Dr. Baker Named To **Head Counseling Center**

Dr. Donald Baker has been appointed director of the RIT Counseling Center.

Dr. Baker has been with the RIT Counseling Center since July, 1969, and served as acting director during the past academic year.

"The appointment of Dr. Baker will allow us to continue to develop our concept of the RIT Counseling Center as a human relations resource center for faculty, staff and students. Don Baker's expertise in student life research and his work in sex and drug education programs will bring a new and energetic thrust to outreach programming from the Counseling Center," Dr. Tom Plough, associate vice president for Student Affairs, said.

Dr. Baker holds a Bachelor's degree from Trinity College, and Master's and Doctorate degrees from the University of Rochester.

Rochester Institute of Technology has received a grant of \$99,850 from the Regents of the New York State Education Department to coordinate "A Feasibility Study Toward Developing a Coordinated System of Post-Secondary Continuing Education in the Genesee Valley Region."

The study will be conducted in cooperation with Rochester Area Colleges, Inc. a consortium representing fifteen post-secondary institutions in the Genesee Valley.

In announcing the grant from the Regents, Dr. Robert Pease, dean of College of Continuing Education, said that the monies will be used: to determine the total post-secondary continuing education needs of adults in the Genesee Valley Region; to integrate the splintered and overlapping activities and resources of the various higher educational institutions, industries, businesses, social organizations, and schools and institutions within that region; and to develop a feasibility study as part of the State of New York's overall plan for developing a regional approach to post-secondary continuing education. The grant will allow specific study in the area of the nature and extent of educational problems facing adults, who is specifically affected, in what areas these people represent, what programs are being presently offered and by whom and where, how these present programs are funded, what new programs are needed and who will plan and implement them, how new programs might be financed and how duplication of effort can be avoided.

Although RIT is the funded institution for the study, the total project will

Charles Haines

To Head Math Department



Charles W. Haines has been appointed head of the mathematics department in the College of Science at RIT.

Dr. Haines, 34, an associate professor of mathematics, has had a joint appointment in mathematics and mechanical engineering at RIT for two and one-half years. He came here from the faculty of Clarkson College of Technology in Potsdam.

Dr. Thomas P. Wallace, dean of the College of Science, said, "Dr. Haines offers this college the all too rare combination of excellence in teaching, research and instructional media design, as well as an intense desire to improve the academic quality of the Institute. His experience in engineering, applied mathematics, computer science and statistics will enable him to give positive leadership to the mathematics department."

Dr. Haines has an M.S. and a Ph.D. in applied mathematics from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, and an A.B. from Earlham College in Richmond, Ind.

He is a member of Sigma Xi national research honorary, Pi Mu Epsilon mathematics honorary, and several mathematical societies.

It could be easier to figure out your federal income tax forms if RIT Professor R. Roger Remington has his way.

Remington, chairman of the Department of Communication Design in the College of Fine and Applied Arts, has been asked to serve on one of three panels evaluating the quality of the governments's graphic systems.

That means, Remington says, the U.S. government is about to make a "major commitment to excellence in design."

The panels, established by the National Endowment for the Arts in response to a request from President Nixon, are to judge a variety of publications including posters, letterheads, envelopes, books, photos, maps, charts, certificates, programs, directories, and the variety of forms printed by various federal agencies.

Establishment of the program, Remington said, marks the first time in the nation's history the U.S. government has recognized the importance of good design to human communication.

"The government is the largest purchaser of printing in the country—and perhaps in the world," he said. "This official recognition of design and the graphic designer is the largest in scale we've ever had."

"In my work on the panels, I'll be trying to impact from my own experience both as a designer and as an educator to suggest methods of employing good graphics to improve communications on a day-to-day basis."

What's the advantage to the American

taxpayer?

"Through excellence in design comes improved communication," Remington said.
"In a very basic sense, that might mean it could be easier to figure out your federal income tax forms or easier to find your way around a government building."

Remington has been at RIT's College of Fine and Applied Arts since 1963.

The Department of Communication Design, which he now heads, is a unique program encompassing a variety of fields including advertising, design, illustration, graphic design and communications. The program seeks to train the communication designer

as an inventive and creative member of problem solving teams in the contemporary world of business, industry, agriculture, government, education and religion.

Advisory Committee To Help Choose GARC Projects

In order for research at RIT's Graphic Arts Research Center (GARC) to better reflect the needs of industry, the Graphic Arts Industry Advisory Committee has agreed to help in the selection and review of some research projects proposed for GARC, it has been announced.

Private or confidential programs will not be subject to this review.

The plan, in which members of the committee will examine and analyze certain research programs, was agreed on at the advisory committee's June 19 meeting at Rochester. The purpose is to assure in advance industry interest and marketability of specific research projects.

The meeting was devoted in large part to a report of the GARC subcommittee which dealt with the accomplishments, capabilities and financial structure of the research center. The committee discussed a number of methods proposed to more completely expose to the industry GARC's unique talents and abilities. New means of marketing GARC's printing developments, products and services were examined.

The RIT advisory committee has consisted of internationally prominent representatives of the graphic arts industries since its establishment in 1970. Meetings are held twice annually in Rochester, but several subcommittees meet at frequent irregular intervals.
