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TODD TO ATTEND EDUCATIONAL MANAGEMENT INSTITUTE

Todd, RIT's vice president for Institutional Development and Planning, is one of 80 recipients of a grant from the Sloan Foundation to the Institute for Educational Management this summer at the Harvard Business School. The topics to be covered in lectures and seminars during the six-week course are Managing the Educational Institution, Managing Financial Resources, Managerial Control and Information Systems, and Interpersonal and Group Relationship Problems.

George Cumming, Superintendent of Campus Development. He is responsible for major campus construction programs, including the NTID complex and modular housing, as well as landscaping.
