A 14-member committee, representing all segments of the graphic arts industry, has been selected by College of Graphic Arts and Photography Dean Lothar Engelmann to serve in an advisory capacity to the School of Printing and the Graphic Arts Research Center. The major responsibility of the committee will be to analyze RIT's graphic arts programs in view of needs and developments in the industry.

HONORS BESTOWED, DIPLOMAS GRANTED AT MANAGEMENT CONVOCATION

The County of Monroe, which is celebrating its sesquicentennial, and Stecher-Traung-Schmidt, a Rochester printing firm now in its centennial year, were recipients of special service citations at the 45th annual Management Convocation, held last week at the Rochester Chamber of Commerce.

Diplomas were presented to 154 employees who have completed the Management program in RIT's College of Continuing Education. Presentations were made by RIT trustee Howard Carver, president of Gleason Works.

The speaker for the convocation was John L. Blake, deputy manpower administrator in the U.S. Department of Labor, and a newly elected RIT trustee.
