

New Facilities To Be Featured In Display

A display depicting all aspects of the new buildings which will be the home of NTID will be presented to the Institute community June 21 and 22 in the College-Alumni Union.

In addition to a model of the new complex, there will be artist renderings, detailed sketches and three-dimensional views of the interiors, architectural plans for landscaping and other literature.

The \$24 million complex, expected to be completed and partially occupied by the Spring of 1974, consists of a three-wing dormitory complex, a dining hall and academic building.

The architects, Hugh Stubbins and Associates of Cambridge, Mass., were challenged to design buildings that would fit in with the existing architecture on the RIT campus while at the same time provide many special architectural considerations expected to have major effects on the learning process of NTID students.

The entire learning environment will be built as an aid to education.

In the residence hall rooms, a modular building block concept will be employed so that all furnishings can be arranged in

Paliouras Named New Science Dean



Dr. John D. Paliouras has been chosen associate dean of the College of Science at RIT, effective July 1.

Dr. Paliouras, 44, an associate professor, has taught mathematics to all levels of students for eight years at RIT. He will continue to teach along with his new responsibilities as associate dean.

"Dr. Paliouras is held in the highest esteem by faculty and students and I am confident that in his new role he will contribute greatly to the further development of the College and the Institute," said Dr. Thomas P. Wallace, dean of the College of Science.

cont'd from p.1 whatever way the student wants to fit his individual needs and interests. In the dining area, round tables will be used rather than traditional rectangular and square tables to permit more communication among students.

Computer assisted instruction and closed-circuit television terminals will be installed in residence halls. An emergency warning and signaling system using strobe lights will be installed. The device can be used to awaken the deaf students in case of emergency.

Classrooms, shops and laboratories have controlled lighting and vibrationcontrol devices to decrease distracting noises and increase visual efficiency of deaf students.

A variety of technical equipment will be needed in laboratories, shops and studies to make the new complex a complete learning experience for deaf students.

The new buildings combine both unique and the common educational features designed to enhance the prospects of deaf and hearing to learn and grow together.
