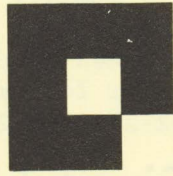

'Friends Of RIT' Art Show Planned

A special, 10-day exhibition of major works of art owned by friends of RIT will be shown in "The Friends of The Institute Collect," April 27 through May 6 in the Bevier Gallery in the James E. Booth Memorial building on the Henrietta campus.

The exhibit is coordinated by RIT's College of Fine and Applied Art and the Friends of RIT committee headed by Mrs. Bruce Bates, 87 Grosvenor Road, Brighton.

It will open Friday evening, April 27, with a private reception at 8 p.m. and continue through Sunday, May 6. The gallery is open daily 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and 6 p.m. to 9 p.m.

"It will be an eclectic collection of art and sculpture and some silver pieces of the highest quality," Mrs. Bates said. She said the works of art have been gathered from the homes and private collections of more than 30 affiliates of RIT throughout the Rochester area.

"We conceived the show as a means of bringing some of the finest pieces of art available locally to our campus, to give students and the public a chance to see them," said Dr. Robert H. Johnston, dean of RIT's College of Fine and Applied Art.

Johnston, who has personally selected most of the pieces to be shown, said "Rochester and Rochesterians have a fantastic commitment to the arts. This show is proof of that."

He said the show will include pieces by such artists as Renoir, Duffy, Utrillo, Calder, Arp, Waugh, Braque, Corot, Henri, Hartung, Luks, and others.

Mrs. Bates, wife of RIT trustee Bruce B. Bates and a member of the RIT women's council, is working with the following Friends of RIT committee to make arrangements for the show: Mr. Herbert W. Vanden-

Stone Lithography Demonstration Tues.

Bruce Porter, on the faculty of RIT's College of Fine and Applied Arts but currently working at the Tamarind Lithography workshop in Albuquerque, New Mexico, will be at the College of Fine and Applied Arts next week to demonstrate techniques of stone lithography.

Porter was awarded a fellowship for study at Tamarind in 1972.

On Tuesday, January 30, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, he will discuss his own and other artists' print work and answer questions about stone lithography in the printmaking lab, Room 4501, Booth Memorial building.

On Wednesday, January 31, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. he will etch and prepare a stone for printing and then print a limited edition of prints in the afternoon.

Construction Safety Seminars Planned

Construction safety management seminars will meet once weekly for five-week periods at RIT's Metropolitan Center, 50 West Main St. They are being co-sponsored by the Center for Employer-Employee Relations and the Building Industry Employers of New York, Inc., a state wide industry association having 2,400 member firms.

Weekly meetings will take place on Wednesdays or Thursdays from 7 to 9 p.m., starting Feb. 1 or Feb. 7. Tuition of \$40 includes a complete reference manual containing Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) standards and record-keeping requirements. Instructors will be members of the American Society of Safety Engineers. A certificate of completion will be presented to each participant at the conclusion of the program.

Dr. Thomas Parmele, assistant director of the Center for occupational safety and health programs and course coordinator, said the seminar is "a five-session program totalling 10 hours which details the provisions of Federal Construction Standards and New York State's Industrial Code Rule 23 which applies to construction.

"The series was developed by RIT and the Building Industry Employers of New York State to train construction supervisory personnel as to their safety responsibilities under state and federal law." He added that employers "must know new federal OSHA standards in order to avoid stiff civil and criminal penalties."

First Harmon Photo Scholarship Awarded

W. P. Smith, Jr., president of School Pictures, Inc., of Jackson, Miss., recently awarded an annual scholarship of \$2,500 from his company for the Photographic Processing and Finishing Management program at RIT.

The scholarship in Processing and Finishing Management is named in honor of T. Carter Harmon, a long-time executive director of the American Association of School Photographers Inc.

The first recipient of this scholarship is Fred Sytsma, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Sytsma of 137 Payne Avenue, Midland Park, N.J. He is a second year student in RIT's Photographic Processing and Finishing Management Program and graduated in 1970 from Midland Park High School.

James E. McMillion, Jr., director of the RIT program, and holder of the James E. McGhee Professorship in Photographic Management, said that the objective of the scholarship is "to encourage RIT students to enter the field of processing and finishing management by supplying financial assistance to those who show a promising aptitude for the field and who demonstrate a need for financial assistance."
