The purpose of the new divisions is to more deeply involve the faculty in the administration of the school, Prof. Sutherland explained. "I have always felt the faculty should be more involved in administration," he said. "This change is going to do two things: it is going to rightfully give the faculty a bigger voice in participating in matters pertaining to their jobs and, secondly, it is going to give us a greater opportunity to do more on the divisional level, the committee level. It's not a new idea," he noted, "it's the way Congress works."

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DAVIDSON BOOK DONATED -- East 100th Street, a book prepared by Bruce Davidson, PH '54, has been donated to the R.I.T. library by its publisher, Harvard University Press.

The book, a photographic essay and sociological study of New York's Spanish Harlem, was presented to Alumni Relations Director Richard Limpert in August, one month prior to its release date, in order to give R.I.T. library users "a sneak preview of a distinguished alumnus' work."

Mr. Davidson developed his photographic study under a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, the first if its kind awarded for photography. The work is a chronicle of his emotional responses to the people of Spanish Harlem. Void of text, it presents visual impressions of the life-styles of the people who live on East 100th Street, a "ghetto" to outsiders, but home to its inhabitants.

East 100th Street was featured on NBC's "Today Show" on September 21, and has had selections published in Life, Vogue, Popular Photography, and Saturday Review. Printed by Case-Hoyt Corporation of Rochester, it involved R.I.T. alumni in various aspects of its production.

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
