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NEWS BRIEFS

GROUNDBREAKING SCHEDULED FOR NTID COMPLEX -- Groundbreaking for a multi-million-dollar National Technical Institute for the Deaf complex at RIT has been scheduled for June 4, according to a recent announcement by Dr. Robert Frisina, RIT vice-president and director of NTID.

Dr. Frisina also announced that construction documents and specifications have been made available to prospective bidders. Bids will be opened April 14, 1971, with construction beginning approximately 90 days thereafter.

The Congress has recently appropriated some \$18 million in construction funds for the new complex.

An academic support services building and additional residence and dining space will comprise the NTID facilities which have an anticipated completion date of September 1973.

"Only a lack of facilities on the RIT campus keeps the National Institute from becoming fully operational," said RIT President Dr. Paul A. Miller. "With the additional space provided in these new buildings, NTID can more fully serve the technical educational needs of this nation's deaf young people."

In gearing up for the new facilities, NTID's programs expanded from 4 to 31 over the past year. In addition to these programs, all curricula available to hearing students within the seven other colleges at RIT, also are available to deaf students.

Dr. Frisina pointed out that the new facilities will help NTID to fulfill its basic mission, that of providing deaf young people with the educational and social competency that will qualify them for successful and meaningful employment.

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PHOTO EXPO 71, TO PROVIDE JOB OPPORTUNITIES FOR RIT GRAD'S.-- The School of Photographic Arts and Sciences of RIT's College of Graphic Arts and Photography will use booth 169 at "Photo Expo 71" in Chicago (April 17-25), not only to convey information about RIT but also to provide employers with an easy access to the more than 130 photography seniors in this year's graduating class.

"We will have a revolving display of some of the best work our students have produced, plus the resumes and portfolios of each student who will be graduating this year," commented Prof. William S. Shoemaker, director of the School of Photographic Arts and Sciences. "In addition, we will have a direct telephone line to the RIT placement office, to let employers who are interested in particular students get in contact with them quickly," Shoemaker said.

"We also will be telling people about the photography programs we offer at RIT, about our plans for the future, and particularly, about some recent changes we have made. We recently revised the bachelor and master of science programs in photographic science and instrumentation. We have made some major revisions in the professional photography and photographic illustration programs also, primarily to allow the students greater opportunity to select electives," he said.

"One of the things we hope to avoid at "Photo Expo 71" is the sort of traditional, dull, routine type of display. The student work we plan to show will be exciting, I think, and the opportunity we're offering to employers should be equally exciting, particularly to the smaller businesses. It's not often that they get a chance to select from a pool of trained talent this big, with portfolios and resumes right there all at once," Shoemaker added.

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"ICE NIGHT" SET FOR FEB. 28 -- The beauty and grace of figure skating will be combined with the rugged action of ice hockey, as RIT's Alumni Club of Greater Rochester presents its second annual "Ice Night" on Sunday, Feb. 28.

The site will be the Frank Ritter Memorial Ice Arena on the RIT campus, starting at 7 p.m. All RIT alumni, along with their families and friends, and the alumni of St. John Fisher College, RIT's hockey opponent for the evening, have been invited to attend. There is no admission charge.

Members of the Genesee Figure Skating Club will provide the talent for the first part of the program, followed by the hockey match between RIT's Tigers and the Fisher Cardinals.

Last year, a standing-room-only crowd of 2,500 watched the figure skaters perform and then saw RIT edged, 8-5, by the University of Buffalo.

Kay Conlon (792 W. Lake Rd., Geneseo), a 1953 graduate of RIT's School of Photographic Arts and Sciences, is chairman of the program.

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ADVANCED COLOR COURSE PLANNED FOR KODAK EMPLOYEES -- RIT's Graphic Arts Research Center on Feb. 26 will be offering an optional third day to the Eastman Kodak Company's two-day Advanced Color Course.

The Research Center will offer a one-day program on color scanners, including their basic concepts and operating principles, their history, the various types of scanners, a critical comparison of color separation production by scanner versus conventional photographic methods, and a general survey of scanners available today.

A demonstration of scanners available at RIT, as well as a tour of the Frank E. Gannett Memorial Building, will also be included in the program.

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RIT SOCIETIES TO PRESENT REPORT ON INTERNATIONAL PHOTO CONFERENCE -- The joint RIT Chapter of the Society of Photographic Scientists and Engineers (SPSE) and the Society of Motion Picture and Television Engineers (SMPTE), will sponsor a lecture entitled "Report on the Moscow International Congress of Photographic Science," on Thursday, Feb. 25, 1 p.m., in the College of General Studies Auditorium, room A-205.

Lecturers will be Dr. Paul Gilman, Jr., Dr. Wesley T. Hanson, and Dr. Rex B. Pontius, all of the Eastman Kodak Research Laboratories.

The speakers will interpret the significance of the technical presentations which were given this past summer in Moscow at the International Congress of Photographic Science. In addition, they will share their impressions and personal experiences, illustrated with color slides, on their visits in and around Moscow.

The program is open to all Institute personnel and the general public.

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FORMER PRINTING DIRECTOR DIES -- Byron G. Culver, director of RIT's School of Printing from its founding in 1937, to his retirement in 1967, died Feb. 12 at age 75 in his home in Brighton.

A native of Barre, N.Y., he graduated from the School of Fine and Applied Art in 1918 and joined its faculty the following year. He became assistant supervisor of the College of Continuing Education (then called the Evening School) in 1927, holding that position until he was named director of the School of Printing.

Among the many positions he held were: president of the International Graphic Arts Education Association; chairman of the education committee of the International Association of Printing House Craftsmen; director of the Rochester Advertising Council; and secretary of the Education Council of the Graphic Arts Industry.

In 1965, he was named the year's outstanding alumnus of RIT. His many other honors included: Man of the Year in 1963 by the Lithographers of New York City; the Friedman Medal in 1955; and the Elmer G. Voit Award for exemplary service in the field of graphic arts education in 1951.

A memorial service for Mr. Culver will be held Friday, Feb. 26, 3:30 p.m. in the faculty conference room of the College of Graphic Arts and Photography, in the Gannett Building, across from the Graphic Arts Research Center Information Service library. Mr. Culver's family has asked that memorial donations be sent to the Ellingson Scholarship Endowment Fund.

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PROFESSIONAL PHOTOGRAPHER TO VISIT RIT -- Professional photographer Victor Skrebnesky of Chicago, will visit RIT on Wednesday, Feb. 24, as part of the Photography MFA Seminar Series program. Skrebnesky is famed for his classic nude study of Vanessa Redgrave, which was used for the advertising theme of the motion picture "The Loves of Isodora."

BASKETBALL UPSET SCORED OVER HARTWICK -- One of the most satisfying victories in coach Bill Carey's RIT basketball career came last Sunday, but no one was there to watch. The 67-65 upset of highly-ranked Hartwick was postponed from Saturday night to Sunday afternoon, because of the heavy snowstorm. Unfortunately, the effects of the storm lingered through Sunday and kept the crowd to a minimum. The Tigers, employing superior rebounding and a tight defense that limited Hartwick to outside shooting, built an 18-point lead midway through the second half. A Hartwick press and a series of RIT miscues almost turned delight into disaster, as the lead disappeared within six minutes, but a three-point play by Steve Hutchinson and a pair of Tom Connelly free throws in the waning seconds cinched the victory. The Tigers stand 13-5 and are tenth in the New York State college division ratings.

The RIT swimmers moved another lap closer to a perfect season, as they drowned the University of Buffalo, for their thirteenth straight win. Freshmen Mike Kenna and Don Carlson added to their outstanding records with double victories in their freestyle specialities. All eyes will be on the Woodward Pool on Saturday (Feb. 20) when the RIT swimmers face the final big hurdle--a triangular meet with Potsdam and Niagara.

The hockey team has shown new spirit for recently elected captain Bill Lukaszonas, particularly in a 12-1 shellacking of Utica. Mike Skivington, last year's high scorer, finally broke out of his slump with a three-goal hat trick.

RIT's wrestlers split a weekend pair with Hartwick and Ithaca, moving their record to 3-6. A default in the unlimited class cost them a 21-16 decision at the hands of Ithaca, a key ICAC foe. The bright spot on the team continues to be Captain Skip White, who posted his eighth and ninth consecutive dual meet triumphs. A pair of improving freshmen, Dave Wellott and Ray Ruiffson, each won both starts easily.

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DECRISTOFARO TOPS 1000 POINT MARK -- Gene DeCristofaro has become the sixth man in RIT's basketball history to score over 1,000 career points.

Decristofaro, son of Silvio DeCristofaro, chairman of the Applied Science Division of the College of Continuing Education, netted 19 points against St. John Fisher College to give him 1,011 points. Before the season is over, the rugged 6-foot-5 cornerman should be safely in third place on the all-time RIT list. Ken Hale (1,044), Arnie Cardillo (1,071), and Bill Lamoureux (1,100) are all within Gene's reach. Jim Robinson (1,919) is far out in front.

DeCristofaro's accomplishment has earned him Athlete of the Week honors, accorded each week by the RIT Athletic Committee.

Climbing the final step to reach the 1,000 point, the plateau has been tough for the former Greece-Olympia High School standout. Going into the finals of the Lincoln-Rochester Tournament finals against Brockport on Jan. 30, DeCristofaro needed 21 points; he was held to 11, as the Tigers suffered the loss. The following Wednesday, at Oswego, DeCristofaro could manage just two free throws--far below his 17-point career average--and the Tigers lost again.

Decristofaro, who is co-captain of the Tiger team, is a senior in RIT's College of Business.
