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DIRECTOR NAMED FOR NEW SOCIAL WORK PROGRAM

Leonard A. Gravitz, coordinator of Social Work Careers for the Minnesota Department of Welfare, has been appointed director of RIT's new Bachelor's degree program in Social Work.

Prior to his employment in the Minnesota Public Welfare Department, Gravitz was program director for the Jewish Community Center of Minneapolis, and served before that as regional director of the B'nai B'rith Youth Organization. He received his B.S. degree in Education from the State University of New York at Cortland, and his M.A. in Sociology-Anthropology, and MSW in Group Work from Washington University in St. Louis, Mo. He is a part time faculty member in the University of Minnesota's Social Work program.

Dr. Paul Bernstein, dean of RIT's College of General Studies, stated that "Gravitz's strong and varied background in the field of social work, including his extensive knowledge of the social conditions in urban communities, makes him exceptionally well qualified to direct this new degree program".

The program, which will be first offered in September by the College of General Studies, will provide candidates with field work experience in a variety of social, educational, and governmental agencies, and will require each student to have a working knowledge of Spanish.



#### NTID ADMINISTRATORS TO ADDRESS PERSONNEL AND GUIDANCE CONVENTION

NTID will serve as an educational model in a speech at the 1971 Convention of the American Personnel and Guidance Association April 4-8 in Atlantic City, N.J. Three NTID administrators will present a paper titled "The Systems Approach in the Rehabilitative Process" to the convention. The National Institute will serve as the example of an educational system for the disadvantaged. Taking part in the presentation will be William H. Williams, administrative assistant to the vice president; Dr. Jack R. Clarcq, assistant dean for technical education; and Dr. James L. Collins, assistant dean for developmental education.

#### GRAPHIX CLUB SPONSORS CALENDAR SHOW AT BANKS AND UNION

"Kalender Schau 71" (German for Calendar Show 71), an exhibition of more than 200 calendars from 7 different European countries, is now being shown in Rochester banks, prior to appearing in the College-Alumni Union from May 24-June 6.

The exhibition is sponsored annually in the United States by the Graphix Club of the School of Printing, with European arrangements by the Alfried Holle Printing Company of Dusseldorf, West Germany. Kalender Schau 71 includes works by Picasso, Van Gogh, Durer and other famous artists, as well as outstanding color photography and advanced commercial design concepts.

Parts of the show are on display in offices of First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Rochester, the Lincoln-Rochester Trust Company, Marine Midland Bank--Rochester, and Security Trust Company (April 19 to May 7).
