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

New Vice Presidents Named

Two RIT vice presidential positions, vacant throughout the 1970-71 academic year, have been filled within a span of six days. On June 10, President Miller announced the appointment of Edward P. Curtis, Jr. as vice president for Public Affairs. On June 15, Dr. Fred W. Smith was appointed vice president for Student Affairs and dean of Complementary Education. Both appointments will become effective Sept. 1, 1971.

Curtis, who served as interim city manager of Rochester in early 1970, will leave a position as director of Federal Affairs at the Eastman Kodak Company to join RIT. He has been with Kodak since 1955, following four years with the Central Intelligence Agency. He is a graduate of Williams College.

Dr. Smith has spent the past five years with Oakland (Mich.) University. He was named dean of freshmen in 1966 and dean for student resource services in 1970. From 1963-66, he was associate dean of students at Alma (Mich.) College. He holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Wheaton (III.) College and a Ph.D. from Michigan State University.

In announcing Curtis' appointment, President Miller said: "We will look to him for leadership in strengthening RIT's role both locally and nationally. His experience in business and government will prove invaluable in our continuing efforts to revitalize our mission as an uncommon urban university."

Dr. Miller said of Smith: "I am delighted that we could attract...a man of Dr. Smith's youth, expertise in student programming, and dedication to the upgrading of student participation in campus life."


POT-POURRI

Housing Complex Ready in September

Over 200 of the planned 275 units in the new RIT married student/faculty/staff complex (pictured above) are expected to be ready for occupancy in September, according to business manager, C. Douglas Burns. The contract for the construction, which is already under way, has been awarded to the Stirling Homex Corp. of Avon.

The modular apartments are of three varieties: one-bedroom garden apartments, of which there are 112; two-bedroom townhouses, of which there are 97; and three-bedroom townhouses, of which there are 66. As of June 15, there are approximately 40 townhouses available; a waiting list exists for the one-bedroom units. Rents for all units, including utilities, are expected to range from \$165-200.

The project was conceived as an RIT community, promoting utilization of campus academic and athletic facilities by the residents. Recreational areas and extensive landscaping will contribute to the community atmosphere.

As of July 1, Miss Susan Niess, secretary to Burns, will assume the position of manager of apartment housing. Her area of responsibility will include the Perkins Rd. apartments, as well as the new complex. She may be contacted at extension 2377 about reservations or other questions about apartment living.
