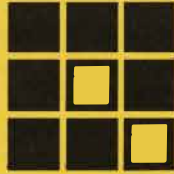

BOARD OF TRUSTEES TO HONOR DISTINGUISHED MEMBER

M. Herbert Eisenhart, former president and board chairman of Bausch & Lomb, will receive RIT's coveted Founders Award, on Sept. 22 in ceremonies marking the business leader's 50 years of service as an RIT trustee.

In the Board meeting starting at 5:30 p.m. in the Ingle Auditorium of the College-Alumni Union, trustees, their wives, and special guests will pay tribute in formal session to the man who assumed the role of RIT Trustee on Sept. 22, 1921.

The Founders Award, to be presented for only the fifth time since its origin in 1934, and last awarded 15 years ago to Mrs. Vanderbilt Webb of N.Y. City, will honor Eisenhart "for a lifetime of achievement and service which demonstrate and vitalize the ideals of the founders of this institution."

While serving on the RIT Board, Eisenhart has been an important member of the Executive Committee (1922-61), the Nominating Committee (30 years as chairman), Budget Committee, Special Committee on Finance and Endowment, Future of the Institute Committee (16 years), New Campus Education Committee, and Committee on Memorials.

XEROX'S CIVILISATION TO BE OFFERED AGAIN FOR C.C.E. CREDIT

Civilisation, the popular thirteen-week series of television specials offered last year by WXXI-TV, Channel 21, and made possible through a \$300,000 grant from the Xerox Corporation, will again be offered for college credit by the College of Continuing Education. Created, written and narrated by the famed British art historian Kenneth Clark, the program will be broadcast on Channel 21 starting on Oct. 3. The program will be shown on Sunday evenings at 7 p.m. and again on Fridays at 8 p.m.

RIT undergraduate credits can be earned by combining viewings at home or on the RIT campus (via Channel 21, or RIT's Channel 2), with occasional Saturday seminars and guided individual study. The first class at RIT will be held on Sept. 25. The program, which will be offered for college credit, "will present a broad overview of the effects of deafness on the individual," according to Frederick P. Gardner, director of general education for the Evening Session.

A short course in Personal Finance to help adults of all ages in their family financial planning, will be sponsored by the Extended Services Division of the College of Continuing Education, starting on Oct. 5. The series will be held from 6:30 to 8:15 p.m. for eight consecutive evenings. Lecture-discussion topics include: mapping a family financial program, functions of money, owning versus renting, an agenda for building financial security, using Wall Street for security and profit, planning for children's education, planning for retirement, and taxes as a fact of life. Trauger, director of the Biomedical Photography program in the College of Graphic Arts and Photography, has been elected to the Board of Governors of the Biological Photographic Association, at the group's recent annual meeting in Ottawa, Canada. Trauger also delivered the keynote address, titled "Biomedical Communications -- Your Most Important Challenge", at the organization's 41st annual meeting....Primary winner A. Wallace, "Refraction Corrections Applied to the Sofica Light Scattering Photometer". They spoke as part of a symposium on the occasion of the centennial of Rayleigh Scattering Theory.
