## Eastman Kodak Grants RIT \$79,500 Under Educational Aid Program

RIT has received grants totaling \$79,500 under Eastman Kodak Company's 1973 Educational Aid Program, Dr. Paul A. Miller, president, announced last week.

"When one considers that several hundred different colleges and universities participate in this program in an amount of \$3.5 million," Dr. Miller stated, "one has to say that our participation as one institution is worthy of note."

RIT is one of four institutions receiving direct grants as a four-year college and as a school offering an A.A.S. degree. Kodak contributes \$750 per person for each academic year (undergraduate or graduate) completed by employees who attended RIT.

The Kodak employee must have started work within five years of attending RIT, and must currently be in his or her fifth year of employment.

RIT's grant provides unrestricted use of the funds and is based upon 35 Kodak employees who have attended RIT for a total of 106 academic years.

Thirty-five schools, including RIT, received unrestricted special grants from Kodak this year. Special grants are given, on a non-recurring basis, to major colleges and universities for capital improvements and endowment campaigns.

They also are given to liberal arts schools offering curricula of particular interest to the company, and located where Kodak has its principal manufacturing and administrative facilities.

Want better and more frequent bus service between the Henrietta campus and downtown Rochester?

The proposed bus service would operate during the day every two hours between Midtown Plaza and the Henrietta campus with stops at the Metropolitan Center and the University of Rochester.

Evening service would operate every two hours with stops at the Henrietta campus, Southtown Plaza, the University of Rochester, the Metropolitan Center and Midtown Plaza.

Cost of the service would remain at 50 cents one-way with transfers for 10 cents.

Questionnaires are to be distributed to all faculty, staff and students through their department offices, and are available at the College Union information desk and in the Residence Halls office.

"We need the cooperation of everyone at RIT to structure a transportation system that will benefit the needs of the entire RIT community," Dr. Bullard said.

# Continuing Education To Offer First Electrostatic Imaging Course

A new course on electrostatic imaging --the first of its kind in the nation-- will be offered by the College of Continuing Education as a two-quarter elective for upper level undergraduates and qualified scientists or engineers in related fields.

The course will be taught by Drs. Alan Liebman and Raymond Stover, Research & Engineering Division, Xerox Corp., Webster.

Electrostatic Imaging Methods will cover: photoelectric formation of electrostatic images; charge transport phenomena; photoconductive insulating materials; theory of xerographic image development; and applications. It will be offered by the College of Continuing Education Arts and Graphic Arts Division.

According to Andrew Davidhazy, acting director of the program, the objectives of the course are to give students a comprehensive program devoted to the scientific background and practical applications of electrophotography, emphasize the relationship of silver halide materials to electrostatic imaging materials, and provide practical experience in xerographic

image formation and reproduction.

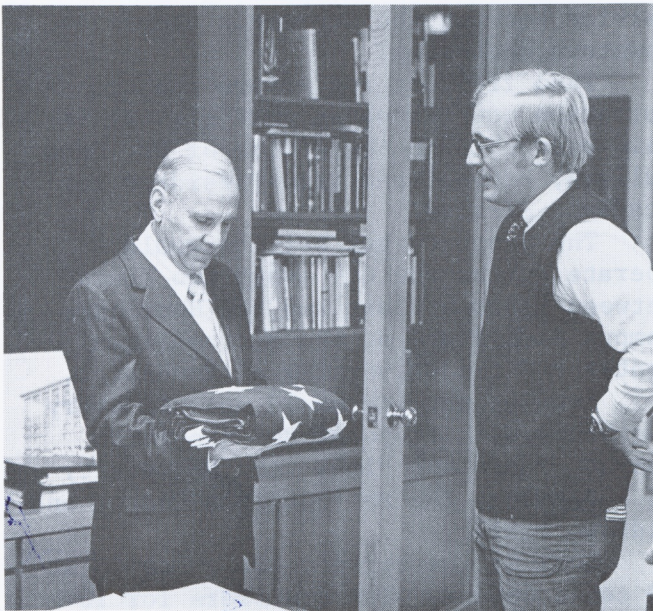

He served in the Air Force during World War II and went to work for Graflex in 1945 as a draftsman.

He was vice president of the Alumni Association before assuming the presidency, and was chairman of the 1972 Homecoming committee and active in the RIT Alumni Club of Greater Rochester.

His wife, Phyllis, is a 1941 Food Administration graduate of RIT.

## Professor To Speak On Deaf Language Education

Dr. Patricia Scherer of Northwestern University will speak on "The Effect of Language on the Leadership Ability of the Deaf" on Thursday, November 15, at 4 p.m. in room 1030 of the College of Science.

Dr. Scherer, who is Coordinator of Teacher Preparation, Department of Communicative Disorders, School of Speech at Northwestern, has done research studies with the deaf in the area of language.

Her publications include "Speech and Deaf Children - Knowledge and Usage" which appeared in Teacher Education, Sept. 1971, "An Open Letter to Educators of the Deaf," American Annals of the Deaf, June 1971, and "The Acquisition of Basic Signs by Spanish Speaking Families" in Chicago which appeared in the Review of the Chicago Board of Education and also in the American Annals of the Deaf.

## Professors Co-Author Calculus Text

Two RIT professors have authored a textbook on "Introductory Calculus for Business and Economics."

William E. Beatty, an associate professor in the College of Business, and R. William Gage, an assistant professor and head of the mathematics laboratory in the Reading and Study Clinic, wrote the text for use in freshman and sophomore Business Administration curricula in two- and four-year colleges.

Published by General Learning Press of Morristown, New Jersey, in July, the book is in use in the RIT College of Business.

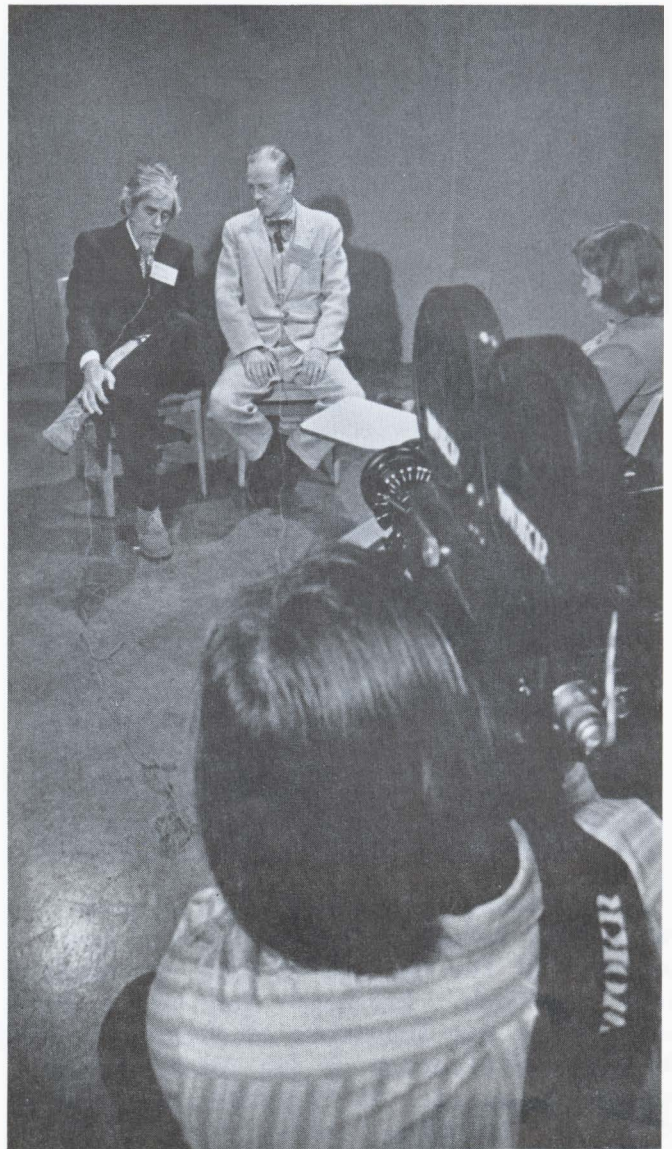
This is Beatty's second publication. He is also the author of "Mathematical Relationships in Business and Economics," published by General Learning Press in 1970.

Rochester Institute of Technology has become one of fifteen colleges in the United States with a professional, inter-collegiate Frisbee team.

And Frisbee sports fans will have the chance to see the team in action in one of its first games Sunday, November 4, when the 25-man team takes on Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute at 2 p.m. on the RIT football field. In case of rain, the game will be held in the gymnasium.

How is the game of Ultimate Frisbee played? Sophomore Printing student Larry Schindel, founder of the RIT team, explained:

"The Frisbee, a Wham-O Tournament model, can be moved across the field only by a series of passes; the players cannot run with the Frisbee. Play is continuous until a goal is scored by completing a pass to a teammate across the goal which is being attacked. Defense gains possession of the Frisbee whenever the pass is incomplete."

The RIT team—which was recently granted club status by the Student Association—will be practicing for the RPI match Saturday afternoon at 2 p.m. on the soccer field.
