METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION IS TOPIC OF NOVEMBER 5 SYMPOSIUM -Extended Services is sponsoring a public forum on metropolitan
transportation on Thursday (Nov. 5) at the Metropolitan Center,
50 West Main St. Short talks will be given by eight experts,
and a panel discussion will follow. Among the participants

The moderator will be Fred Goldstein, RIT assistant professor (College of Science) and chairman of an independent subcommittee on metropolitan ecology.

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PAPERO NAMED TO ABC BOARD OF DIRECTORS -- James Papero, assistant director of RIT's Extended Services Division, has been appointed to the board of directors of Action for a Better Community (ABC), as a representative of the Institute. ABC, a federally-funded office, was established to administer a wide variety of funded community action programs. It is a local extension of the Office of Economic Opportunity.

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HILTON NAMED PRESIDENT OF CONSUMER COUNCIL OF MONROE COUNTY—Ronald J. Hilton, academic administrator of RIT's Metropolitan Center, has been elected president of the Consumer Council of Monroe County. Hilton, who was assistant to Dean Robert Pease of the College of Continuing Education before taking the 50 West Main St. position, listed three areas of concern for the council: prescription drug prices, credit abuses, and environmental pollution. He also hopes to broaden the membership of the council to cover more segments of the community.

Dr. Derrald Livingston, director of the Business Division of the College of Continuing Education, was elected treasurer of the council.

DR. DONALD D. JOHNSON NAMED DIRECTOR OF NTID COMMUNICATIONS CENTER -- Dr. Donald D. Johnson has been named director of the Communications Center at NTID, according to an announcement by NTID Dean William E. Castle.

Dr. Johnson will be responsible for coordinating speech pathology, audiology and interpretive services for NTID.

Prior to joining NTID, Johnson was employed by Gallaudet College in Washington, D.C., as a research associate, assistant professor of audiology, teacher of graduate courses and supervising audiologist. He also has served as an audiologist in the Children's Hospital, Utica, N.Y.

CROSS COUNTRY TEAM FINISHED SECOND IN ICAC CHAMPIONSHIPS -RIT made its formal bow in Independent College Athletic
Conference competition last Saturday (Oct. 24), with a
second-place finish in the conference cross country championships at Troy, N.Y. Host RPI was first with 34; RIT had 44;
and the rest of the field was far behind. The first RIT
runner to cross the finish line was Tom Doehler, who came
in fourth, 36 seconds behind the winner. Other RIT pointscorers were Dave Kosowski (5), Bob VanNiel (9), Bob Backofen (12),
and Ron Pollock (14).

Doehler, who has led the RIT cross-country efforts this season, while standout Dave Kosowski's injured knee slowly strengthens, has been the top RIT finisher in every race thus far and has been the overall winner against eight of 11 opponents. Doehler, who transferred to RIT from Monroe Community College this year, made St. Bonaventure his eighth victim last week at Olean and did so in the record-breaking time of 22 minutes flat.

For his efforts, Doehler has been named Athlete of the Week by the RIT Athletic Committee.
