We're Five: No Longer A New Campus

We're five!

Five years ago, in 1968, after being in the City of Rochester for more than 100 years, RIT moved to its new 1,300 acre suburban campus.

It's taken everyone a long time to get settled.

"But now we're here and settled in and we really have to stop calling this place our 'new' campus," says RIT Director of Community Relations Mrs. Loma Allen.

So in honor of RIT's fifth year on this campus, the Institute has planned a small fifth year celebration.

"The Fifth Anniversary events have a variety of purposes," Mrs. Allen said. "We want to take note of the fact that we've been here five years; we want people to realize that we're not any longer a 'new' campus, but a campus with its own set of traditions; and we want people from the Greater Rochester Area to visit our facilities and feel welcome here."

The Fifth Anniversary celebration consists of a series of campus events beginning with the appearance of Mayor Howard Lee, Chapel Hill, North Carolina, March 28 and culminating with commencement ceremonies, which this year will be held on campus, June 9, 1973.

"Rather than scheduling a few special events for the Fifth Anniversary," Mrs. Allen said, "we're trying to draw together all those occuring on campus during this specific time period which involve or will attract individuals or groups to the campus and bring them to the attention of both the Institute and the community.

Mrs. Allen said any college and department planning an event during the Fifth An-

Industrial Art Show Opens March 17

An exhibit of "The Things We Take for Granted: Industry's Unexpected Artistry" will open Saturday evening, March 17, at 8 p.m. in RIT's Bevier Gallery in the College of Fine and Applied Arts.

The opening reception will include a performance by Dance Theatre of Rochester.

"This is to be a most unusual exhibit, in every sense," said Sylvia Davis, Fine and Applied Arts professor, who is helping coordinate the show.

"We first conceived the show as a means to exhibit some of the really exciting objects from industry that have intrinsic aesthetic value and visual excitement," she said.

Ms. Davis said she has gathered objects from a variety of local industries for the exhibit. "We were specifically interested in forms that were not designed as art, or industrial design, but were made to serve a function and are rarely seen isolated
