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### BOARD OF TRUSTEES OFFICERS RE-ELECTED: EGAN INSTALLED

The RIT trustees re-elected their slate of officers to another term during the recent board meeting. Remaining in their positions will be <a href="Chairman">Chairman</a> Arthur L. Stern, a Rochester attorney; <a href="First Vice Chairman">First Vice Chairman</a> F. Ritter Shumway, honorary chairman of the board of Sybron Corp.; <a href="Second Vice Chairman Lawrence">Second Vice Chairman Lawrence</a> C. Gleason, chairman of the board of The Gleason Works; <a href="Secretary Byron Johnson">Secretary Byron Johnson</a>, a Rochester attorney and vice president of E.W. <a href="Edwards & Son">Edwards & Son</a>; <a href="Treasurer Brackett H. Clark">Treasurer Brackett H. Clark</a>, president of Rapidac Machine Corp.

Attorney David D. Egan, a 1962 RIT graduate, was elected to the position of Alumni Designee to the board. Egan is also assistant coach of the RIT wrestling team. Mrs. Howard F. Carver president of the RIT Women's Council was re-elected to the board, for a term expiring in 1972. In other business, a record RIT operating budget of \$29.8 million was approved for the 1971-72 fiscal year.

#### NEW HOUSING COMPLEX TO BE READY IN SEPTEMBER

Funds in the amount of \$4.6 million for a planned complex of 278 housing units for students, faculty and staff have been made available to RIT through the College Housing Loan Program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

To be located on a 20 acre site to the southwest of the RIT academic area on Institute property near East River Rd., the complex will include one bedroom garden apartments, and two and three bedroom town houses, as well as extensive recreational facilities.

Bids for the construction have been opened and are currently being evaluated by a review board comprised of students, faculty, staff and trustees. The awarding of the bids will be announced during the first week of May.

# BIDS SUBMITTED FOR NEW NTID FACILITIES

Two Rochester contractors were among four firms who submitted bids on April 21 for construction of the multi-million dollar NTID facilities, which will be built on campus, to the north of the RIT dormitory complex. An academic support services building and residence and dining space will comprise the NTID complex.

Contractors submittion bids were John B. Pike and Son, Inc. of Rochester (\$24,510,000); a joint venture with Robert F. Hyland & Sons, E.G. Snyder Co., Inc. and Vanderline Electric Corp, all of Rochester (\$24,815,000); Pigott Construction International Ltd. (\$24,5000,000), of Toronto; and John W. Cowper, Inc. (\$24,700,000) of Buffalo, N.Y.

Groundbreaking for the complex will be held on June 4.

## RIT ECONOMICS PROFESSOR CO-AUTHORS PAPER ON UNEMPLOYMENT STATISTICS

Dr. George Demopoulos of the College of Business has co-authored--with Dr. Arthur Butler of SUNY Buffalo--an important paper on unemployment statistics. The paper, "Labor Force Behavior in a Full Employment Economy", has been published in the Industrial and Labor Relations Review at Cornell, and has been cited by the U.S. Labor Department.

The paper's principal contention is that measured unemployment in the U.S. is far from total employment, thus making it an unreliable guide to policy formation.

## THEATER GROUP TO VISIT NTID

The National Theater Institute will visit the National Technical Institute for the Deaf on Sunday (May 2)-Tuesday to conduct workshops with members of NTID's Drama Club. The NTI is sponsored by the Eugene O'Neill Memorial Theatre Center of Waterford, Conn. and was formed as an experiment to provide an accredited semester of intensive theater work for undergraduate students who intend to work in the theater after leaving college. While on tour, the student group will visit ten member colleges including NTID, the only non-hearing institution with membership in the organization.

Workshops will be open to the public and will be held in Booth Auditorium. Workshop times are May 3 from 7 to 10 p.m.; May 4 from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m. with a reception that night; and on May 5 from 9 a.m. to noon.
