## Dr. Miller Appoints Energy Conservation Officer; Hopes To Cut Electricity, 400,000 Gallons Of Fuel Oil

RIT President Paul A. Miller this week asked the Institute community to reduce energy consumption on campus 10 per cent and eliminate or curtail unnecessary equipment usage during the current energy shortage.

He also agreed to appoint David Jordan, an engineer in the Physical Plant department, as Energy Conservation officer for the Institute.

The measures he proposed would, he said, save 400,000 gallons of fuel oil at RIT during the coming winter.

Dr. Miller's statement was:

"Mr. Thomas Hussey, Director of Physical Plant, has appointed Mr. David Jordan to the position of Energy Conservation Engineer. This is the most recent step in a series that Physical Plant has taken in coping with the current energy crisis.

"The Office of Energy Conservation is charged with the task of soliciting and acting upon suggestions to conserve energy. The deans and department heads will be asked to survey their areas for possible elimination of equipment, or curtailment of use. An examination will be made of the occupancy of all non-housing buildings so that lighting, ventilation and exhaust systems can be shut off and temperatures be lowered when the buildings are not in use. In addition, a review of the actual scheduling of activities in hopes of consolidating building use, leading to larger blocks of time that the buildings could be closed will be made. The various offices will be asked to set back thermostats in work areas to 68°; to still lower temperatures in unoccupied areas; to remove lighting lamps or fixtures to an adequate but minimum illumination level in appro-

appropriate locations; to perform all scheduled custodial and building maintenance during the normal operating hours. The use of energy consuming devices, such as auxiliary space heaters, should be done only after consultation with the Physical Plant Department.

"We solicit your suggestions and recommendations on how to further sensibly reduce the energy use on campus. The purpose is to use energy as needed, to eliminate waste. We will also ask that the

## Annual RIT Invitational Features Basketball, Wrestling

Basketball and wrestling action come to the George H. Clark Memorial Gymnasium Friday and Saturday, Nov. 30 and Dec. 1 as the Tigers play host for the annual RIT Invitational.

Competition in the eighth annual wrestling classic gets underway at 12:30 Friday with contingents from Akron University, Brockport, University of Delaware, Notre Dame, St. John Fisher, Syracuse and University of Rochester vying for top honors.

The semi-final round starts at 12:30 Saturday with consolation and finals slated for 3 p.m. Delaware is new to this year's tourney, replacing Colgate.

In the 16th annual Basketball Invitational RPI will face newcomer Keene State in the opening contest at 7 p.m., Friday. The Tigers meet another newcomer, Plattsburgh in the 9 p.m. contest. Saturday's consolation game is slated at 7 p.m. with the championship contest at 9.

# Dr. Burns Named Head Of Grad Business Programs

Dr. John H. Burns of 119 Cobb Terrace, Brighton, has been appointed director of Graduate Programs in Business at the Rochester Institute of Technology College of Business, according to Dean Edward A. Johnson.

Dr. Burns, an associate professor, is responsible for programs offering master's degrees in business administration, accounting, and business administration with an accounting option.

The assignment includes responsibility for the students, instruction, staffing and overall quality of the graduate business programs.

There are 450 students in master's degree programs in the College of Business, the great majority in evening courses.

A Rochester native, Dr. Burns came to RIT in September 1964 after completing a master's degree program at the University of Rochester. He has a bachelor's degree from the University of Cincinnati and a Ph.D. from Michigan State University.

He is a member of the American Finance Association, the American Economic Association, Financial Management Association, Eastern Finance Association, Beta Alpha Psi and Beta Gamma Sigma. He has conducted various management seminars and consulting projects through the Center for Management Study in the College of Business.

Dr. Burns is the author of "Reducing Credit Losses," published by Oceana Press in 1967.

Brockport in this year's competition. Pacing the Tigers will be captain Ray Ruliffson, Jim Hill, Bob Parker, Greg Pancio and Dave Gibson.

Ruliffson, who wrestled to an 11-0-2 record last season, will be seeking the 142-pound crown. Last year he had to settle for fifth place. Hill will be competing in the 158-pound class. Last year he finished fourth wrestling at 167. Parker, a transfer from Canton Tech, looks promising in the 118-pound division while Greg Pancio will be after the 150-pound title.

In the heavyweight class, freshman Dave Gibson is expected to be in the running. Gibson just completed his first season as a defensive tackle with the football squad.

Coach Bill Carey's basketball cagers will be out to improve on a third place finish in last year's competition. After losing to RPI, 79-58 in the opening round, the Tigers captured third place by downing Alfred, 87-72.

Ithaca won the tournament, downing RPI, 69-58.

Pacing the Tigers will be co-captains Dan D'Andrea and Arnold Cole. Last year D'Andrea scored 318 points and led the team with 10.6 rebounds per contest. Cole scored 420 points and averaged 19 per game. The Tigers feature depth along with outstanding transfer strength.

From the junior college ranks come Ray Brown, Ed Davis, Mark Markowski, Bruce Campagna, Prentiss Thompson and John Park. Brown averaged 20 points per game at Dutchess Community College and Campagna hit the hoops for 19 at Herkimer Community College last year. Markowski played at Alfred Tech where he averaged 16.5. Davis and Brown, both at 6-5, and Park at 6-7 give the Tigers solid board strength.

Office of Energy Conservation work with the Public Affairs Department to keep you aware of both the problem and the results of the energy conservation program. It is our goal to reduce energy consumption by 10%, the equivalent of 400,000 gallons of fuel oil. This goal is attainable by a reasonable implementation of these suggestions augmented by your own ideas and good will.

"I desire to join with the entire RIT community on this very important program, for without each of us taking personal notice of the situation, there will be little or no effect.
