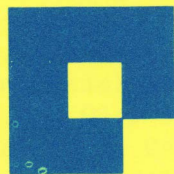

Educator To Receive Fifth Goudy Award

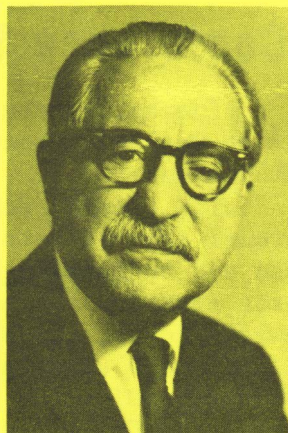
Dr. Robert L. Leslie, known for his educational efforts throughout the graphic arts industry, will receive the fifth annual Frederic W. Goudy Award from RIT Friday, October 19.

After the presentation, Dr. Leslie will deliver the 1973 Frederic W. Goudy Distinguished Lecture in Typography in Booth Auditorium in the College of Graphic Arts and Photography.

Dr. Leslie, a native of New York City, is internationally famous in the graphic arts field. For many years Dr. Leslie was president of the well-known typesetting firm, The Composing Room, and most recently he has organized and offered 15 series of lectures on the Heritage of the Graphic Arts. This series has brought almost 200 world-renowned figures to New York to talk about their specialties. He is also the founder of Gallery 303, a showcase for the work of young designers.

He has taught at Pratt Institute of Art and Cooper Union, acted as consultant and advisor in graphic communication to New York University and served as chairman of the advisory commission for the Department of Art and Advertising Design of New York City Community College.

during his long career. They include: The Medal of the American Institute of Graphic Arts; the Type Directors' Club medal; the Brotherhood Award of the Graphic Arts and Fine Paper Division of National conference of Christians and Jews; and the Printing Teachers Guild Man of the Year citation.

The Goudy Award, established at RIT in 1969 by a grant from the Mary Flagler Cary Charitable Trust, is presented annually to an outstanding individual in the graphic

arts field. The award is a silver bowl handcrafted by noted silversmith Hans Christiansen, a faculty member of RIT's School for American Craftsmen.

Crafts Workshop Planned At RIT By Arts Council

Registration is now open for the third annual craft workshop for art teachers sponsored by the Lake Country Craftsmen and the Arts Council of Rochester. The workshop will be held from 9:30 to 3:30 October 20 at RIT and will cost \$7.00.

Participants will concentrate on one of four crafts: batik, ceramics, enameling and related jewelry techniques, or fibers. Each workshop is limited to 25.

Batiking will be led by Sugar Allen, a frequent exhibiter at Rochester galleries and member of the New York State Craftsmen. Bill Stewart, an award winner at last year's Finger Lakes Exhibit, will be demonstrating a variety of ceramic handbuilding methods.

A teacher at the Memorial Art Gallery, Iris Schwartzbaum, will be leading the enameling class in exploring new techniques. The fibers class will be led by Carolyn Thomas, a graduate of RIT's School for American Craftsmen. Off-the-loom techniques such as macrame, crocheting, and knotless netting will be explored.

It is geared for all businesses and industries and specifically for employers, supervisors and personnel administrators. The sessions will combine presentations by the instructors, group discussions and non-graded tests.

RIT Fall Sports In Full Swing

The RIT fall sports scene got into full swing last week with some of the best performances in recent seasons.

Football

In their third varsity campaign, Coach Tom Coughlin's Tigers are off to their finest start since joining the Independent College Athletic Conference.

The Tigers opened their season Sept. 15 with a 25-7 routing of Canisius College, a club football power in past seasons.

Led by the superb running of junior John Humphrey, the Tigers rushed and passed for 365 yards while holding Canisius to 233. Humphrey rushed for 157 yards and earned Athlete of the Week honors.

But the best was yet to come. Coughlin's Tigers took to the field last Saturday, an apparent underdog to Hobart. After spotting the Statesmen 14 first period points, the Tigers staged an outstanding defensive display while the offense battled back for a 14-14

Witmeyer Named New Tennis Coach

Robert G. Witmeyer has been named RIT tennis coach, Louis A. Alexander, Jr., director of Athletics, said this week.

Witmeyer, an admissions counselor at RIT, takes over the position vacated by player-coach Rich Dillon, a June graduate.

In making the announcement, Alexander stated: "Bob is a former RIT tennis player --and a good one. His knowledge of the game and RIT administrative background will add immeasurably to the athletic program and its further growth."

A 1971 graduate of the College of Business, Witmeyer remained at RIT when offered a position in the admissions division. A part-time graduate student, he is working toward his master's degree.

Looking ahead to the fall tennis season, Witmeyer expressed optimism. "We have a young, experienced team with much depth," he said. The experience he talks about comes from veterans George Pierson, Jim Smith, Rich Viall, Les Frances, Ron Schmitt and Bob Bullwinkle.

With seven matches on the fall calendar, Witmeyer sees the strongest competition coming from Oswego and Brockport.

Witmeyer is a member of the New York State Personnel and Guidance Association, a national officer in Phi Sigma Kappa and secretary of the Ontario Alumni Club.

In the Clarkson contest, the Tigers spotted their opponent a 1-0 first half lead. The equalizer came from freshman Craig Suyematsu.

Nelson's squad is already well ahead of last year's 1-10-4 pace. He attributes the excellent play to an outstanding group of newcomers and strong team leadership.

In action this week, the Tigers were headed for Alfred, Tuesday, before returning home against Houghton, Thursday, and Niagara, Saturday. Next week they host Eisenhower, Tuesday, and St. Lawrence, Friday.
