NEWS BRIEFS

OVERTIME EFFORTS DURING BLIZZARD PRAISED BY SUPERVISORS

Hard work and a spirit of cooperation pervaded the campus during the March 4 blizzard, and many of the people who battled the elements to keep the school operating have earned praise from their supervisors.

"This was our third big storm of the winter," said Physical Plant director Thomas Hussey, "so we're getting our emergency system down pat. Everybody who had a job to do did it well."

The grounds crew, headed by Chuck Smith, carried the brunt of the load, with each of 20 men logging about 10 extra hours of work to keep the roads and parking lots as clear as possible.

The RIT dormitories swelled with the addition of an estimated 500 commuter students, faculty, and staff who were unable to leave campus. Housing director Deanne Molinari and her housekeeping supervisor, Marie Runge, coordinated the effort to accommodate the "transients". Miss Molinari also cited the work of Head Resident Bernie Laramie, Ed Amos and his Student Safety Unit, and Protective Services.

Food Service director Dominick Pane put his emergency system into operation, retaining 18 key people overnight to keep the dining rooms open. He was able to recruit several willing students to fill out his crews.

What pleased both Pane and Hussey was the lack of complaints. "There were a lot of understanding students and faculty on campus", said Hussey. I handled the telephones during many of the emergency hours, and there was not one honest complaint about our work."

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KAZMIERSKI TO DISCUSS DEVELOPMENTAL PROGRAMS AT MARYLAND COLLEGE

Reading and Study Clinic director Paul Kazmierski will address the Montgomery (Md.) College faculty on "The Open Door College vs. the Revolving Door" March 25 at Rockville, Md. Montgomery, a two-year college, currently has open enrollment and is considering implementation of a developmental education program, through which students already admitted will strengthen basic skills before embarking on a degree program. The vestibule program, now used at NTID here at RIT, used a similar concept.

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SENATE ASSEMBLY VOTE NEEDED TO SETTLE STUDENT ASSOCIATION ELECTION

When less than the necessary one-third of the student body turned out last week to elect a new president and vice-president of the Student Association, the decision was passed on to the Student Senate Assembly, who elected Keith Taylor and Scott MacLeod to fill the two S.A. positions.

Taylor, a second-year student in the College of Business, is from Alden, N.Y. His second-in-command, MacLeod, is a third-year student in the

School of Photographic Arts and Sciences. He is from Lawrenceville, N.J.

Taylor, a member of the Institute Policy Committee, has been the S.A. secretary of finance during the past year. MacLeod, a student senator for three years, has been president of the RIT Interfraternity Council.

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PUBLICATIONS STAFF GROWS; BARRINGER, MRS. GRAY PROMOTED

David E. Barringer, staff designer in the Publications office for the past year, has been promoted to assistant director of Publications, in one of three personnel moves made recently in that office.

In addition, Mrs. Josephine Gray, a staff writer, has been made editor of the RIT alumni quarterly, News & Views, and Miss Vlasta Paul has joined the staff as an artist/designer. In his new position, Barringer will supervise the production of several RIT brochures and catalogs. He will also supervise numerous RIT advertising programs and will be responsible for the RIT Exhibit Service.

Mrs. Gray, in addition to her work in Publications, is an instructor in the RIT College of Continuing Education. Miss Paul received her B.A. degree from RIT in 1969 and her M.F.A. in 1970, also from RIT.
