H. J. Raphael Is New Packaging Director

Dr. Harold J. Raphael has been named Director of RIT's new program in Packaging Science, according to Dr. Roy I. Satre, dean of the School of Applied Science and chief administrator for the Department of Packaging Science.

Dr. Raphael brings to the directorship a career in the field of packaging, both academic and industrial, spanning more than 25 years. His most recent position has been manager of package research and evaluation for Avon Products, Inc., at Suffern, N.Y.

Set By Social Work

The Social Work Department at RIT, in cooperation with area social agencies, will sponsor a series of seminars designed to acquaint social workers and other staff with a variety of legal procedures which may affect clients.

The seminars, to begin March 13, are sponsored by the Social Work Department at RIT, in cooperation with the Monroe County Coalition for Welfare Rights, the National Association of Social Workers, and the Monroe County Legal Assistance Corporation.

Seminars will be held Tuesday mornings at 10.am. in the auditorium of the Marine Midland Bank, One Marine Midland Plaza, from March 13 through May 22. Each session will be run by a professional trained in the field.

Topics to be covered include: Family Court; Family Law; Rights to Health Care; Mental Health; Criminal Matters; Welfare and Administrative Law; Education and Student Rights; Consumer Problems; Landlord-Tenant Relationships; Drug Addiction and Rehabilitation; and Social Security--Unemployment Disability.

Edwin D. (Ted) Spong, widely known in the Rochester industrial community for placing thousands of men and women in jobs, has joined the College of Continuing Education at Rochester Institute of Technology as manpower specialist.

Spong, who retired on January 1 as manager of Rochester Industries Placement Service, will serve as liaison between RIT and local industries to determine the training needs of those industries and how RIT's facilities and programs can best be used in the industrial training effort.

He was employed by two machinery companies in Rochester in the 1920's, and worked for state, local and federal personnel organizations before becoming head of RIP in 1946. In his job with RIP, Spong aided workers who lost their jobs with one company being placed with another. RIP

National Merit Scholars

RIT will be host to approximately 150 of the nation's top high school students this weekend (Feb. 23-24).

Criminal Justice Staff

Sets Criminology Session

A series of workshops designed to help police, probation, and other criminal justice agencies deal effectively with riots, personal confrontations, and other conflict situations will be held by the Department of Criminal Justice March 9 and 10 on the Henrietta campus.

Dr. Alexander Bassin, associate professor of criminology at Florida State University and director of several projects in police training in community relations and emotional control, will run the sessions.

"We hope to work largely on emotional control and sensitivity techniques available for use in crisis situations," said Father Edward MacKinnon of the Criminal Justice Department.

Father MacKinnon said Dr. Bassin will explain and demonstrate techniques of Reality Therapy as they apply to the juvenile and adult offender and his rehabilitation.
