

#### GULDIN TO DIRECT SCHOOL OF PRINTING

Dr. Mark F. Guldin, staff chairman of the graduate program in the School of Printing, has been appointed acting director of the school. Dr. Guldin, a 1949 RIT graduate, was recently re-elected to the executive council of the RIT Alumni Association. He joined the faculty in 1961.

Hector H. Sutherland, who resigned the directorship of the school in June, in order to devote his energies to teaching and counseling, has taken on additional duties in a new area. He has been named director for Curriculum Studies in which capacity he will investigate new--possibly interdisciplinary-programs for the school.

#### CENTRAL PLACEMENT INCREASES PROFESSIONAL STAFF

Mrs. Rozanne Burt has joined the staff of the Central Placement Office as a placement counselor. She will be responsible for co-op placement of students in the growing School of Applied Science. Mrs. Burt, a 1969 graduate of St. Lawrence University, has spent the last two years in the Co-operative Education Department at Northeastern University.

#### TYPE DESIGNER IS WINNER OF THIRD GOUDY AWARD.

R. Hunter Middleton, internationally-known designer of such classic type styles as Tempo and Record Gothic, will receive the third annual Frederic W. Goudy Award from RIT in October. Middleton, who retired in 1970 from the Ludlow Typograph Company, produced over 100 type designs during his 47 years with the company. He follows Herman Zapf and Warren Chappell as the recipient of the award, which was established in 1969 by a grant from the Mary Flagler Cary Charitable Trust.

After receiving the award, Middleton will deliver the 1971 Frederic W. Goudy Distinguished Lecture in Typography.

#### WOMEN'S CLUB NAMES SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

Three girls, all students entering their third year in the Medical Technology program in the College of Science, have won scholarships from the RIT Women's Club. #### AUDIT OFFICE OFFERS RESOURCE ANALYSIS SERVICE

RIT's Office of Internal Audit has been expanded to include management and resource analysis, which will be available to other departments of the Institute. Among the services offered will be comparative cost analysis, cost determination for the purpose of developing pricing policies, and the development of organizational models for use in decision making.

Heading this new service will be Jon L. Prime, director of the Office of Management Analysis and Audit. Prime joined the Institute last year as internal auditor.

#### HOFF TO STUDY UNDER FACULTY ASSISTANCE GRANT

Gene G. Hoff, as assistant professor in the College of Business, has received a \$2,500 faculty assistance grant from the Haskins and Sells Foundation. Hoff, who has been on the RIT faculty since 1965, will take a leave of absence during 1971-72 to continue studies toward a doctorate in accounting at Syracuse University.

The award is one of twelve granted nationally this year by the foundation, which specializes in projects concerned with accounting education.
