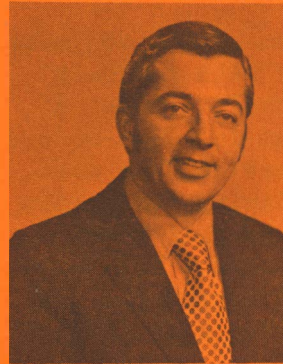

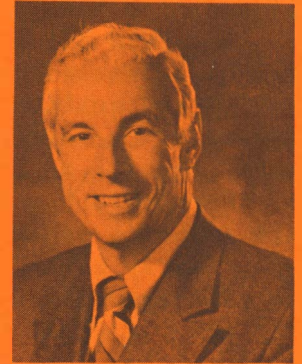

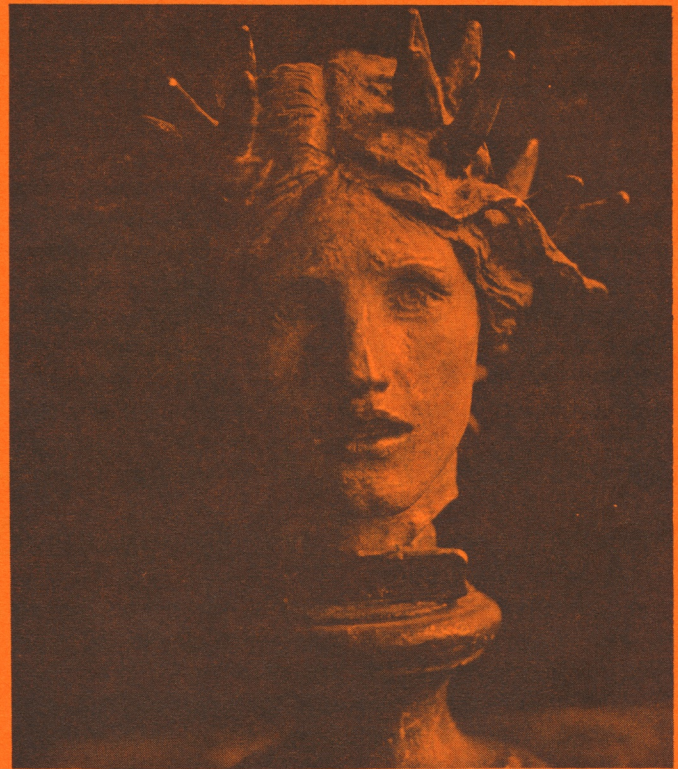
### Luncheons To Continue

"Road to Understanding - Rap & Produce (Round Three)," sponsored by the Urban Extension office of the Extended Services Division, was held on April 13 and 14 at the Metropolitan Center.

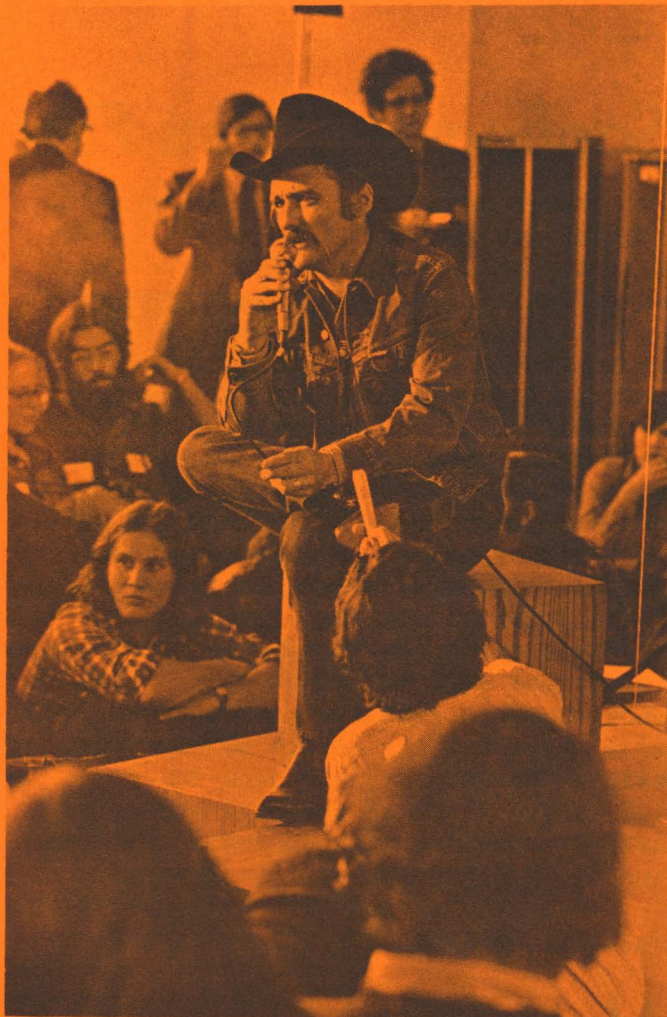
It was the third year that members of the Rochester community met under the auspices of RIT to discuss community problems and possible solutions. Discussion and workshop groups included: health and mental health, welfare rights, criminal justice, politics and the community, human relations, youth and the community, education, administration and management and communications and public relations. As a result of those groups, recommendations for improving education, government and the local social and civic participation by the "grassroots" people will be sent to the Board of Education, City Council, County Legislature, local social and law enforcement agencies and members of state government.

"As a result of these recommendations and statements of position, Rap & Produce will continue as an on-going program where we can implement change locally," said Mrs. Jessie James, coordinator of RIT's Urban Extension office. More than 200 people participated in the two-day program.

An awards presentation followed the discussion groups. Five citations were given to Rochester-area people who have made significant contributions through their volunteer activities. The awards were presented to: Miss Marny Liebschutz, who works in the Urban Extension office as a volunteer; Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Thompson, who organized and continue to work with the Sawyer Road Action Coalition, a group of 65 rural poor families in the Albion area; Joe L. Sanders, who voluntarily teaches young people skills and then helps them find employment; and Mrs. Helen Young, who conducts arts and crafts programs for inner-city youngsters in her home. A group award was presented to the founders of the Puerto Rican Youth Development and Resource Center, Inc. The founders, all under 21 at the time the center was conceived are: Roberto Burgos, Dexter Martinez, Jose Cruz and Heriberto Quinones.

Selected by a scholarship committee, a recipient of a Sarah Margaret Gillam Scholarship is required to have a scholastic record which merits scholarship assistance, demonstrable need for financial assistance, and personal qualities, including constructive contributions to student life and school citizenship.

Several thousands of dollars will be available for a number of scholarship

awards each year, according to George Alley, director of the department of food administration.

The sixth of 13 children in her family, Cathy attended Linton High School in Schenectady. She became interested in the field of foods and nutrition during her junior year there, when she was involved in volunteer work for the Cooperative Home Extension. That gave her experience in working with children on welfare, teaching them the basics of nutrition and foods.

### To Offer Seminars

Doc and Katy Abraham, nationally known gardening experts, will conduct a four-session program beginning on April 28 geared to those who are interested in improving their gardening skills and knowledge.

"Gardening with Doc and Katy," which will continue on consecutive Saturday mornings through May 19, is being sponsored by the Extended Services Division of Rochester Institute of Technology. The sessions will be from 9 to 11 a.m. at the RIT Metropolitan Center, 50 West Main St.

Doc and Katy, who live in Naples, N.Y., operated a florist and landscaping business in Naples for 20 years. They are beginning their 23rd year on WHAM radio, where they have a gardening show, and starting their fourth year on WOKR-TV with their "Green Thumb" show. They collaborate on a column about gardening which appears in 126 newspapers and six magazines throughout the country. Three gardening books which they authored have been published by Prentiss-Hall, and a Green Thumb Handbook for Teachers, now is being published by The Instructor Publications, Inc.

The course will cover such things as indoor and outdoor sowing of seeds, starting tubers, methods of plant propagation, transplanting, mini-gardening and making porch pots, window boxes and urns.
