\$262,000 In Kellogg Foundation Aid To Establish 'Urbanarium' At RIT

A \$262,000 W. K. Kellogg Foundation grant to Rochester Institute of Technology to establish and operate an Urbanarium has been announced by RIT President Dr. Paul A. Miller.

The Urbanarium will develop community education programs to help the people of the Greater Rochester area explore future options open to the metropolitan area.

Support from the Kellogg Foundation, of Battle Creek, Mich., will run through 1976, with the initial six months concentrating on developing operational procedures.

According to Gene DePrez, director of Communications, who led development of the Urbanarium proposal, the project is "to explore and develop programs to facilitate the use of postsecondary education resources toward metropolitan regional development."

This is one of several follow-up activities to the recently completed Brookings Urban Policy Conference which RIT co-sponsored, DePrez said.

DePrez said other goals will be to create new organizational approaches for conducting cooperative efforts between urban communities and postsecondary institutions in Greater Rochester, to provide life-long learning for people in or outside educational structures, and to respond to the interests of full-time students by stimulating learning through participation in field work projects, cooperative work/study programs and community and agency internships.

RIT will seek involvement of other area colleges in the project.

"For students, the Urbanarium will provide an opportunity to evaluate the implications of many professional fields while still in college," said Dr. Todd H. Bullard, RIT Provost.

The project is seen as a national prototype which, after adequate evaluation, could be a model for use in other communties across the country. RIT will disseminate special reports, results, findings and methods developed through the grant.

Dr. Robert Pease Named 1973 Boss Of The Year

"I can sincerely say that I have never worked for so competent a man, and one who has such a great and genuine interest and awareness of others," Ms. Leona H. Roth said as she nominated her boss, Dr. Robert D. Pease, for RIT's 1973 Boss of the Year.

"His door is always open to co-workers, students, friends, and anyone who wishes to converse with him or ask his advice, whether it be job-related or personal problems," she said.

Dr. Pease, dean of the College of Continuing Education, accepted the Boss of the Year award at the Professional Businesswomen's Association Recognition Hour last week.

"I'm very flattered...and a little surprised," Dr. Pease said of the award. And of Ms. Roth, who has been his secretary about a year, he said "She's unusual... she has the qualities to completely understand the type of work I do and she's accepted a lot of responsibility on her own."

The Urbanarium program, when it becomes fully operational in 1974, is expected to provide continuing education opportunities for people normally not enrolled in formal educational programs. It will attempt to reach people through a variety of learning formats, including exhibits, television programming, workshops, simulation exercises and publications.

According to Dr. Bullard, the details of the program and working relationships with other institutions and organizations are to be worked out during the planning period under the staff direction of R. Roger Remington, chairman of the Institute's Communications Design department.

Student Information Directory To Be Published

Student Association, the Division of Student Affairs, and the Communications Services Department have combined resources to produce a campus-wide student information directory for use next year, Dr. Fred Smith, vice president for Student Affairs, said this week.

Smith and SA Information Director Skip Evans said the directory will be in loose-leaf format in a plastic binder and will include much of the campus information that has been circulated separately in the past.

They said it will include the student telephone handbook, faculty-staff telephone directory, student organization listings, resident halls and food service handbooks, plus all official Institute policies and procedures.

Evans said the loose-leaf binder will be given to all incoming students and that a student will be expected to keep the binder for all the years he is at RIT.

"The loose-leaf format will enable us to put out yearly updates as information changes," Dr. Smith said. "And it will allow all departments at the Institute to make information available for inclusion throughout the year as it becomes available."

"We hope to centralize all the information an RIT student needs for his years at RIT," Evans said, "And avoid having the student--particularly the new student--bombarded with too many separate publications."

Prof To Study Newspaper Management

As the result of a \$20,000 grant received from the Gannett Foundation, W. Frederick Craig, an associate professor in the School of Printing is spending 42 weeks away from the classroom, updating his knowledge and skills of newspapers production management.

The cooperative education type of experience for Professor Craig will take him to some 12 newspaper production facilities throughout the country.

Craig, who teaches courses in journalism, newspaper design, and printing management, is receiving "hands-on" production and management experience in the areas of electronic editing, compostion room systems, new advances in platemaking, development in computerized press control and exposure to conventional problems relating to the change from letter press to offset. In addition, he is receiving exposure to automated mailroom techniques and distribution of the finished newspapers, as well as becoming

Quality Control Seminar Set In June, August

Quality Control for Photographic Processing, an intensive five-day program designed to provide specialized knowledge in statistical, chemical, and sensitometric methods of control of black-and-white and color photographic processes, will be held at RIT from June 4 through 8, and repeated from July 30 to August 3.

The program is designed for photographic dealers and finishers, professional photographers and individuals involved in the processing of photographic materials, in addition to engineers, scientists, and other professional persons who are engaged in areas where photography is being used as a research tool.

Sponsored by RIT's Graphic Arts Research Center in cooperation with the McGhee Professorship in Photographic Processing and Finishing Management, the program costs \$275, which includes text, materials and tuition.
