## FOOTBALL PROPOSAL ACCEPTED: VARSITY STATUS ACHIEVED

Club football is now history at RIT. A proposal, written by the Institute Athletic Committee and amended by President Miller, has been accepted, and coach Tom Coughlin's Tigers will begin playing as a varsity team in the fall. An eight-game schedule is set, with seven club teams and Brockport State. The Brockport game, which will be played here on November 13, will be the Tigers' first official Eastern College Athletic Conference varsity game, and the date has been designated "Varsity Day" at RIT.

Athletic Director Louis Alexander pointed out that no increase was allotted to the Department of Physical Education budget to provide for the addition of football. Instead, several cuts were made in the existing program, including the elimination of fencing from the intercollegiate program, cutting back on equipment purchases and tournament travel, and combining teams for travel to away games. New revenues are expected from the towel and locker system, which will be put on a charge basis for all who wish to use it.

## SENATE COMMITTEE HEARS PRESIDENT MILLER'S VIEWS ON STUDENT AID

President Miller appeared recently before a Senate subcommittee on education in Washington, and presented his views on the Higher Education Bill dealing with financial subsidies for college students. A Gannett News Service dispatch said that Dr. Miller testified in favor of increased funds for federal grants and loans for higher education, instead of basing subsidies on income, as called for by the bill.

## SPEAKERS ANNOUNCED FOR COMMENCEMENT-GROUNDBREAKING

Two present officials and one past official from the United States Office of Education in the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare will be among the featured speakers here June 4-5, when ground will be broken for the new NTID complex and RIT will hold its 86th commencement exercises.



Speaking at commencement, which will be at the Rochester War Memorial on Saturday, June 5, will be Dr. Sidney P. Marland, Jr., U.S. commissioner of education. The associate commissioner in the Bureau of Education for the Handicapped, Dr. Edwin W. Martin, Jr., will speak at the NTID groundbreaking on Friday, June 4. Francis Keppel, former commissioner of education, now board chairman of the General Learning Corp., will speak at the groundbreaking luncheon.

In addition to the education officials, the list of speakers includes The Honorable Hugh L. Carey, U.S. Representative from New York's 15th district, and Arthur L. Stern, chairman of the RIT Board of Trustees. Both men will speak at groundbreaking, and Carey will address the Nathaniel Rochester Society dinner on June 4.
