

NTID Drama Club To Present 'Rashomon'

The final presentation of NTID's drama club will be "Rashomon," an unusual drama written by Fay and Michael Kaning. This production, the first full-length play ever produced by the drama club, will be presented April 18-19 at 8 p.m. in Ingle Auditorium.

"Rashomon," based on a story set in medieval Japan, concerns a husband and wife who are held up by a bandit, and the conflict that results because of the act. In the play the same story is told through the eyes of various characters, each giving a varying interpretation of the story. maintain his permanent residence in Falmouth, Mass., is the author of numerous articles for printing trade publications.

Independent Study Key To Success

Advanced independent study is one of the most successful ways to teach and to learn, believes Norman R. Goldblatt.

Dr. Goldblatt, an assistant professor in the College of Science at RIT, uses longterm independent study projects extensively in his teaching of physics.

He tries to work on a one-to-one basis with students on projects that last more than one year. He thrives on having students from several departments--electrical engineering, photo science, mechanical engineering, physics and others--involved together on a project.

A radio observatory which was built last summer by electrical engineering and physics students and Goldblatt was the culmination of two years of work. Located behind the annex on the RIT Henrietta campus, the observatory was built partially from surplus equipment donated by Cornell Aeronautical Laboratories in Buffalo.

In the observatory, budding scientists observe the emission of radio waves from the sun and certain sources outside the solar system. Data collected will be sent to the World Data Center in Boulder, Colo.

Dr. Goldblatt hopes to incorporate a whole solar geophysical lab into the observatory.

Another project of his students-construction of a laser velocimeter-illustrates the interdisciplinary approach. Physicists designed it, electrical engineers built it, and mechanical engineers will use it to measure fluid flow in pipes.

Other students are working on extensive studies of the applications of holography which, says Goldblatt, provide "incredible training in precision and experimental technique. It enables us to see very small motions of objects as they're happening. You can watch a mushroom growing before your eyes." The studies will be pertinent to mechanical and electrical engineering, photo science and physics students.

Goldblatt also travels with his students on field trips to view eclipses -in March 1970 to Jesup, Ga., and in July 1972 to Cape Tormentine, Nova Scotia.

The second trip resulted in two or three publishable papers, he says, although that's not what he's aiming for with most of the projects.

"All these experiments are not publishable because they're just realizations of ideas gleaned from journals, but they're up to date," he says.

'73 Photo Summer Sessions Announced

Twenty-two college credit courses covering a broad spectrum of areas in the photographic arts and sciences will be offered by RIT's 1973 Photography Summer Session Program starting June 25 and continuing through Aug. 31.

Most of the courses will be offered during two five-week sessions from June 25 to July 27, and July 30 to Aug. 31.

The program will include workshops, lectures and laboratory courses in the areas of motion picture and television, photo-journalism, photographic and machine printing and processing, and photographic science and instrumentation. In addition, photography courses and workshops that cover the areas of advertising, color architectural, industrial, publication, and nature photography will be given, along with two European study-travel workshops.

Specific courses and the dates they will be offered are: June 25 to July 27--Motion Picture Workshop I, History and Appreciation of Film, Introductory Photographic Workshop, Photographic Workshop for Teachers, Photo-Journalism I, and Nature Photography. For the second five-week session from July 30 to Aug. 31, courses to be offered are: Motion Picture Workshop II, the Synthesis of Television/Film, Introductory Photographic Workshop, Advanced Photographic Workshop, Photo-Journalism II, Advanced Nature Photography, Architectural Photography. and Color Photography Workshop.

Other courses and dates are: Industrial Photography Workshop, July 9-27; Photography for Publications, Aug. 6-17; Color Printing and Processing, June 25-July 7, and July 30-Aug. 10; Advertising Photography Workshop, June 25-July 7; and Advanced Techniques in Color Printing, Aug. 13-24.

A European Photographic Study-Travel Workshop will be offered during June and July, with a two-week session at RIT from June 25 to July 6, to be followed by three weeks in Europe from July 9-30.

In addition, a Photographic Workshop in Southern France will be given from June 25 to July 25.
