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### KENYON TO HEAD COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING

After a year as department head of Mechanical Engineering, Dr. Richard Kenyon has been appointed dean of the College of Engineering. His predecessor, Dr. Edward Kirkpatrick, recently became president of Wentworth Institute in Boston.

Dr. Kenyon joined the RIT faculty in 1970, having formerly served as associate dean of the graduate school and executive officer of the Mechanical Engineering department at Clarkson College. He is a graduate of Clarkson, Cornell, and Syracuse University, where he received his Ph.D. in 1965.

### CANADIAN FIRM TO CONSTRUCT NTID COMPLEX

Pigott Construction International, Ltd., of Toronto, has been awarded the bid for construction of NTID's \$24.5 million complex, which is scheduled for completion early in 1974. Ground was broken for the complex on June 4, and actual work has now begun on the site, which is north of the RIT residence halls.

### BRICK CITY COOPERATIVE TO OFFER LOW PRICES

Officers of the RIT Student Association have created a cooperative, Brick City Enterprises, which will attempt to provide many of the necessities--at lower prices--for its members, all of the students at RIT.

One carry-over operation, which will be part of the cooperative, will be the Used Book Store, which offers extensive savings on textbooks for students. Since the late spring, the Student Association has operated a shuttle bus, nicknamed the "Swamp Buggy", which has provided regular, free transportation between RIT and two shopping plazas, in time to connect with RTC buses to downtown. In addition, the bus offered rides to and from the Monroe County Airport. These two services will continue in the fall, and the service will be expanded to include transportation to and from Monroe Community College and the University of Rochester.

The cooperative will tackle its most ambitious project in September, when it opens four stores, located in the basement of the dormitory area. On sale, at considerable discounts over area stores, will be records and hi-fidelity equipment, clothing, sundries, supplies for medical technology and engineering students, and athletic equipment.

### SOCIAL WORK PROGRAM ENROLLS 85; FIELD WORK COORDINATOR NAMED

RIT's new social work program, which will start in September, has enrolled a full complement of 85 students. The program, which will lead to the baccalaureate degree, will emphasize field work in social agencies.

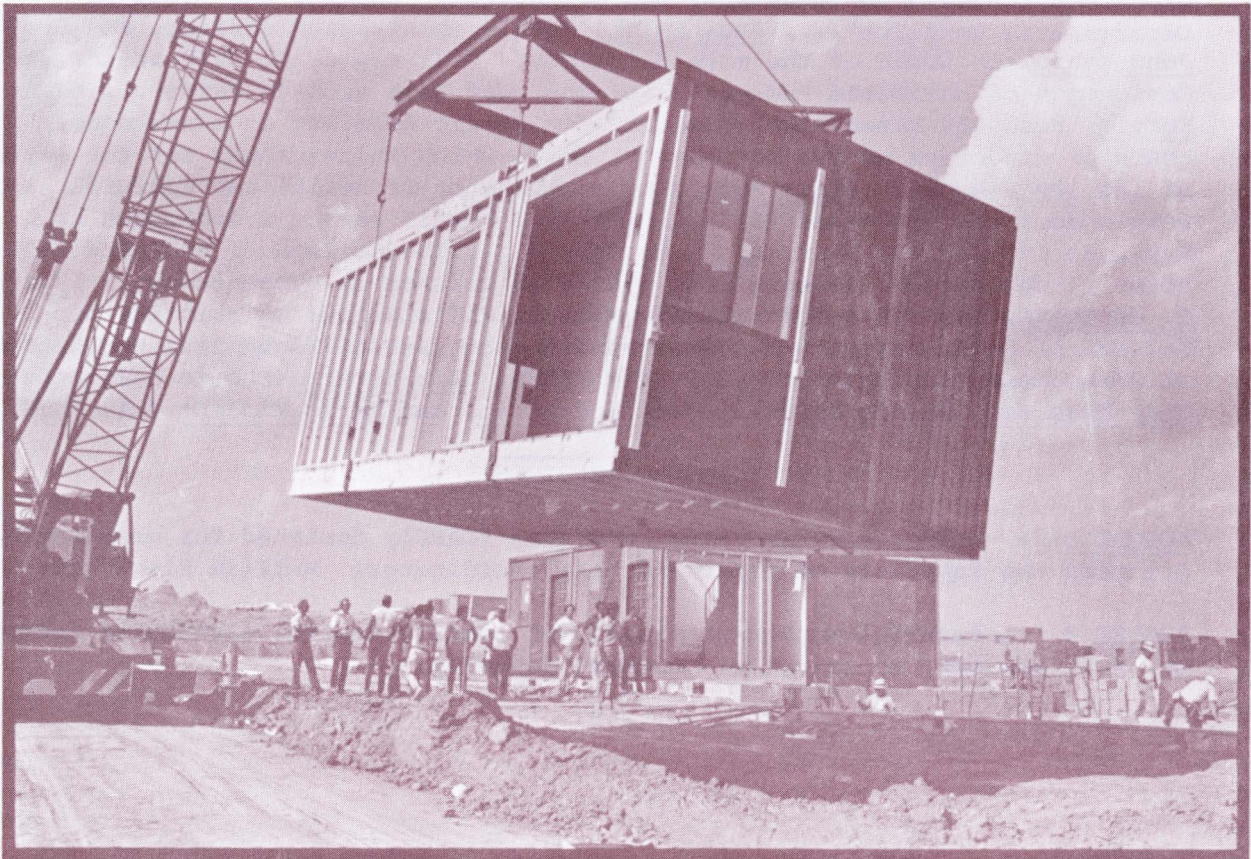
In order to achieve maximum placement of the program's students, Frank Toner, director of Manpower Development for the Rochester Citizens Planning Council, has been appointed coordinator of field work placement. A graduate of St. John Fisher College and Syracuse University's School of Social Work, Toner previously was a program director for twelve years at Rochester's Lewis St. Center.

Barringer's choice of "Riverknoll" for the new Stirling Homex site was selected by a committee composed of Business Office, Public Relations Office, and married student personnel. His selection will be forwarded to the Memorials Committee of the RIT Board of Trustees for final approval.

No winner was named in the selection of "Perkins Green" as the committee's choice for the Perkins Road complex. The Committee felt that it would be unfair to select a winner since many entries in this category were virtual duplications.
