# **DePrez Named Communications Director**

### New Communications Program Formed

The formation of a new Communications organization at Rochester Institute of Technology has been announced by Edward P. Curtis, Jr., Vice President for Public Affairs, and Gene E. DePrez, recently appointed Director of Communications at RIT.

"The Communications organization," said DePrez, "will increase the Institute's involvement in community affairs. It also will replace the present RIT public relations department. The new program, which will include Alumni Relations, will expand communications within the Institute and with the Rochester community at large. Richard F. Limpert will continue to head the Alumni Relations program.

"Because this is a technical Institute, we have facilities to cover a broad spectrum of communications. A greater emphasis will be placed cont'd, p.2 Edward P. Curtis, Jr., Vice President for Public Affairs, has announced the appointment of Gene E. Deprez to the newly created position of Director of Communications, effective December 6, 1971.

In making the announcement, Curtis said that DePrez, who has served as director of communications for the Rochester Museum and Science Center since April 1970, brings "a wealth of experience in communications and urban affairs to the Institute. The position was created in order to expand communications within the Institute and with the community at large."

At the Museum and Science Center, DePrez, 31, was responsible for longrange planning and development of new programs, community and university relations, media utilization and special projects.

"DePrez will perform similar functions for RIT and serve as the official spokesman for the Institute," Curtis says. His responsibilities will include news media, information services, publications, exhibits and the Alumni Relations program. Richard F. Limpert will continue to head Alumni Relations.

DePrez, a native of Rochester, N.Y., graduated from RIT's School of Art and Design in the College of Fine and Applied Arts in 1962 with a bachelor of fine arts degree. He earned a master of fine arts degree in graphic design and communications from RIT in 1968. As an undergraduate he was editor-inchief for the Reporter, and a member

of the Student Council, Student Senate, Spring Weekend Committee, Masquers Guild, Religious Activities Association and Newman Club.

Following graduation from RIT, DePrez was associated with the Institute's Office of Educational Research. In 1965 he joined Eastman Kodak Company where he was project director and group leader in the Marketing Educational Center and a consultant in multimedia environments, systems and programs.

He has taken and taught special management programs in advanced behavioral science studies at Eastman Kodak Company and has participated in seminars on urban affairs conducted by Kodak and by church and civic groups.

As his master's thesis, DePrez co-produced and directed "Think About It!", a television documentary on the housing crisis in Rochester. In 1969 he produced and designed "Galileo," the first major presentation staged in a planetarium anywhere in the world.

He has been a member of the RIT Alumni Association's Executive Council since 1967, and has served on the Council's Homecoming Committees, Scholarship Committee, and Awards and Citations Committee. He also served on the New Campus Fund campaign and the Ellingson Scholarship Endowment Fund.

DePrez was listed in Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities, 1961-63, and in the 1970 edition of Outstanding Young Men of America. In 1967 he received a Gold Award in the International Television Festival of New York.

He is past vice president of Blackfriars, Inc., a Rochester theatre group. In 1970 he was a member of the executive board and director of public relations for the Rochester International Film Festival. He served as leader of the Monroe County Planning Council task force on leisure time activities, as chairman of the WHEC-TV Metropolitan Affairs Advisory Committee, and as a member of several urban affairs and political action groups.

DePrez and his wife Patricia and their two children reside at 211 Canterbury Road, Rochester.

As part of the reorganization, DePrez announced the appointment of Jack Smith to the new position of Manager, Communications Services. Smith will direct day-to-day operations of the Communications program.

Smith, who has been public information officer for the National Technical Institute for the Deaf at RIT since July 1970, also has been named Director of Public Information for NTID. In addition to his responsibilities with RIT, he will continue to represent NTID both locally and nationally.

Smith has been with RIT since July 1969. Prior to assuming responsibility for the NTID public information program he worked in all areas of RIT public information.

"The team of DePrez and Smith brings strong communications skills to all areas of RIT," stated Curtis.
