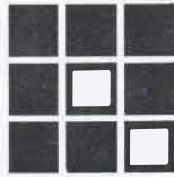

RIT-TV TO OFFER DOCUMENTARY ON SPIRITUALISM

"There Is No Death, There Are No Dead," a documentary by RIT graduate Robert Kiger ('70) will be broadcast by the Institute's TV Center on Wednesday, Nov. 10 at 10 a.m., 1 p.m. and 8 p.m. on Channel 7. The film, sponsored by the Talisman Film Festival, is a documentary of American spiritualism. It was filmed at a spiritualist colony in Lilydale, New York, and covers the past and present aspects of spiritual communications with the dead. Students at St. John Fisher and Nazareth Colleges will be able to view the program on WAX 30.

MEXICAN EDUCATORS VISIT RIT

Vocational training and education as it is practiced in Rochester by Xerox Corporation and RIT was the subject of intense study and discussion when the presidents of 10 Mexican two-year technical institutes visited the city Oct. 28 and 29, as part of a program sponsored by the Inter-American Education Foundation in cooperation with the American Chamber of Commerce of Mexico.

The group returned to Rochester as a result of a similar visit last fall, when interest was stimulated in the "working-partnership" between U.S. education institutions and industry as exemplified by RIT's cooperative education program. The group also expressed interest in the programs offered by RIT's Center for Community College Faculty Development.

"The government of Mexico is now in the process of updating its system of technical education in order to more greatly develop the country's economy by strengthening the technical knowledge of their industrial employes," stated Juco Mantilla, technical liaison manager of Xerox's Latin American Division.

"During the educators' visit here last year, they were greatly impressed by the close working relationship of Xerox and RIT. They are now studying ways of implementing similar working partnerships between their technical educational institutes and Mexican industry," Mantilla said.

RIT's cooperative education program was started as a work-study plan of education in 1912, and is the oldest program of its kind in New York State, and is the third oldest co-op program in the nation.
