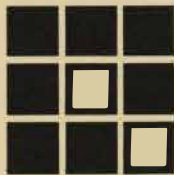

## THEATRE OF THE DEAF OPENS TOUR AT RIT

The National Theatre of the Deaf will begin its ninth national tour on Sept. 30 and Oct. 1-2 at RIT's campus, with the five part performance of "My Three Eyes". The production was written and directed by members of the company, with episodes reflecting the lives, skills and fantasies of the deaf actors. Public performances will be at 8 p.m. in the Ingle Auditorium of the College-Alumni Union. Tickets at \$2.50 are available through the RIT College-Alumni Union information desk.

The National Theatre of the Deaf was launched by the Eugene O'Neill Theatre Center in Waterford, Conn. in the summer of 1967. NTD is composed, primarily, of deaf actors who perform in mime, dance and manual language with spoken narration for the hearing audience. Managing Director of the company is David Hays, one of Broadway's outstanding scenic designers.

## RIT DEVELOPS TRAINING PROGRAM FOR BUILDERS

The Extended Services Division's new Center for Employer-Employee Relations will provide a comprehensive training program for the Building Industries Employers Association of New York State that will assist in the implementation of the provisions of the new Occupational, Safety and Health Act recently passed by Congress.

Robert F. Stevens, director of the Center, stated that RIT is completing a program to familiarize upper management construction industry personnel with the new law and the requirements that their firms must meet.

RIT is also developing a second program for the training of first line and middle management construction industry personnel. The program will be presented in cities throughout New York State and will include training for about 200 first line construction managers in the Rochester area, Stevens said.

## ESTATE DISTRIBUTION PROBLEMS COURSE SERIES STARTS OCT. 5

A special course on Estate Distribution Problems for accountants, insurance brokers, business owners, professionals, executives, and wives, will be offered by the Extended Services Division on six consecutive Tuesday evenings starting Oct. 5. The sessions will be held on the Henrietta campus through Nov. 9 from 7:30 to 10:15 p.m.

The program will survey a broad spectrum of legal and financial considerations of estate distribution, and will include timely material on recent changes in tax laws, including professional incorporation as a subject of special interest to physicians and members of other professions. Tuition is \$60 per individual and \$90 per couple.

## ALBANY AT RIT ON OCT. 2, FOR FIRST HOME GRID MATCH OF SEASON

The RIT Tigers, now in their first year of varsity status, will battle Albany State on Saturday, Oct. 2, for the first home game of the season at 1:30 p.m. Coach Tom Coughlin has 14 returning lettermen, and a crop of top flight prospects ready to avenge the 30-21 defeat at Albany last year.

In other sports action slated for Oct. 2, eastern baseball power, University

of Buffalo, will meet host RIT at 11 a.m., in the first of three fall baseball contests. The University of Scranton (Pa.) and RIT will square off at 1 p.m., and Buffalo and Scranton will battle at 3 p.m.

Also on Oct. 2, RIT will meet St. Lawrence in soccer, with the cross country team at the LeMoyne Invitational, both away matches.

RIT LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COURSES HELP INNER-CITY RESIDENTS

The Extended Services Division of the College of Continuing Education will offer eight new courses this fall that will give potential inner-city leaders college credit for learning leadership skills.

With over 90 presently enrolled, the courses will be offered Mondays and Wednesdays at the Metropolitan Center, 50 West Main Street. Students can either attend day or evening sessions.

All courses will be free for inner-city leaders, since the program is funded by a \$29,930 Title I grant of the N.Y. State Education Department. RIT contributes half that again, \$14,965, in services, space and planning.

"The program will give inner-city organization and neighborhood leaders a real foot in the door," according to Frederick P. Gardner, director of the General Education Division in the College of Continuing Education.

Courses will include research into alternatives to problem solving, report writing, proposal writing and presentation, program implementation, and a study of social agencies and organizations.

James Papero, assistant director of RIT's Extended Services Division, and coordinator of the Leadership Development Program, stated that instructors will be encouraged to use any area in the community as a classroom for the courses, including meetings of the City Council and Board of Education.
