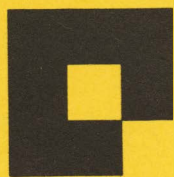

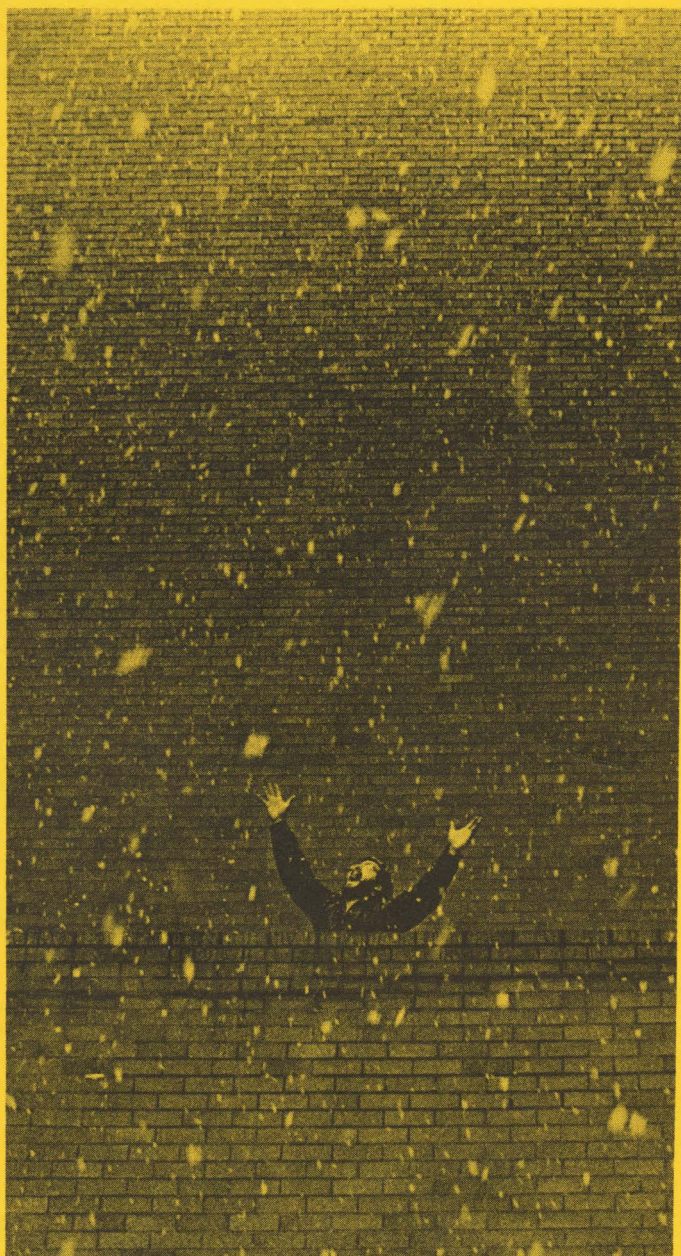

Kern Professorship Chair Filled

The first William A. Kern Professorship in communications at RIT has been filled through the appointment of Professor Harley Parker, research associate at the Centre for Culture and Technology at the University of Toronto. Parker's appointment is for a one-year term beginning Jan. 4.

The Professorship was established by Rochester Telephone Corporation to promote the study of communications at RIT and enhance the communicating arts and sciences, said RIT President Dr. Paul A. Miller, in making the announcement.

Named for the late William A. Kern, a former RIT trustee and president of Rochester Telephone from 1959 until his death in 1964, the Professorship is the first campus-wide chair in RIT's history.

Parker, 55, lectures widely in America, Canada and Europe as a representative for the Centre for Culture and Technology. The recipient of two Canada Council grants for study in Europe, and a grant from the British Council of the Arts, he has appeared before political, educational, religious and managerial groups.

A graduate of the Ontario College of Art, he also studied at Black Mountain College in North Carolina where he began his continuing concern with the theory of communication. He taught color and design at the Ontario College of Art for ten years and was head of design at the Royal Ontario Museum for ten years. During a sabbatical leave he was associate professor at Fordham University, sharing The Albert Schweitzer chair with Professor Marshall McLuhan, director of the University of Toronto Centre, and a prominent figure in communications theory.

Parker and McLuhan co-authored "Through the Vanishing Point: Space in Poetry and Painting" and "Counterblast."

"I consider myself to be a relatively advanced student of the software aspects of communication, with my basic expertise in the visual arts, but with a very broad general background," Parker said.

"At RIT there appears to be a receptiveness on the part of faculty and administration to encourage and promote the development of new and expanded opportunities in the communicating arts and sciences, in fine and applied arts, graphic arts and telecommunications."

Dr. Miller said that Parker will be a source of stimulation in the continuing development of communications studies at RIT. He will work with several deans and faculty groups. He also will teach seminars and coordinate a conference on communications.

Parker pointed out that the vast resources and facilities of the National Technical Institute for the Deaf could result in many innovative ways to aid persons with learning and communications problems.

Rochester Telephone President George S. Beinetti said, "The selection of Parker, and the overall objectives of the Kern Pro-

Hatchett Sculpture Show To Open January 13

An exhibit of sculpture by internationally known sculptor Duayne Hatchett will open in the Bevier Gallery at RIT Saturday, January 13, at 8 p.m.

Hatchett, currently head of the graduate sculpture program at the State University of New York at Buffalo, is considered one of the top sculptors in America today.

He works primarily in aluminum and stainless steel.

His exhibit at RIT will include drawings and photographs of work in progress, and models of larger works as well as completed sculpture.

"It's a show about the thought process involved in finishing a piece of sculpture," said James Herman of RIT's Bevier Gallery committee.

Hatchett has exhibited at most major galleries in the United States, including the Whitney Museum, the Carnegie Museum of Art, the Dallas Museum, and Hemisphair, in San Antonio, Texas.

The show, to continue through February 9, is open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

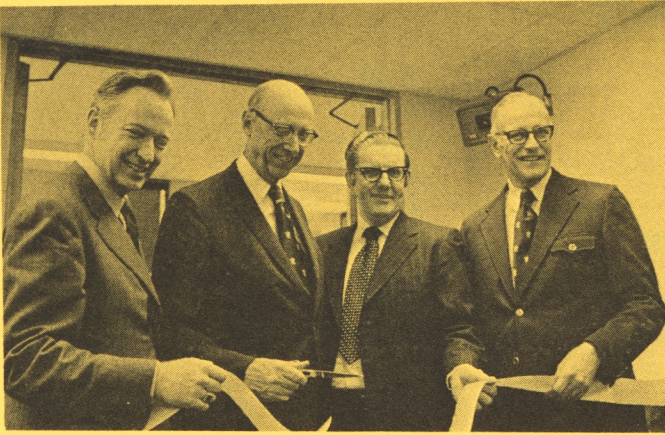

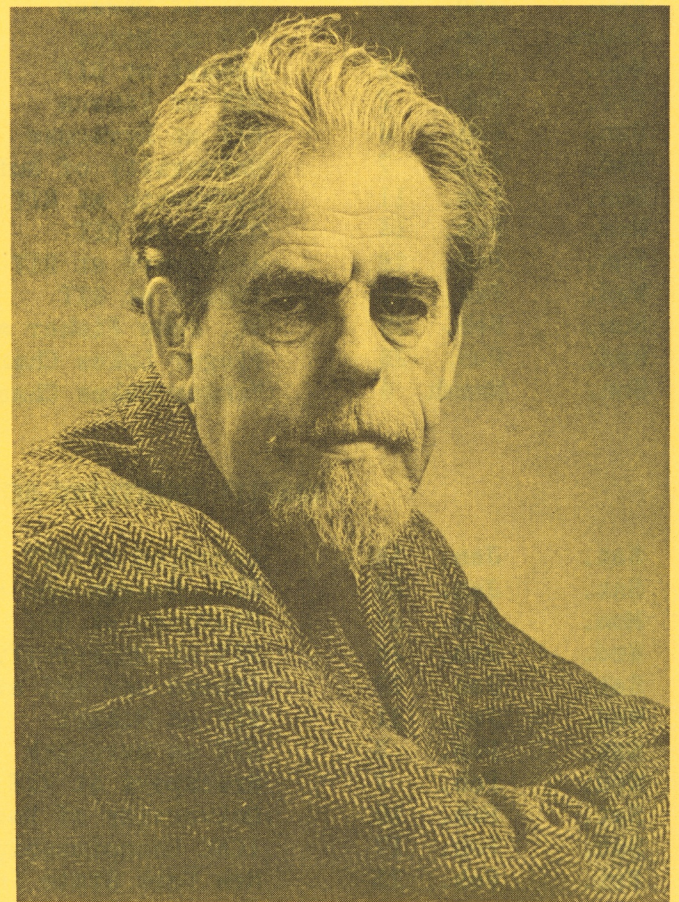

He has written articles for various periodicals including "Art International" (Zurich), "Harvard Art Review" and "Canadian Arts." He has written book reviews for newspapers under the general theme of communications, and contributed to a number of books on the topics of art, culture, society and communications.

"My on-going activity is to keep a close watch on all media as it effects social attitudes," Parker said. "Intelligent choice must be based on information and the perception to interpret that information."
